San Francisco is generally dated 1849-50 although it may incorporate older construction. It is built on a brick platform approximately 100 feet square, said to be 6 feet deep, and exposed as the flooring of the ground story. Although having similarities to the local raised cottages, it is of a scale to merit comparison to villas with pianos

nobile, such as the first owner may have known in southern France.

The exterior is a layer cake. The ground floor is extremely simple with square plastered brick columns supporting the gallery across the front and halfway back the sides. The front entrance is reached by a divided stair which rises from the front corners of the house to the central opening in the gallery. The fluted wood columns with cast-iron Corinthian capitals support an arcuated architrave beneath an overhanging deck. The stair balusters are of turned wood, the gallery railing of cast iron and the deck railing of wood. The attic, which begins at the deck, is a Victorian construction which gives the house a unique silhouette sometimes identified as "Steamboat Gothic." Paired louvered openings alternate with ornate brackets under an immense cornice. The hip roof is pierced by tall dormers with diamond-paned, Tudor-arched windows and is crowned by a rectangular clerestory, flat-roofed and elaborately railed.

The plan is as unique as the exterior. The principal floor is arranged in suites of parlor, foyer, and bedroom on either side of the central hall which leads to the dining room, centered in the rear between stair wells. The rear corner rooms may once have been servants' rooms or dressing rooms but have been converted to baths. The interior decoration includes fluted Corinthian columns and fine mantels and moldings but is most notable for paintings attributed to Dominique Canova on wood ceiling and door panels. Although legend claims the immense attic was used as a ballroom, the narrow access stairs and obstructive roof support structure refute that possibility.

Where now the levee and road squeeze between the house and the Mississippi River, at one time there are said to have been gardens leading to the water. There are no extant outbuildings and the flanking cisterns have suffered hurricane damage

There are conflicting legends relating to the naming of the plantation by its first owner, Edmond Marmillion. The first suggests the name celebrated the gold rush of 1849 and was chosen by Mme. Marmillion. The other attributes it to a misunderstood French phrase, "son saint-frusquin," literally meaning "the shirt off his back," supposed to have been Marmillion's assessment of its cost of construction.

For the past 20 years the property has been in the custody, though not the ownership, of Mr. and Mrs. Clark Thompson. Their maintenance of the house as their home and private museum has prevented its demolition by neglect and provided continuing repair. It has also made San Francisco accessible to the public.

Unique among all plantation houses in its foundation structure, plan, and silhouette, San Francisco is unquestionably a landmark as that term is popularly understood. It has been pictured in American, British, and Swedish periodicals as one of the major sights of the New Orleans area. The exterior combines a variety of architectural motifs in a design dominated by an immense and ornate roof construction. The interior is notable for the paintings which ornament the ceilings and door panels of the parlors.
