Description

The Immaculate Heart of Mary Church was constructed in 1928. While the architect is unknown, the church was built by local contractor Manuel Orta. The building is constructed in the Second Renaissance Revival architectural style with North Italian mode influences and represents the European Traditional property type. It retains integrity of design, materials, workmanship, and feeling. The Immaculate Heart of Mary Church has been in continuous use as a church from 1928 to the present day.

name of multiple property listing

The Immaculate Heart of Mary Church is located on the southeast corner of Washington and 9th Streets and faces north onto East Washington Street. The site is characterized by concrete and asphalt surfaces and tree lined sidewalks. A rectory, built ca. 1930, is located to the east of the church, but is not a part of the nominated property.

The Immaculate Heart of Mary Church is a rectangular, three-story building of brick construction. The building is divided into six vertical bays along the sanctuary walls. It measures 150 x 50 feet and has a gable roof. It has a concrete foundation. The walls are sheathed with stucco.

The exterior of the building is distinguished by a symmetrical facade dominated by twin bell towers. The stepped back, five story towers are topped by domed roofs with crosses. The walls at each level are penetrated by round arched openings framed in either pilastered panels or corner buttresses. The towers frame a three story gable wall recessed behind an arcaded balcony. A large rose window with corbelled hood dominates the second level. The entrance is recessed below the balcony and accessed through a arched vestibule that is framed by decorative pilasters. The gable wall is detailed with deep brick corbelling at the rakes. Tall, arched sanctuary windows are located between pilasters and are infilled with stucco panels.

Alterations are limited to the infilled windows.

Statement of Significance

The Immaculate Heart of Mary Church is significant under Criteria C in the area of Significance of Architecture. Built in 1928, the Immaculate Heart of Mary Church is a good local example of the Second Renaissance Revival architectural style with North Italian mode influences and therefore represents the historic context "Religious Architecture in Phoenix, 1910-1942." While its architect is unknown, the building is a good illustration of the European Traditional property type. The building possess the important characteristics of the property type, specifically the embodiment of a stylistic idea based on the European traditions of religious architecture.

The Immaculate Heart of Mary Church represents the largest local example of the stylistic fusion of the North Italian mode and Second Renaissance Revival styles in Phoenix' religious architecture. The three story facade is flanked by twin bell towers providing a strong symmetrical image. Characteristic North Italian elements dominate the facade, including elaborate brick corbelling at the large roof gable, extensive use of round arch window and door openings, and a large central rose window at the upper level. Typical features of the Second Renaissance Revival Style include the second level balcony with recessed central entry below accentuated by a two story arched opening.
