#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Cold Spring Farm is a two story brick structure with a steeply pitched roof and a pair of tall chimneys. The house has double-hung sash with sixover-six lights and a central entrance flanked by sidelights. The exterior is plain and has no ornamentation. The rear (north) elevation is constructed into the side of the hill only the second story and half of the first story exposed. A one story wood fram ell on the east side was replaced by a brick wing of approximately the same configuration in 1934. In 1954 a small brick enclosed porch with a gable roof was added to the west side.

The house contains original period moldings including wainscott, architrave trim cornices. The doors are also original. In the parlor is a mantelpiece and chimney breast with shouldered architrave trim characteristic of the Georgian period. Mid-nineteenth century alterations include the newell post and balusters for the central staircase.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

1774

This fine Georgian house built into the side of a bluff facing the lower reaches of the Kennebec River was constructed by Mr. William Lee, an emigrant from England to Boston, who left that city because of the civil disturbances which culminated in the so- called "Boston Tea Party". Lee and his forebears were brick and chimney pot makers so that it is no accident that Cold Spring Farm was built of brick made from clay in the bank of the stream which runs into the river a few rods north of the house.

The house remained in the Lee family until 1895, since which time it has had numerous owners. It has recently been beautifully and correctly restored by the present owners.

Within a few yards of the west side of the house is a plentiful spring which does not freeze even in the coldest winter months.
