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Architectural Description

The Anderson Barn is located in the vicinity of Hitchcock in Beadle County, South Dakota. The barn was built in 1885 by Bengt Anderson to house livestock and horses. The barn is eligible under Criterion C as a fine example of a Feeder Barn.

The barn has a poured concrete foundation and tongue and groove wood siding. It has a gable roof with asphalt shingles, narrow eaves and ridge vents. The façade (south elevation) has equal sized sliding doors for the three bays that are on sliding tracts. There are two fixed four pane windows flanking the central door on the first level. There is also a fixed four pane window in the gable above the two hay doors.

The west elevation has five fixed four pane windows and a Dutch door. The north elevation has 8' x 10' sliding doors on tracts. The upper half of the north elevation has been covered with corrugated metal. The east elevation has two fixed four pane windows and a Dutch door. The wood siding on the bottom four feet of the east elevation is exposed while the upper part has been covered with corrugated metal siding.

The interior of the barn is unchanged with the exception of the poured concrete floor. There is 30' manger that divides the middle and north bays. A feed bin on the inside divides the middle and north bays on the east end. The inside of the bays are still used for livestock and the loft can store up to 40 tons of hay.

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History

Hitchcock, Beadle County, South Dakota, was founded in 1881 and called Clarksville and Altoona before it was renamed by the railroad after local landowner Charles Hitchcock.¹ The last groups of American Indians to inhabit the area were the Lakota, Nakota and Dakota, collectively referred to as the Sioux. The Sioux were pushed onto reservations by the end of the 19th century opening up thousands of acres of land. The railroad arrived in 1882 and brought settlers to the area during the Great Dakota Land Boom of the 1880s. In these respects, Hitchcock's beginning represents the most common prescription for town building that occurred in South Dakota.

Bengt Anderson immigrated to America in 1881 after growing up in Sweden and spending several years in Australia. He worked as a cabinet maker in Chicago before coming to Dakota Territory in 1882 and homesteading near Hitchcock. Bengt, his wife Hadda and their nine children raised wheat, corn, oats, hogs and cattle, eventually expanding their operation to ten quarter sections of land. The barn was built in 1885 and is still used today. Farmer and livestock production remain the dominant economic activity in the area.

Common elements of feeder barns present in the Anderson Barn include gable entrances, huge roof, rectangular plan and large haydoor. Feeder barns are common throughout the Midwest, western United States and scattered other regions.² It is a likely descendant of Appalachian crib barns or from barns introduced by Dutch and Lower Saxon settlers, but the linkage to Germanic settlement

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influences are probable. The Anderson Barn also has Dutch doors, which are commonly found on the lower level of bank barns. Bank barns are generally of Germanic origin, which may be a link to the Dutch doors that appear on the Anderson Barn.

Feeder barns are plank frame adaptations of Mid-west Three Portal barns. In the Midwest, feeder barns were an economical alternative to expensive timber frame barns. Changes in the cattle industry in lowa and Illinois brought about the evolution of the feeder barn. Farmers began feeding cattle from birth to slaughter with the excess crops they produced and then shipped them to larger cities like Chicago on refrigerator carts.² The design eventually spread with the railroads ability to deliver dimensional lumber. Feeder barns are common in the traditional Midwest and are found as far west as eastern South Dakota and Nebraska.³

The Anderson Barn is eligible under Criterion C as a fine example of a Midwest Feeder Barn.

The boundary line encompasses the traditional area of the Anderson barn.
