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#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The one-and-a-half story frame house is nine-by-four bays in plan with a gable roof and an open foundation of brick piers. Along the north and south facades, there is a full inset gallery with tapered, solid wooden posts. Facing the beach, the centered entry on the south facade has sidelights and transom with the same simple shouldered moldings used on all the north and south fenestration. On the north and south facades, windows alternate with doorways so that all rooms have a single-leaf, glazed door leading onto one of the two galleries. All windows are six-over-six, double-hung sash. All openings are shuttered except the south entry. A six-inch flushboard is used on the south facade, with clapboard elsewhere.

A hall runs through the center of the house with a wide double-leaf door at each end. Most rooms retain their original Greek Revival doors with shouldered and inclined architrave surrounds. There are two interior chimneys. There is a large unfinished attic reached by an enclosed stairs.

The three acre lot slopes to the beach with large live oaks shading the house. The building had to be moved some hundred feet back from the water's edge after the major hurricane of 1947 undermined the foundation.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Alfred E. Lewis House is an outstanding example of a large Greek Revival cottage of one-and-a-half stories with undercut galleries. The house was built on the shores of the Gulf of Mexico around 1845, near what is now Pascagoula, Mississippi. The plantation was instrumental in the settlement of the Mississippi Gulf Coast, for few larger enterprises had been started in the region by that time. Replete with service buildings, docks, racetrack and cemetery, the house originally stood on a tract as large as 20,000 acres.

Colonel Alfred E. Lewis was an important figure in the history of the Mississippi Gulf Coast as planter, merchant, politician and Civil War officer. His trade extended to Cuba, Texas, and the West Indies. He served, at various times, as county tax collector, postmaster, and state representative. Lewis signed the Mississippi Ordinance of Secession in 1861, organizing his own regiment known as the Live Oak Rifles.

The plantation was bought in 1906 from Colonel Lewis by the father of Agnes (Sissie) Grinstead, who later married Walter Anderson, one of Mississippi's most prominent twentieth-century artists. Walter Anderson (1903-65) and his wife lived at Oldfields in the 1930's and 40's, years which formed an important and distinctive period in the artist's career.

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Amendment to the Statement of Significance

Walter Anderson's Oldfields period began in 1940 when he and his wife, Agnes Grindstead, moved to Oldfields, her childhood home in Gautier. His doctors had suggested that he could be released from the mental hospital and he could function if he felt free. Here Anderson had a happy family life and enjoyed his children, who were a comfort to him. Here, where Anderson felt loved and useful, he produced many joyful pen and ink drawings, mammoth block prints, sketches of the classics, large watercolors, and calendar drawings of daily activities. He also produced various cartoons for murals that were never executed. In later years, as he became immersed in his work, the presence of the others became unbearable. Unable to cope with this, he moved to the Cottage in 1948 where his solitary existence and his Horn Island period began.

Oldfields is a significant site in the life of Walter Inglis Anderson because an entire period of his artwork, quite distinct from his early period or his later Horn Island period, developed while he lived and worked at Oldfields.

Oldfields is included in the Walter Anderson Thematic Resources Group.
