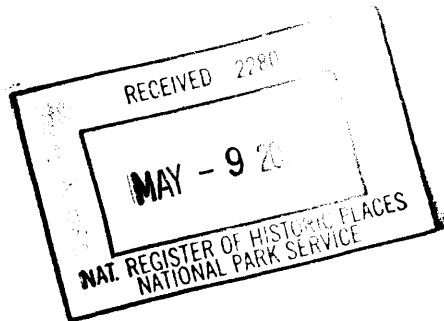

Description

Bethany Presbyterian Church is a small wood-frame building with Greek Revival detailing, built about 1855. It is located on the north side of State Highway 48 at the intersection of Perry Road in the rural settlement of Ariel, about four miles east of Centreville, Mississippi. The church faces eastward toward Perry Road.

The church is a simple rectangular gable-roofed building. The exterior walls are clad in painted weatherboard. The building has four identical sets of original double-leaf doors, two on the front (east) wall and two on the rear. Each door leaf has eight recessed panels in a Greek Revival pattern. Above each set of doors is an original eighteen-light transom. The north and south side walls each have five windows. These are eight-over-eight-over-eight triple-hung wood-sash windows protected by exterior louvered shutters. The building has a standing-seam metal roof.

The interior consists of a single rectangular room measuring approximately forty-two feet wide by sixty feet long, with a ceiling height of seventeen feet, six inches. Rows of simple wooden pews are arranged along two aisles that extend the length of the building. A low partition runs through the center section of pews, dividing the seating area in half. At the west end of the room, centered between the two back doors, is a pilastered rostrum containing a centered pulpit flanked by two lecterns. In front of the rostrum are a communion table and two chairs.

The interior walls and ceiling are clad in 1" x 8" tongue-and-groove boards attached with square nails. The floors are also 8" tongue-and-groove boards, which have been partially covered by carpeting on the aisles and in the area surrounding the pulpit. The original oil lamps were wired for electricity and re-installed about 1971-72. At this same time, a large central chandelier was installed.

There is a historic cemetery located adjacent to the church, but it is not included within the nominated property. A church annex building has also been excluded from the nominated property.

Statement of Significance

Bethany Presbyterian Church, built about 1855, is locally significant under Criterion C in the area of Architecture as a very intact and representative example of a rural vernacular church of the 1850s. It is a notable example of an architectural form that was widely used for rural churches in Mississippi in the 19th century – a gable-roofed, simple rectangular building with two entrances in the front-facing gable end. This type of church building was constructed in Mississippi from the 1820s into the 1910s. They were most commonly built of wood, though a few were of brick construction. As of 2002, eighteen surviving examples from the antebellum period have been identified in Mississippi, in varying degrees of integrity. Among the most intact of these are:

- Tabernacle Methodist Church (1857) in Copiah County (National Register 1996)
- Pleasant Valley Methodist Church (1840s) in Copiah County (National Register 1996)
- Hopewell Presbyterian Church (1839) in Lafayette County (National Register 1999)
- Sand Spring Presbyterian Church (1854) in Lafayette County (National Register 1993)
- and Bethany Presbyterian Church in Amite County.

Lebanon Presbyterian Church (1859) in Hinds County (National Register 1999) is also of this type, but is less intact from the antebellum period, having been partially rebuilt about 1890-1900.

Simple rectangular churches with a single, center entrance on the front-facing gable end, such as China Grove Methodist Church (1860-61) in Walthall County (National Register 1984), were apparently less common than the double-entrance type during the antebellum period, though they became more numerous in the later 19th century, and some double-entrance churches were later remodeled into single-entrance buildings.

Bethany Presbyterian Church is notable for its high degree of architectural integrity. It retains all four of its original sets of Greek Revival double-leaf doors with transoms. The interior retains its simple plank walls and ceiling, and the original pews remain in use. The church stands today as an exceptionally well preserved example of antebellum vernacular religious architecture in Mississippi.

The congregation of Bethany Presbyterian Church was founded in 1808. The present structure is the third building on this site.

Verbal Boundary Description

The nominated property consists of the Bethany Presbyterian Church building itself, located at UTM reference 15 – 692050 – 3442450, and a small square of land, 100 by 100 feet, centered on the roof ridge of the building and parallel to the sides of the building.

It is a part of a larger tract owned by the church and located in the SW quarter, Section 32, Township 2 North, Range 2 East, in Amite County, Mississippi.

Boundary Justification

This nominated property contains the church building itself, but excludes the adjacent cemetery and the adjacent non-historic church annex building.
