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#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The St. Francis Xavier Cathedral Complex consists of a brick Gothic cathedral (1895, 1907--N.R.), a brick Queen Anne-Beaux Arts academy building (1897, 1907), and a brick bungalow style rectory (1898, 1930). It is located along Fourth Street in the Alexandria central business district. Despite some alterations to the buildings, the complex retains its National Register eligibility.

The St. Francis Xavier Cathedral Complex traces its beginnings to 1895 when the present church was built. In 1910 the church was elevated to the status of a cathedral. Since its inception the Cathedral Complex has been the focus of Roman Catholicism in Rapides Parish, serving as a worship center, school, convent, residence, and administrative center.

The Cathedral (1895, 1907)

(already listed individually on Register)

The cathedral was begun in 1895 and dedicated in 1899. The tower was added in 1907. The Latin cross church has a five bay nave, a tall transept, and a semioctagonal apse. It has heavily proportioned gables and simple lancet arches with "Y" tracery. These early Gothic features are mixed with later Gothic features, including rose windows, the three part entrance, and the 135 foot tower with its four center arches. The tower is surmounted by crenelation and four small corner towers which resemble Elizabethan chimneys.

The following changes have been made since 1907 when the tower was completed:

- (1) The three part gabled entrance archway has been stuccoed over.
- (2) The interior has been completely replastered and the false vaulting has been painted.
- (3) The impressive stained glass windows have been releaded and protected with plate glass.

#### The Academy/Convent (1897, 1907)

This was originally a two-and-one-half story frame galleried structure with a semihexagonal bay at each end. It faced the side of the cathedral with its shorter side toward Fourth Street. In 1907 the Fourth Street end of the academy was rebuilt and enlarged to create a nine bay, two-and-one-half story brick structure. In 1952 the remainder of the old (1897) frame academy burned, leaving the aforementioned brick structure with its quoins, round arch windows, gambrel roof, and Beaux Arts porch. The building's most noteworthy feature is the garret (the nuns' quarters), which has shaped gables, imbricated shingles, a massive central pyramid, an ornamental pressed tin roof covering, and dormers with multiple Corinthian pilasters. After the 1952 fire a new one story frame rear wing was added. The interiors feature standard early twentieth century detailing. Although they are in a good state of integrity, the interiors are not significant in their own right.

The Rectory (1898, 1930)

This building began as a single story frame Queen Anne Revival cottage (1898).

In 1903 it was moved from the east side of the cathedral to its present location. In 1930 a second story was added and the entire exterior was veneered in brick. This created what is essentially a two story bungalow. The rectory has received no noticeable alterations since this remodeling.

#### Contributing Elements:

Of course, the cathedral and academy-convent contribute to the complex's architectural importance. In addition, the rectory is listed as a contributing element because its present character is over fifty years old, it is historically linked with the other buildings, and its role has been integral to the functioning of the complex.

### Assessment of Integrity:

Despite the previously mentioned changes, both the cathedral and the academy-convent maintain their architectural character. The 1952 addition to the 1907 academy is set to the rear and is not visible from the front. The changes to the exterior of the cathedral are minor. The rectory has suffered no loss of integrity since the 1930 renovation. Overall, the complex's architectural impact in downtown Alexandria remains intact.

Criterion C

The St. Francis Xavier Cathedral Complex is locally significant in the area of architecture because of its contribution to Alexandria's historic townscape. The two major elements of the complex (the contemporaneous cathedral and academy-convent) are both landmarks in the area.

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#### The Cathedral:

The St. Francis Xavier Cathedral is Alexandria's only major example of a 50+ year old building in the Gothic style. It is also one of relatively few buildings in the CBD that reflects a specific historic style of architecture as opposed to the normal "commercial vernacular." Moreover, the cathedral's Gothic styling has a monumental and impressive quality, which can be seen, for example, in its twenty-one foot diameter rose windows and its nave lancets, each of which is as tall as a normal two-and-one-half story building. Finally, the cathedral qualifies as a local landmark because it was, for a time, Alexandria's tallest structure.

#### The Academy:

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The academy has a symmetrical and pretentious nine bay facade with a Beaux Arts arched portico. This sets it above the Queen Anne Revival cottages, boxy houses, and brick commercial buildings which characterize old Alexandria. In addition, its roof is a riot of texture and form and is easily the most complex and intricate roofline in the city (see Item 7 for specific features).

As noted in Item 7, although the rectory is not architecturally significant in its own right, it should definitely be considered a contributing element to the complex. Its present character is over fifty years old, it is historically linked with the other buildings, and its role has been integral to the functioning of the complex.

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
