# Description of present and historic physical appearance:

The Walter R. Holt House is a two-story Queen Anne-style house located northwest of downtown Macon on a small lot that was once part of Holt's vast land holdings. Built in c.1886, the Holt house is an excellent example of the Queen Anne style with its irregular massing, front and side projections, wrap-around porch, and complex roof configuration. The wood-frame house represents the Queen Anne house type (defined as a combination of the floor plan and the number of stories) because its plan includes irregular massing, a projecting parlor, small entry vestibule and a large hall. The house is also an excellent example of the Queen Anne style because of its eclectic ornamentation. Located on a flat corner lot shaded by cedar and pecan trees, the house is set among early to mid-20<sup>th</sup> century houses.

The Holt house is a two-story Queen Anne-style house with an asymmetrical floor plan, multiple gables, and a wrap-around porch. Asphalt shingles cover the roof and the exterior walls are sheathed in wood weatherboard and beaded board siding. The brick-pier foundation has been filled with brick to form a continuous foundation. The original two-over-two-light windows remain intact.

Like all Queen Anne-style houses, the Holt house is eclectic with references to past architectural styles. These references include English medieval architecture with its gable-front woodwork and projecting second story. The feathered brackets that support the front-facing gable roof allude to the wooden architecture of medieval Japan. The turned balusters, jig-sawn brackets, and the elaborate door surround represent the eclectic Folk Victorian style.

The interior plan features six principal rooms, a front parlor, entrance hall, dining room, two bedrooms, and a rear kitchen. A small foyer opens onto the entrance hall, which includes a fireplace

and stairs to the second floor. A narrow corridor divides the dining room and bedroom and leads to the rear kitchen ell. The kitchen was once a separate building that was later joined to the main house. The second-floor plan, which mirrors the first floor, includes five bedrooms and a sleeping porch above the main entrance.

The interior walls and ceilings are finished in plaster with wood wainscoting applied in the entrance hall. The staircase is paneled with turned balusters, and an elaborately carved newel post. Most of the original mantels survive, though most hardware has been replaced. On October 27, 2003, the Walter R. Holt House received final certification from the Technical Services Branch of the National Park Service after it was rehabilitated for use as an office building.

Section 8-Statement of Significance

### Statement of significance (areas of significance)

The William R. Holt House is significant in the area of <u>architecture</u> because it is an excellent example of the Queen Anne style of architecture. The Queen Anne style, which was popular from the 1880s to the 1910s, was introduced to a broad audience at the Philadelphia Exposition of 1876. Its origins in Old English house forms appealed to a revival of interest in the architecture of colonial America and its eclecticism offered relief from the historical revivals that dominated the first half of the 19<sup>th</sup> century. The Holt House is an excellent example of a Queen Anne house type and the Queen Anne style because of its irregular plan, wrap-around porch, and exterior ornament, which includes eclectic references to past architectural styles. The sunbursts and feathered brackets derive from the wooden architecture of medieval Japan. The projecting second-story jet is associated with British colonial architecture of the 17<sup>th</sup>-century.

# Contributing/Noncontributing Resources (explanation, if necessary)

The Walter R. Holt House, which is eligible for listing in the National Register, is the only resource associated with the nomination.

# Developmental history/historic context (if appropriate)

The Walter R. Holt House is located along Vineville Avenue, a rural corridor developed after the Civil War. According to a map drawn in 1863, Forsyth Road (Vineville Avenue) was completely rural with only a handful of houses north of the Confederate Arsenal previously located near Forsyth Road and Vista Circle. The Macon & Western Railroad had been built in the years before the Civil War.

According to Bibb County city directories and tax records, the first reference to the property was in 1886 at which time Walter R. Holt is listed as the owner. The property included 200 acres valued at \$1,200 in addition to \$400 in livestock and household goods valued at \$25. The total value of his property was listed at \$1,655. The presence of household goods suggests that a house existed on the property by 1886.

Section 8-Statement of Significance

Walter R. Holt's parents were Robert Simon Holt and Julia Bowman. Walter was born in 1859 as the youngest of three children. His paternal grandfather, Simon Holt Jr., was born in Halifax County, Virginia and moved to Hancock County, Georgia. Several Holt families resided in Hancock County in the second half of the 19<sup>th</sup> century, while other Holts settled in Macon.

Holt's house is identified on a map produced in 1897. By 1899, Holt owned 2,000 acres, which he farmed. Nancy Burney Douglass (a descendant of William Holt's wife, Annie), described Walter Holt as a "good manager and [he] planted cotton, corn and other marketable produce." Holt was also successful in the wholesale grocery business, first as Holt and Barfield, then Holt and Malone, and later Holt and Mason. By 1905, his grocery business, W. R. Holt and Company was located at the corner of Poplar and Third streets. At his death in 1919, Holt was identified as a member of the Bibb County Road Board and one of the most prominent farmers in the county.

Holt's widow Annie Holt, resided in the house until her death in 1927. She was born Annie Merritt (or Merrett) on December 9, 1861. Annie's sister Lillian and her husband J. W. Johnston lived about one mile closer to town. Her sister Lillian moved in with Mrs. Holt when Mr. Johnston died in 1920. The Holt property was also occupied by a number of small houses for African Americans. In 1924, there were seven such houses and in 1939, the number was reduced to three. None of the African-American houses remain. In the 1920s, Annie Holt and Lillian Johnston retained the house and a ½-acre lot and sold the rest, which was subdivided into smaller house lots. Lillian Holt lived in the Holt house from 1920 until her death in 1954.

Paul Rumble, a representative for Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph, purchased the house in 1959. The Huston Oil Company purchased the property in 1965 as the future location for a filling station. The oil company never developed the site and sold the house in 1976. The William Sclocumb Trust, which owned the property from 1976 to 2002, purchased the house for Florrest Blankenship. Blankenship divided the house into apartments, reserving one apartment for himself. In 2002, James A. Smith purchased the house and rehabilitated it as an office building. The Walter R. Holt House received final certification from the Technical Services Branch of the National Park Service on October 27, 2003










Walter R. Holt House Macon, Bibb County Second-Floor Plan
