### **Description**

The M. J. Sharp House was constructed in ca.1900. The builder is unknown. The building is of vernacular design with Victorian influences and represents the Mass Vernacular property type. It retains a high degree of integrity of design, materials, and workmanship. The M. J. Sharp House has been in continuous use as a single family dwelling from 1900 to the present dav.

The M. J. Sharp House is located in Block 36, Lot 19-20, of the Montgomery Addition. The Montgomery Addition was originally platted in 1887. The building faces east onto South 1st Avenue. The streetscape along South 1st Avenue is characterized by modest, working class residences of both historic and contemporary construction. No outbuildings are located on the site. A chain link fence extends across the front property line.

The M. J. Sharp House is a rectangular, one-story building of brick construction. The building measures 15 x 25 feet. The high pitched gable roof is covered with asbestos tile over wood shingles. It has a stone foundation,

Exterior features include a pitched roof veranda with non-historic wrought iron columns. Two windows, located symmetrically about the central entry at the principal facade, are wood, double hung with one over one lite sash. A single window at each gable wall has similar sash. The central entry has a wood panel door with transom. Important architectural elements include pent roofs, decorative shingles and attic ventilators at the gable heads, corbelled, segmental arch windows and hoods, and soffits with comice molding at the eaves.

Alterations include replacement of the original porch posts, a lattice trellis at the porch, and an early addition with shed roof at the rear.

#### **Statement of Significance**

The M. J. Sharp House is significant under Criteria C under the area of significance of Architecture. It is representative of the historic context "Residential Architecture in Phoenix Prior to 1901." Built in ca. 1900 and of vernacular design with Victorian influences, the M. J. Sharp House is a good representative of the Mass Vernacular property type. The M. J. Sharp House is also important in the area of Community Planning. As one of only twenty-two nineteenth century buildings remaining in the Montgomery Addition, which was originally platted in 1887, the M. J. Sharp House represents a rare example of its period and the historic context "Nineteenth Century Community Development in Phoenix."

A common design format for residences built in Phoenix during the nineteenth century was the Mass Vernacular house. Those building efforts were based, not on architectural design, but on the shared cultural experiences and abilities of their builders. Built of machine made and commercial materials, the houses often took into account past or contemporary trends in architectural style, although manifested in very simplified or provincialized elements. The M.J. Sharp House exemplifies that type of residential architecture and is a very good illustration of a traditional design based on the Queen Anne style. The

### **Statement of Significance (Continued)**

common characteristics of the mass vernacular house type are well represented in the M.J. Sharp House and include a rectangular plan with a steeply pitched, side-gable roof, attention to symmetry at the primary facade relating to its single pile with central hall plan, and the use of machine made and commercial materials such as fired brick, dimensioned lumber and milled wood. The stylistic treatment of the house is seen primarily in the gable walls which feature a pent roof and shingled gable head punctuated by a rectangular ventilator. Corbelled window hoods and enclosed eaves with cornice molding also relate to its stylistic model.
