DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Foxes planned and built their hotel in 1912 as basically a square two-story box. Of frame construction with clapboard siding and shingled hip roof, it faced south, its plainness broken only by a narrow porch with second-floor railinged balcony. A few years later a smaller two-story addition was constructed on the east to give the building a roughly rectangular shape, 52 feet east/west and 42 feet north/south. An open stairway leads up from the lobby in the southwest corner of the first floor to the 10 bedrooms and two baths on the second floor. The building has 22 rooms in all.

The old hotel stands today almost exactly as it has for more than fifty years. In time a few interior walls will probably be removed on the ground floor, the better to accommodate its current use as a museum. Otherwise no changes are contemplated. The building is structurally sound and in fairly good condition.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Fox Hotel, granted, is not the Waldorf-Astoria. But, then, neither is Laverne New York City. On balance, however, the roles each has played in the community it serves are perhaps not too dissimilar. Each hostelry has met a definite need of citizens and visitor alike. Each has provided a convenient setting over the years for events of social and political importance to its service area. Each goes into the last quarter of the 20th century continuing to offer a significant community service. Only here must the Fox part company with its more illustrious companion. As of 1977, the Fox is providing a home, not for the traveling public, but for the Laverne Community Museum.

* * *

Laverne was still something of a tent city at the east entrance to the Oklahoma Panhandle when, in 1912, the railroad arrived to give the town status and stimulate a certain economic boom. Several new business buildings were planned and constructed that same year. One was a modest two-story frame hotel, built by Mr. and Mrs. A. H. Fox. Within a few years patronage was sufficient to warrant a small two-story addition. The Fox Hotel continued to serve the community - as the Fox Hotel, although the Foxes themselves gave way to several subsequent owners - until 1961. The owners that year, Mr. and Mrs. Charley Grisswell, had bought the property in 1935. After closing the hotel they lived in it until 1973, when it was purchased by the City of Laverne for use as the Laverne Community Museum.

Over the years, as indicated above, the Fox Hotel served the community in the variety of undramatic, yet important, roles demanded of a small town hostelry. In the "railroad era" of its first two decades those roles added materially to the town's confidence and well being. They faded with the increased mobility provided by the automobile and the greater growth of other town's in the area. Still, the Fox Hotel maintained its essential physical integrity. And today, as host to a community museum, it continues to offer its important, if admittedly unspectacular, services.
