PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Wager House is a two and one-half story wood framed vernacular styled residence located on a prominent riverfront lot at 621 Indian River Avenue. The house has a square plan capped with a hip roof. A widow's walk with stick balustrade and corner posts tops the hip roof. There is a gabled roof dormer at each elevation with paired 1/1 double hung wood sash windows. simple entablature runs below the boxed eaves of the roof. large hexagonal bays extend from the south elevation. roofed porch runs the length of the main (west) facade. porch roof is supported by square post and turned post balustrade. A similar three bay porch is located at the rear Fenestration is paired, vertical 1/1 double (south) elevation. hung wood sash. The house rests on a brick pier foundation with replacement concrete block piers at the front porch. Siding is wood clapboard at the side elevations and imbricated wood shingle at the dormers and hexagonal south elevation bays.

A c. 1915 one story hip roofed garage is located at the north elevation and is connected to the main block at the front porch. The garage is likely to have been constructed at the same time the rear porch was added. The sides are constructed of novelty siding while the roof is covered in replacement asphalt shingle.

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SUMMARY

The Wager House is significant at the local level under Criterion A in the area of social history for its association with Ellis Wager and the publication of the <u>Florida Star</u>, Brevard County's first newspaper and the use of the house as a civic and social gathering hall. It is also significant at the local level under Criterion C as one of Titusville's finest wood framed vernacular styled residences. The house contributes to the Titusville Multiple Property Group under Associated Historic Context: Exploration and Settlement of Titusville, Florida 1867-1930 and Associated Property Type: Buildings of Titusville-1867-1930.

The Wager House is one of the oldest buildings in Titusville. It is located in Wager's subdivision of Titusville platted for Ellis B. Wager in 1889. Originally a two story, flat roof structure built by Pleasant J. Hall for Perry Wager in c. 1891, a third floor and hip roof with a widow's walk was added in the early 1900s, and the porch at the south elevation was added in 1915. Perry Wager's son, Ellis, published the Florida Star, Brevard County's first newspaper, on the first floor of the house. The second floor was used for special events and served as Titusville's ballroom and opera house. The house remained in the Wager family through the 1930s.

The house is significant in the area of social history for its part in the development of the social and cultural traditions of Titusville. The house served not only as a communal meeting hall, it also housed the county's first newspaper which helped to express, and possibly shape, the political, social and economic views of the fledgling community.

The Wager House is architecturally significant for its massive framed vernacular styling. The Wager House, because of its size and the quality of its overall design and individual features, is one of Titusville's most significant private residences. While basically vernacular in style and shape, the house incorporates several elements of Late Victorian styles. The paired fenestration with its vertical panes reflects Italianate Revival style influencing, while the imbricated wood shingles and the canted bays reflect the most elaborate of the styles, the Queen Anne. Because of this, the house conforms well to the description of Frame Vernacular style located in the above mentioned Associated Property Type.
