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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Pudley House is a two and one-half story modified stick style farmhouse built in 1871. The house has five bedrooms, two living rooms, a family room. halls and alcoves, two fireplaces and stairmays to a floored abbic and cellar. (See floor rlan.)

The archit of and builder, Selwyn Shaw, designed this house from plans he had used in other constructions. Escause the Dudleys paid the 32,100 cost in cash. Mr. Shaw wided free deveral special features including a decorated mantel over the fireplace and hand-finished eaves adorned with carvings of a star with a crescent moon that is said to be rsuedo-Turkish. The house is large with a floored attic and tasement where winter vegetables and canned goods were stored.

The bouse is furnished with pieces inherited from Mr. and Mrs. Mills, Caroline Louise Dudley's aunt and uncle. There is a Duncan Physe table, bevelled French mirror and Inglish walnut furniture imported into New England during the 17th century.

It is secretary difficult to assign a specific architectural style to the house, and most reople in this area refer to it as a typical salt tox farm house. The two spiles and singerbroad ornamentation accentuate the Victorian era design. The existing dimensions of the house are 63' 1" long and 43' h" wide. There is a horizontal redwood boarding of tongue and greave construction.

There have been some alterations to the house from the time it was priminally constructed as can be seen by looking at a photograph of the bonse taken in the early 1990's. Mirita Dudley recalls that the house has never been changed in the 62 years that she was married and estimates that any changes must have taken place around 1900. At that time the front parlor was extended about three feet and the front veranda which is shown on the south side of the front entrance was moved to the north side of the front entrance so it could connect to the existing veranda on the east side of the house. In addition, the front bedroom was extended and glass windows added. This room is referred to as the sum room where Caroline Louise Budley, Miriam Budley's mother-in-law, was cared for in her later years.

Other alterations to the house include a lean-to kitchen which was constructed when water was brought into the house. Before that time, the kitchen was where the sitting room now is. The bathroom, kitchen pantry and back porch were also added during this renovation.

Still standing behind the main house is the dilapidated barn-like structure built in 1870, which was the original Dudley House.

The house is situated among nine acres of lemon trees and a well tended vegetable garden. Its outstanding features include an ornamental doorway, carved eaves and gable dormer decorated with fishscale shingle and elaborate barge board attached to the roof edge. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Dudley House is significant for its architectural significance to Ventura and its association with a prominent agricultural family.

The Ludleys were one of the first farmers in this area. Then Penjamin Wells Budley purchased the land from Mr. and Mrs. T.W. Mills, it was wingin soil covered with wildflowers and nustard. There was no read. The Endleys excerimented with barley, wheat, oats and softshall relimits, but eventually found that line beans grow well in this cool formy climate. The land is now in leach trees which became possible with irrigation.

The nine-acre lemon orchard in which the Undloy house stands is all that remains of the original 200 acre parcel of the remote Sunta Farda y Satisfies. Most of the property was bought and used by the " arma County Co mustic College District.

Penjamin Budley was a member of the school board, olected clerk of the Formi of Surervisors and was a justice of the peace. He had court in the 1.7 ; home parlor. The house is also architecturally significant. A typical salt box farm house of its era, its gables and pingerbread ornamentation accentuate the Victorian design. Ventura does not have a wealth of houses dating from the 1890's and even fewer which are associated with the early picturer family. The house is even more significant in Ventura since it remains on its original site.

The current occupants are the fifth generation of Dudleys to live in this house. The property is now surrounded by urban development and is significant as being the last remaining pioneer family farm in the City.
