DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Crawford-Davey-Pettyjohn House is a two story Queen Anne house that occupies a large corner lot in Pierre. The dwelling sets on a terraced lawn that is supported by a polychrome cut stone wall. This material, which is also used as the structure's foundation, is the moraine of a glacier. A large uncut boulder of this material appears in the central portion of the basement; this stone has been unmovable and visable evidence exists of attempt to break it up. In essence, the house is built on a rock.

The house's original construction occurred in 1885, but its present appearance came about from a 1908 rebuilding project. Also in 1966, the Neilan family, the present owners, restored the house that had prior to then been in ruinous condition.

Its front facade has an open porch that slightly wraps around the right side and is supported by Doric columns. Directly above this is a smaller but similar second story balcony. A tower dormer with a segmental termination appears on the combination hip-gable roof. All of these highlights are drawn out by the brown trim that contrasts nicely with the white painted clapboard. Brown wood shingles also appear in the gable's ends.

The right or south facade also has a large open entry which has Doric columns supporting a pediment that has stickwork within the tympanum. The left or north facade gives the viewer a good idea of the expanse of the house but has no special design elements. Another entry appears on the rear of the home.

The house's windows are mostly rectangular and vertical to the building but others are almost square and use stained and beveled glass in their transoms. A corner window is also present as are small square openings; all of these have lintel and slipsill surrounds. The doorway is multi-paneled with side lights and a transom.

The dwelling's interior is also impressive with oak trim on the first level and fir on the second. The floors are either sugar maple or black walnut; also, the house has some of the most ornate parquet floors in the state. There are many other features within the home that remind the viewer of its age.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Crawford-Davey-Pettyjohn House in Pierre is one of the best examples of Queen Anne architecture in the city. In fact, it is one of the few remaining houses that reflect that particular style. It is also significant politically for it was the home of two governors as well as many prominent local citizens.

The original owner, Coe I. Crawford, lived in the house from 1885 to 1896; from 1893 to 1897 he was the attorney-general for the state. After an unsuccessful bid for the U.S. Congress in 1896, he moved to Huron where he set up legal practice; his major client being the Chicago, Northwestern Railroad. In 1902, he ran on a progressive platform for the Republican's nomination for governor; although he failed to get on the ticket, he established himself as the state's leading progressive. Prior to this, he had resigned from being the railroad's attorney and denounced other big companies for having too much power.

In 1906 he won the governorship and began to institute major reforms in the next election including a direct primary, anti-lobbying legislation, and controls on campaign contributions. Two years later, he successfully beat A. B. Kitteridge, the leader of the stalwart Republicans, and became a United States Senator.

Robert S. Vessey succeeded Crawford as governor and he too believed in LaFollette's "Wisconsin Idea." He lived in this house as governor; apparently rented it from J.A. Davey, the owner. Vessey served as the state's executive from 1909 to 1913.

Frank Pettyjohn who owned the house the longest bought the house in 1919; he controlled several grain elevators. The next to purchase the house was Howard Spaid who was followed by the present owners, Norman and Doris Neilan. This family bought the house which was in terrible condition and returned it to one of Pierre's showplaces.
