## DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Located on the Ewa (west) side of the saddle between the two hills, Puu Ualakaa and Puu Kakea, Nutridge sits on a knoll commanding a majestic view of Honolulu and the ocean. The house is a long, horizontal shingled structure which takes advantage of the vista afforded by the site. A local adaptation of the colonial style, it features an outset living room bay with a picture window and a gabled roof with returns. Double-pitched hipped roofed wings extend from either side of the living room bay.

The Diamond Head (east) wing extends from the living room's entry hall, and is dominated by a flat roofed  $\frac{1}{2}$  (porch) with three bays, two of which are enclosed by sliding glass doors. Two bedrooms, both of which have doors opening onto the  $\frac{1}{2}$  (porch), with a tiled bathroom and a dressing room between  $\frac{1}{2}$  them, are contained within this wing. The wing terminates with a single car garage.

The Ewa (west) wing contains a dining area, pantry, kitchen, utility room, and maid's quarters. Two sets of French doors open out from the living room and the dining area. The kitchen and dining room each contain casement windows and the utility area is ventilated with sliding windows. All rear windows are 6 x 6 and 6 x 9 double hung sash, except for the kitchen, pantry and bathroom casement windows of six panes. The original interior is intact and includes built-in cabinets in the dressing room and a lofty open-beamed ceiling, chandeliers and fireplace in the living room.

The nomination includes the entire twenty-two acre plantation parcel, most of which originally contained macadamia nut groves. These groves have not been tended and in many areas trees have died off. Brush and other trees have grown up in the groves; however, the original terracing and a number of the trees remain. Several plantation worker cottages and a "flume" which was used in the harvesting of the nuts, remain on the property in deteriorated condition. The caretaker's cottage, a modest single story, frame, hipped roof, single-wall structure, also stands on the property and is still occupied.

## STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Nutridge is significant for its associations with the commencement of the macadamia nut industry in Hawaii. This was the initial plantation on Oahu of E. S. Van Tassel, the president and founder of the Hawaiian Macadamia Nut Company, which pioneered the commercial growing of macadamia nuts on the planet earth.

The macadamia nut, a native of Australia, was introduced to Hawaii in the early 1890's at the residence of E. W. Jordan in Nuuanu valley. Brought in "solely as an addition to the natural beauty of Paradise," it was not until E. S. Van Tassel started some plantings at Nutridge in 1921 that the commercial growing of the plant began. On June 1, 1922, the Hawaiian Macadamia Nut Company Ltd. was formed. Besides its plantation on Oahu the company also started another at Keauhou, Kona, Hawaii, which eventually proved to be more successful. In 1927, the Territory of Hawaii granted Mr. Van Tassel a fifty year lease on Nutridge. This plantation remained in operation until the nineteen seventies and discontinued when the Honolulu processing plant suspended operations.

In 1925, Mr. Van Tassel commissioned architect Hart Wood to design his residence at Nutridge. The house is architecturally significant as a good example of Hart Wood's residential work of this period. at the forefront of the movement to create a style of architecture in Hawaii which would appropriately reflect a sense of place, and the Van Tassel residence discloses one solution to this problem. house evidences a sensitive handling of the building in relationship to its site, neither dominating nor being dominated by the location. One story high, and presenting a horizontal facade, broken by the vertical plane of the living room the house takes advantage of the site's magnificent vistas. Although employing a few colonial motifs, the house is essentially devoid of ornate embellishment and follows an extremely original layout with the lanai (porch) serving in the capacity of a hallway, providing direct access to the bedrooms. Such an arrangement accentuates the sense of outdoor living. Also by placing the rooms in a serial manner, the architect provided each room with cross-ventilation taking advantage of the trade winds. The dwelling's double-pitched hipped roof would become a common feature in the evolving "Hawaiian style" of architecture, and adds to the building's low profile.
