The Beulah Lodge is a two-story frame gable front building constructed in 1908. The building was constructed in a rectangular plan and has a one-story frame ca. 1940 addition on the rear (west) facade. The building is sited on a hill just west of the Beulah community and has a cemetery located to the south and west.

On the main (east) facade are original frame double doors which have five frame panels. Over the doors is a transom, noew covered. The windows are original four-over-four sash with small frame cornices. The building has weatherboard siding and at the roofline is a plain soffit, frieze board and gable returns. The roof is covered in standing seam metal. A brick chimney is located on the north slope of the roof. At the rear is a ca.1940 one-story frame addition with two-over-two horizontal sash windows. The interior was inaccessible. There are no outbuildings.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Beulah Lodge is significant as the only remaining social lodge building extant in the rural areas of the county. Constructed in 1908, the building was constructed to house the Beulah Lodge 609 F & AM (Free and Accepted Masons) and various church congregations such as the Universalists, Baptists and Methodists which used the first floor of the building for worship in its early years. The second story of the building has remained in continuous use as the lodge hall.

During the late 19th and early 20th centuries there were several rural lodge and social halls scattered throughout the county. These buildings served as the homes of fraternal organizations, church meetings and social clubs. These halls were important centers for the socializing of area residents. With the exception of the Beulah Lodge none of these buildings remain. The Beulah Lodge was used by various congregations during its history and the lodge continues to occupy the second floor. With the exception of a small frame addition on the rear facade, no major alterations have taken place and the lodge retains its original form and design.

While the Beulah Lodge is an example of a property both owned currently by a religious organization and used historically for a religious purpose, the building is being nominated for its function as a social hall, a secular purpose. The importance of this non-religious use of the building is noted on page E.19 of the context statement, as being singular within the county as an important feature of Crossroads Communities, a subheading of the context Community Development in Hopkins County, 1970-1935. The building's historical importance stems from its representation of an important social function, that of a meeting hall, which is distinct from its use as a church. The building's physical character is mentioned briefly on page F.10 of the property type discussion on the Multiple Property Documentation Form.

<u>Verbal Boundary Description</u>: The boundary for the Beulah Lodge is illustrated on accompanying Hopkins County tax map # 165, block 1, lot 1 which is drawn at a scale of 1" = 200' and by the accompanying sketch map. The nominated property includes all of the lot which encompasses the building and follows the course of a driveway on the south, west and north. The boundary excludes an adjacent cemetery.

<u>Verbal Boundary Justification</u>: The boundary for the Beulah Lodge includes the immediate lot which encompasses the building. This lot is bounded by a driveway on all sides and excludes a cemetery to the west and north. The cemetery lacks distinctive monuments or statuary. No other buildings or sites are associated with the property.
