DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Clark House, commonly known as the Stone House, was built as a residence for William McBrayer (1754-1820) and was later the boyhood home of Champ Clark. This stone house is standing as erect and imposing as it was 175 years ago. It is constructed of huge slabs of Kentucky River limestone; its dimensions are approximately 40'x24' with walls that are 18" thick. The stone chimneys are inset, so that the outside of the chimney is even with the wall. The back and front facades of the building are identical, each having two windows and a central door. The east side of the building has two attic windows, while the west side has two attic windows and a door; there are also four basement windows, one of which has substantial stone steps beneath it and serves as the basement door.

There are two rooms on the main floor; each has a 9'x2' fire-place, designed to hold huge back logs and 4' foresticks. Reached by a steep narrow stairway, the two attic rooms each have fireplaces. The basement runs the length of the house and has a dirt floor, and is about six feet deep. Visible in the basement are the bases of the chimneys and eighteen solid 10" floor joists which support the structure.

Inside, the flooring of wide poplar has been partially replaced, though the window frames, mantels and closet doors, if not original, at least show signs of age. The outside appearance of the house is unchanged, except for the roofing which, no doubt, has been replaced many times. The windows have been broken, but the now unoccupied house in no other way has been molested. The present owners, Dr. and Mrs. George Gilbert, have expressed their intention to repair the building, and it is hoped that the local historical society can make some practical use of it.

The Stone House was the boyhood home of James Beauchamp (Champ) Clark, Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, 1911-1919, and Democratic contender for the Presidential nomination in 1912. It is also thought to be one of the oldest buildings in Anderson County, having been erected prior to 1792 when Kentucky was still a part of Virginia. One of only three stone houses still standing in Anderson County, its almost perfect stone walls reveal the skill of early masons. It has been featured in numerous

articles dealing with stone structures and in publications regarding the life of Champ Clark, who lived here as a boy.

James Beauchamp (Champ) Clark (1850-1921) was born nearby. He attended the University of Kentucky, taught school in Anderson County (1870-1871), and graduated from Bethany College, West Virginia in 1873. For a year (1873-1874) he was the President of Marshall College in Huntington, West Virginia, the first normal school of the state. law at the Cincinnati Law School, then settled in Missouri where he became a city attorney and newspaper editor before turning to politics, where he represented Missouri in the U.S. Congress for 24 years. He led the defeat of Cannonism, control of the House by the Speaker, then was chosen to be Speaker of the House and served from 1911 to 1919. In 1912 he became a candidate for the Democratic nomination for In the convention, he was ahead of Woodrow Wilson President. until the fourteenth ballot when he lost William Jenning Bryan's support. He died in 1921 at the age of 71.
