The Clemens House is a two story brick structure with a limestone foundation which is partially exposed. The main block of the building is rectangular, measuring 52' by $37\frac{1}{2}$ '. A one story service wing which measures 38' by 15' is attached to the S.W. corner.

The hipped metal roof features an overhanging cornice supported by large triple brackets interspaced with smaller paired brackets. Similar treatment is given to the portico. Two interior chimneys are located in the main section of the building and there is one interior chimney in the service wing.

In the center of the facade is a small wooden portico supported by four slender wooden colonnets. Stone slabs at the entry porch appear to be the remnant of an earlier, smaller stoop. The central entrance door is topped with a segmental arch transom which is ornamented with a stamped metal lintel.

Windows are double hung with two large lites per sash and have decorative lintels similar to the one above the entrance. These lintels are apparently of high lead or tin content as there is no rusting. Directly above the entrance is a double or paired window which is longer than the other windows of the facade and extends to the roof of the portico.

Windows on the east and west elevations have similar treatment. The service wing has unornamented double hung windows with 6 lites per sash. The roof of the wing has been raised two feet from the original roof line.

The first floor interior consists of two rooms on either side of an entrance hall. The front rooms measure 20' x 20' and have cast iron mantels, while the rear rooms measure 15' x 20'. The main stairway is located on the right of the front hall and a service stair is located in the rear hall. A similar room arrangement exists for the second floor. Flooring for the second floor consists of 6" to 8" wide boards, and the right rear bedroom doors are of a six panel design with a beaded edge.

The service wing consists of three rooms, with the rear room having an Adamesque mantel.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Clemens House was the residence of Jeremiah Clemens, a leader of the opponents to secession in the Alabama Convention of 1861 and later an outspoken advocate of peace during the latter months of the Civil War.

No date for the construction of the house has been determined. Although the house as it presently stands is a fine example of mid-nineteenth century architecture, courthouse records and several architectural elements suggest that the house may have been built in the 1830's with a major remodeling done in the 1850-1875 period.

The property was purchased in 1838 by James Clemens who migrated from Kentucky in 1812. His son Jeremiah was born in 1814.

Jeremiah Clemens, who was educated as a lawyer, had a lengthy political career which was interrupted at several points in order that he might serve in the military, first against the Cherokee Indians and later in the Mexican War where he was promoted to a Colonel.

He was appointed as the U. S. Attorney for the northern district of Alabama by President Van Buren in 1838 and represented Madison County in the State legislature in 1839, 1840, 1841, 1843, and 1844.

In 1849 he was elected to the U. S. Senate and served through the Thirty-first and Thirty-second congresses. He then briefly took up residence in Memphis to assume the editorship of the Eagle and Enquirer. He returned to Alabama and served as a member of the secession convention of Alabama in 1861, where he was opposed to immediate secession, preferring what was known as the cooperationist stance. The Cooperationist, largely from the northern section of the state, felt that Alabama should delay secession for the time being and cooperate with other Southern states. After Clemens ascertained that the ordinance of secession would pass by a large majority, he voted for it, giving the following statement: "I am a son of Alabama; her destiny is mine; her enemies are mine...calmly and deliberately I walk with you into revolution."

During the Federal occupation of Huntsville his Unionist sympathies grew. Traveling to Philadelphia he conducted a pamphlet campaign advocating the re-election of Lincoln. He returned to Huntsville before the end of the War and died a few weeks after peace was declared.

In addition to his political and military careers Clemens was the author of several novels.

After his death the house was tied up in estate until 1874 when it was purchased by Duncan Sherman and Company. The property then passed through several hands until was recently sold to the Housing Authority.
