Sitting solidly on its site, the two story courthouse has four corner pavilions that are pyramidally capped and interior chimneys remaining. Two center projecting side entrances have broad Romanesque arched entry ways. Appearing to be a later addition, the main portico is a projecting entrance porch; its top severs an additional Romanesque arched entrance. Four thin columns of undetermined orders make this entry the most ornate of the three but certainly not the most aesthetically satisfying.

Projecting brick laid in angled rows is used decoratively as stringcourses and on the first story around the windows forming a drip-stone molding. It is also used under the cornice of each pavilion and at basement level around the building.

The clock tower rises in several stages, from a square and open area containing a bell, to pedimented clocks, and finally to an octagonal dome with finial. In the rear of the courthouse a new jail is attached.

On the interior, double stairways lead to the courtroom. The ceiling has been lowered and accoustical tile installed. The Victorian bench (see photograph) is the most outstanding feature of the courtroom. Of beaded boards, it has corner blocks and reeding in the design. Behind the bench, which stands free of the wall, is a door to the judge's chambers.
