Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

City Creek Canyon Historic District lies at the mouth of City Creek Canyon in a gully between the Capitol Hill area on the west and the Avenues area on the east. It starts near Third Avenue on the south and continues to the entrance to the canyon on the north. The district includes the slopes of the canyon up to Bonneville Boulevard.

Originally City Creek ran down the center of the area. The banks of the stream were covered with grass and weeds, except in those areas where the ground was cleared to build industrial mills. In 1910 the creek was put underground partway through the mouth of the canyon. The creek now flows over and under bridges, to add to the beauty of the Memory Grove. After it reaches the end of the park, the water is piped underground.

Of the approximately eighty acres in the district, two-thirds of the area is in Memory Grove and the two small parks south in the center of Canyon Road. Memory Grove contains several war memorials that were built between 1924 and 1942. In addition some of the weapons of the various wars have been placed in the park.

The district also includes a small residential area in the mouth of the canyon. Of the fifty-two structures, there are six landmarks, thirty-five contributory sites and seven non-contributory buildings. The six landmark sites include: 1) the Volunteer Fireman Hall or Ottinger Hall which is listed on the National Register, 2) the Minerva Snow home which is on the Utah State Register and represents late pioneer styling, 3) the Hermann Anderson house which is an excellent example of Eastlake Victorian, 4) the Heleman Pratt Franklin Richards Snow house which is an example of French Second Empire architecture and was owned by Snow, a leading Salt Lake businessman, 5) the Blair-Alt house which is a good example of early Victorian architecture in Utah and the 6) Mathoni Pratt-Orson F. Whitney house which was owned by Whitney, and LDS Church apostle and historian, for about twenty years.

Most of the homes in the area are constructed of brick and are one or two stories high. The landmarks and most of the period houses are in excellent condition, however, some of the contributory buildings have been altered so much that it is impossible to determine the original style or materials. The non-contributory buildings represent the period of time that they were built between 1930 and 1970 and are not in sympathy with the historical styles.

The area had mainly single family residences in it until about 1916 when Samuel G. Spencer built several duplexes in the area. Since then other multi-family buildings have been added to the area and some of the large single family houses have been divided into apartments.

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The houses represent a variety of architectural styles which are typical in Salt Lake. The homes built in the 1880's are pioneer vernacular and early Victorian styles. The 1890 houses are vernacular with elements of Victorian Italianate and Eastlake Victorian.

The majority of the houses were built between 1900-1920. The earlier homes in this period were victorian. Later a number of styles were taken from the house pattern books. During the 1910's and 1920's the majority of the houses built in the area were bungalows.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

City Creek Canyon is significant as a large, open park area near the center of Salt Lake City. The first park in the city to take advantage of existing natural terrain, the park is defined by the edges of the shallow canyon, which separates the Capitol Hill area from the Avenues. The park documents the efforts of city improvement groups, part of a national movement that saw the organization of such federations as the American Civic Association, devoted to the promotion of civic improvement and city planning. Part of the park includes Memory Grove, a memorial park created after World War I.

Because of the strong geographic boundaries of the canyon, a small group of residences are popularly associated with the canyon area and are included in the historic district. Replacing earlier homes built in the area, the houses were built in styles typical of the period from 1880 from 1920. They include residences of the families of Mormon apostles Erastus Snow and Parley P. Pratt, and several other prominent Mormon Church leaders.

Towards the end of the nineteenth century, the cities in the United States were overcrowded with immigrants and farmers who had moved into the urban centers hoping to find a better way of life. Most of the newcomers were crowded into low rental slum areas. During the 1880's and 1890's, Americans became aware of the problems that people faced in cities and social reform movements developed. Several solutions to urban problems were tried including Jane Addams' settlement houses, an increased interest in social work because of the writings of the "muckrakers" and attempts to end the control of the city bosses. Another expression of this type of reform was the development of parks in cities. Those people who supported parks argued that open spaces would help "civilize" the new residents who were coming into the area. Parks and city planning in general received great impetus from the World Columbian Exposition in Chicago in 1893. 1

Salt Lake faced many of the same problems that the rest of the nation was dealing with at the turn of the century. The city grew rapidly during that time and the population of the area doubled between 1900 and 1920. The city council was probably aware of the attempts in other areas to correct the problems of urbanization and in 1902 suggested that park areas be created in the City Creek Canyon area.

The area that the city proposed for the park was one of the areas where the Mormons first camped when they came to the valley in 1847. They selected this area because City Creek provided a good source of water for drinking and irrigating. In 1857 the area at the mouth of the canyon was deeded by the

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territorial legislature to Brigham Young. He used the creek to power a sawmill and a flour mill. The Relief Society's silk industry also had a plant in the area. 3

In the 1860's and 1870's Brigham Young gave and sold sections of the area to members of his family and to his friends. Several of these people built houses in the lower section of the canyon mouth, probably because the canyon was wider at that point. The upper section of the canyon area remained undeveloped because it was narrower and more difficult to reach. P.J. Moran, a construction firm, and the city water works were developed in this area.

The city acquired the upper section of the canyon in 1902 when a Mrs. Young sold some property in the canyon to the city. That same year the city council passed a resolution suggesting that the canyon be made into a park because it was a natural site for recreation and there was no park in the area. The council also voted to ask the city engineer to straighten the channel of City Creek and build a sixty-six foot road between State Street and Canyon Road. The park would be called City Creek Park and it would be open for the use of the citizens of Salt Lake.

Although the city passed the resolution to create the park in 1902 and similar suggestions were made during the next few years, the first improvements were not made until 1914. At that time some trees were planted by the mayor. The major developments in the park did not come until after World War I, however. At that time the Service Star Legion, a group of women whose sons had served during World War I, asked the city if the area could be set aside as a memorial to those who died during the war. A similar park had been made in Baltimore in 1919 by the Legion. The city agreed to the proposal, and the area was dedicated as a memorial park in 1924. Since then a number of monuments have been added and it is now a memorial to all men and women who lost their lives in defense of their country.

South of Memory Grove there are two small green areas in the center of Canyon Raod. Originally Canyon Raod had been built in two sections, with one side on each side of the City Creek. In 1909 the city decided to put the creek underground to protect the water supply and to prevent accidental drownings in the creek. About that time the residents of the area petitioned the city to make the creek bed that was being filled in into park areas. By 1912 a small formal park had been completed on the strip between 3rd and 4th Avenue and a green area was constructed in the park area above 4th Avenue. Il

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Today Memory Grove and the small Canyon Road parks are unique in Salt Iake City and very unusual for downtown settings in large cities. The parks are within a few blocks of the downtown shopping center, yet since they are set in the mouth of a canyon, they are isolated from the bustle of city life. People from all walks of life use the park to escape from their daily routines.

The district also contains fifty-two residences, of which there are six landmarks, thirty-five contributory and seven non-contributory houses.

In the 1860's and 1870's, Brigham Young started to divide his property in the area. Much of it went to his children who later sold it to Salt Lake residents. The first homes were built in the area in the 1880's. In 1880 Helaman Pratt, a son of Parley P. Pratt, acquired some property from J.C. Kinsberry, who owned a mill in the area. Pratt built a house in the area that is still standing. In the early 1890's Franklin Richards Snow, a son of Erastus Snow, bought the house. Snow was instrumental in forming the Consolidated Wagon and Machinery Company, a leading Salt Lake City business, and he later became an investment broker. His sons and sons-in-law were among those that built other houses in the Canyon Road Subdivision.

Snow waw born in Salt Lake in 1854 and his family moved to St. George in 1862. In 1888 he came to Salt Lake and started the Consolidated Implement Company with his brother George H. Snow. He served as secretary and treasurer of the company and the Consolidated Wagon and Machine Company. He later became an investment oficer.

Snow was an active member of he Mormon Church. He was the frst stake superintendent of religion classes and on the High Council. He was also a counselor to the stake president, Richard W. Young.

Later Pratt's brothers, Mathoni and Parley P. Pratt, Jr. also built in the area. Mathoni built his house in 1887 and it is still standing. Orson F. Whitney, an assistant LDS Church Historian, bishop, and Mormon Apostle, bought his home in 1905. Whitney is also remembered for his three volume <u>History of Utah</u>. Parley P. Pratt Jr.'s home has been replaced by an apartment building, but two small houses that his widow, Brigamenia, built are still standing.

Another pioneer who lived in the area was Erastus Snow, one of the first members of Brigham Young's party to enter the Great Salt Lake Valley in 1847. Snow lived in St. George for most of his life. Erastus Snow was a polygamist and in 1888 he built the house on Canyon Road for his second wife, Minerva. Snow died in the house that same year.

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One of the most unusual sites in the area is Ottinger Hall. The hall was built in 1900 by the Volunteer Fireman Association and is listed on the National Register.

The houses in the City Creek Canyon Historic District are similar to the houses built in the Avenues and in Capitol Hill. The majority of them were built between 1880-1919 and are similar to the houses built in Salt Lake during that period.

The four houses that were built in the 1880s are mainly high pioneer and early Victorian style. The Minerva Snow house is a high style pioneer architectural plan while the Blair-Alt home which was built during the same period of time represents early Victorian style. Five houses were added to the area during the 1890s. They are mainly vernacular with some elements of Italianate and Eastlake. The Hermann Anderson house is one of the best examples of Eastlake ornament in Salt Lake City.

The majority of the homes in the district were built between 1900-1920 which was the time that Salt Lake was experiencing a great deal of growth. In the 1910s bungalows and pattern book houses were constructed. The six homes built in the 1920s were bungalows, influenced by Tudor and Prairie styles.

The City Creek Canyon Historic District is a large park area with a small residential section at the south end. The parks and the homes document an important era of city growth and civic improvement.

WAR MEMORIAL

The circular classic styled memorial is composed of eight peripteral doric columns rendered in granite. The colonade supports a circular entablature composed of an architrave, wide frieze and cornice, above which is found a carved crown molding rendered in a floral motif. The entablature supports no dome allowing light to penetrate to the central interior of the monument via the round opening which the entablature forms. The colonade rests on a round three-stepped base of granite.

The central focal point of the monument is a centrally located octagonal shaft which supports an urn. Around the flat sides of the shaft are bronze plaques bearing the names of war dead. Radiating out from the base of the shaft is a star form composed of random shapes of marble set into the floor.

MEMORIAL HOUSE

The former stable building, currently remodeled into a meeting reception hall has a floor plan composed of two bays intersecting at right angles. A one-story gable-roofed bay runs roughly north to south, intersecting a two-story gable roofed house running east and west On the west or rear of these structures is attached a lean-to shed roofed structure which runs the full length of the building. Entry to the structure is gained via a centrally located doorway placed in a three bay gable end facade of the two-story structure. The double door entry has classic decoration, rendered in wood. Having a broken scroll pediment which culminates with sweeping scrolls. Within the gap formed by the broken pediment is placed a hanging light fixture. The pediment is supported on either side of the recessed paneled doors by double engaged pilasters. Paneling runs from the pediment up to the base of the

Memory Grove is significant as an example of memorial parks built in the United States following World War I. It is a sacred memorial spot of the people of Salt Lake City.

HISTORY: When the Mormon pioneers came to Utah, one of the first organized settlements was at the mouth of City Creek Canyon because there was a good water supply there. Later on one of the first grist mills built by Brigham Young, the Sudbury Flour Mill, was constructed there. The P.J. Morgan Construction Company and the city waterworks department also operated from this area. The first plans for a park were made in 1902 and in 1914 monies were allotted for the City Creek Canyon Park.

The Service Star Legion was organized after World War I as a patriotic organization for women who had blood relatives who served in the war. The first chapter was incorporated in 1920 in Maryland. At a convention in Baltimore in 1919, the first memory trees in honor of those who died during the war were planted in Draid Park. Following these events, chapters of Service Star Legion spread throughout the nation and similar "living memorial" groves became a national project of the organization.

The Salt Lake Chapter was organized January 2, 1920, and at an April meeting, the Legion voted to ask the City Commission of the mouth of City Creek Canyon could be set apart for a memorial park. Mrs. Clesson S. Kinney, who had made the motion, was aksed to be the chairman for the project. Mrs. E.O. Howard was also on the committee and played an important role in the development of the park. Her son, Captain James B. Austin, had died in World War I.⁸ The City agreed to set aside twenty acres

second story window sill. Windows in this bay are side hinged on the right and left each vertical sash eight lites, two lites wide. The central second level sash contains 12 lites and is hinged on the left. Above this window is a brick arch with keystone. All windows have wood shutters having a scroll saw cut vertical floral design cut into their upper panels with protruding diagonal cross bracing in the lower portions.

Above the arched central window in the upper portion of the gable end is a small bulls eye window. The gable end of the roof has a decorative cornice with return. A dentil course forms part of the moulding.

The north to south one-story bay has gently sloping gable roof with round topped dormers having six over six sashes. Seven dormers are set in alignment above seven double door openings with flat classic pediments. The south gable end of this bay has a central chimney. The rear lean-to structure currently houses a solarium-type meeting area. The building is constructed of load bearing brick walls stuccoed.

MEDITATION CHAPEL

The Meditation Chapel somewhat resembles a Greek temple such as the temple of Nike Apteros in Athens. Having a tetraprostyle front with an inner portico or pronaos, from which entry is gained into the Chapel or Naos via a set of bronze rectangular sculptural doors.

The structure is rectangular measuring 16 feet by 28 feet. The construction medium is reinforced concrete covered with striated Georgian Marble ranging in color from pink to orange. The fluted ionic columns are monolithic marble having exceptional color and graining. The columns support an architrave frieze and cornice having no pediment but supporting a standing seam hipped copper roof.

The interior of the monument is surfaced in marble, the walls are finished in Italian Botticino and the floor is laid in mosaic form composed of French and Italian marbles. The view into the interior is blocked by a delicately carved and inscribed marble bench seat having a tall straight back. The bench faces to the back or east end of the chapel where a marble chancel rail extends across the front of a white marble wall on which the poem "Immortality" is inscribed in gold lettering.

On either side of the chapel are two stained glass windows set side by side divided by a flat column. These windows being of exceptional quality and design depict a soldier, sailor, marine and army soldier.

from the entrance to the canyon to the brick tank. The park was named City Creek and plans were made to plant trees on Arbor Day 1920.9

In 1924 the Gold Star Legion asked that the park be dedicated to the dead soldiers of World War I. It was dedicated as a memorial on June 27, 1924 at a national convention of the Service Star Legion. Mrs. E. O. Howard, chairman of the committee in charge of the park, unveiled a tablet engraved with the names of those approximately 700 men who died in the war. This monument set behind where the pagoda now stands. It was designed by Walter I. Cooper and constructed by H. W. Baum.10

Utah played an important role in the service of the United States during World War I. The 21,000 men and 100 women served in the army, navy, marine corps and Red Cross. Utahns served in the 91st Division of the Wild West Division. The 362nd infantry in that division was called the Utah regiment. The 145 artillery was made up of men from the Utah National Guard or veterans of the Spanish American War. Memory Grove was dedicated to the 665 men who died during the war.ll

MEMORIALS - PAGODA:

The first structure built on the park was the marble pagoda near the entrance gate to the park. The marble came from a Vermont quarry that also furnished the marble for the Lincoln Memorial. The bronze urn inside was added in 1932.

SHAFT:

The second monument added was a tall gray granite shaft surrounded by a circular bench and a sun dial. It was erected by the 145 field artillery and dedicated in 1927.

GERMAN CANNON:

Between these two monuments the Argone Chapter Number Two, of the Disabled Veterans of the World War, placed a 177 millimeter German field gun. It was dedicated in 1926.12

MEMORIAL HOUSE:

In 1926 the city waterworks turned an old barn that had been used as a stable and tool shed to the Service Star Legion to be used as a home for the organization. Hyrum D. Pope and Harold W. Burton, architects for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, and Howard J. McKean, a Salt Lake contractor, donated their services to work on the home. In addition some of the lumber was given to the project. The house cost approximately \$12,000; and of that, \$10,000 was appropriated by the state. The Service Star Legion could use the building for their meetings and for other purposes approved by the House Committee. 13

There has been some remodeling on the house. In 1953 it was painted and a new heating plant and stairway added to the interior. An enclosed patio was added onto the rear of the building. The building was painted in 1976 as part of the Bicentennial program.

GOLD STAR HILL:

The Gold Star Hill was dedicated in 1934. Members of the Gold Star Mothers, women who lost sons during World War I, donated trees and small plaques for the hill and Mrs. E. O. Howard gave the shrubs and a large plaque. 15

MEDITATION CHAPEL:

Following World War II, Mr. and Mrs. Ross Beason offered to build a memorial to their son and other Utah sons who died in the war. Their son, Ross Beason, Jr.'s plane had been shot down off the coast of Italy. Mr. Beason had owned a financial house in Salt Lake from 1922-1932. Although he no longer lived in the state, he felt Utah was the appropriate place for the memorial.

The Meditation Chapel was designed by Paul Owan Davis, a Los Angeles architect. Taylor Wooley of Salt Lake City was the resident architect. The building was constructed of concrete and Italian marble. Mark B. Garff and Company contracted to do the labor and E. W. Hardy installed the marble. J. W. Askee was the superintendent of construction. Markers were placed aroung the memorial in honor of those Utah born citizens who died during World War II and when bodies were not recovered. The chapel was dedicated on July 24, 1948.16

PUBLIC FACILITIES:

The final structure added to the park was built in 1962. It is a cement and brick structure that houses the restroom and an office for the caretaker. 17

Since the park was dedicated, various organizations have donated structures and trees to the grove. Some of the Rotary Club furnished steps from the park to the Capitol and the County Commission provided funds to terrace the Capitol and hill. The Kawanis Club erected a granite bridge to the granite shaft. The war mothers donated marble benches that were placed throughout the park. The course of the stream was backed up. The stream flows over five water falls and under three-foot bridges and then forms a lake, the Harbor of Beauty. The plaque and marble bench on the lake were donated by the Mother Harbor Club in memory of the sailors who died in service of their country. 18

Since the park is a memorial to all who died in the war in service of their country, a tank from the Vietnam era has been placed in the park. In addition, in the last few years, the United Veterans Council has donated a railroad box car and a flag pole to the park. 19

The Horizon Committee selected the Memory Grove as a special bicentennial project. They have repainted memorial house and cleaned up the walks. They also plan to build a Perception Garden in the Grove which will have special effects to help the blind appreciate the garden. The Committee also plans to improve the steps to the Capitol and a path to the Avenues.


The Service Star Legion has used the Memory Grove for Memorial Day services. They also sponsored Sunset Concerts there for the families of those who died in the war. At one of the services in 1950 a plaque was placed in front of the Memorial House and several portraits were hung in the hall. Memorial House is now run by the Service Star Legion and is used for receptions, weddings, and club meetings. The park belongs to the city and is maintained by the Park Department and Service Star Legion.

Snow was a member of the Salt Lake Stock Exchange for twenty-five years and for a few years was a member of the board of directors. He also helped develop mines in the Alta area. He was Secretary and Treasurer of Kimball Sign Company and a member of Snow and Cromar Stock Brokers.

Albert White had his own contracting firm and built or remodeled many homes and churches in Salt Lake.

Spencer grew up in Pleasant Grove. In 1903 he moved to Salt Lake City where he was the foreman of the Salt Lake Knitting Works and manager of the Ensign Knitting Company. He later opened a small grocery store on State Street and then moved the business next to this house. He started making popcorn in 1904 and he had a small factory behind his store. He built and rented small apartments later in his life.

Spencer, a member of the LDS Church, wrote pamphlets and was president of the Northern State Mission from 1895-1896.

Spencer was a polygamist and had four wives. After he married his fourth wife, his third wife, Elizabeth Cable Spencer, lived in this house.

As a member of the Mormon Church, Taylor served a mission to the Southern States, worked in the Sunday School and was a temple ordinance worker.

He married Ida Whipple June 26, 1895. They had six sons and daughters. He died in 1952.

During his later life, he moved to Los Angeles. In 1903-1904 Orson F. Whitney bought this house from Pratt. Whitney was a member of the Quorum of the Twelve Apostles. obituary called him a "poet, philosopher, historian, orator, defender and protagonist of

Whitney was born in Salt Lake in 1855. He was the son of Horace K. Whitney. Orson F. Whitney served three missions for the LDS Church. He served a mission to the Eastern States from 1876-1878, a mission to Great Britain from 1881-1883, and a mission to Europe from 1921-1922 as mission president.

Whitney worked as city editor of the <u>Deseret News</u>. He also was an assistant Church historian He was involved in city government serving as city treasurer and on the city council. He was the author of several biographies and histories including a three volume History of

Utah. Whitney was the bishop of the Eighteenth Ward for twenty-eight years. In 1906, he was called to be an apostle, and he served in that capacity until his death in 1931. Whitney lived in this home until 1923.



Erastus Snow, an early Utah pioneer and LDS Church apostle, built this home for his second wife, Minerva White. She was a close friend of his first wife, Artimesia Beman. The house, which was built in 1888, is a good example of pre-Victorian high styled pioneer architecture.

Minerva Snow was born in Massachusetts in 1822. She and her mother joined the Mormon Church when Minerva was eighteen years old. She married Erastus Snow on April 2, 1844. She came to Salt Lake Valley in 1848. In 1861, she went to Southern Utah with her husband and families. She served in the Relief Society in St. George.

She moved to Salt Lake and Snow built this house for her. She was a counselor in the Relief Society in the Eighteenth ward while she lived here.

Erastus Snow-came to Salt Lake in 1888 and stayed in this house. He was living here when he died May 27, 1888. Shortly after her husband's death, Snow was called to go to Manti to work in the temple.

Franklin Richards Snow, son of Erastus and Artimesia Beman, lived in this home for a number of years until his home on the other side of Canyon Road was finished.

This home is on the Utah State Register.

This 1880 house is one of the best examples of French Second Empire architecture in Salt Lake. Helaman Pratt, the original owner, was a colonizer in several areas in Later the house belonged to Franklin Richard Snow, a leading Salt Lake businessman.

This was one of the first homes in the City Creek area. It was built before Canyon Road came through so it faced downtown rather than on to a road like the rest of the houses.

Helaman Pratt, the original owner of this house, was born in Mt. Pisgah in 1847 as the Mormons were crossing the plains. He helped settle the Muddy River mission in Arizona and the Sevier area. He served two missions to Mexico, one in 1875 and one in 1883. He was made president of the mission in 1884. Pratt spent the rest of his life after there as a leader of the LDS Church in the Mormon colonies in Mexico.

Pratt acquired the property in City Creek in 1880 from Joseph L. Kinsburg wbo ran a mill in the area. Pratt lived in the house from 1880 until he went on his mission in 1883.

In the early 1890's Pratt agreed to sell the house to Franklin Richard Snow, a son of Erastus and Artimesia Beman Snow. Snow had also served a mission to Mexico in 1883 and he might have met Pratt there.

The Herman Holstain Anderson house is one of the best examples of Eastlake detailings in the State of Utah. Anderson was an architect in Salt Lake City.

Anderson was born May 17, 1862, in Denmark. He and his mother joined the Mormon Church and came to Utah in 1881. Anderson worked as a laborer and carpenter in Salt Lake. He was a self-styled builder-architect and designed at least fiftynine homes and buildings between 1891-1893. He designed the Sears and Irving Building, the Equil Coop Building, and the David Lennox Murdock home at 73 G Street (National Register site).

Anderson attended the 18th ward. He died in 1897. The house remained in the family and is now owned by a grandaughter.

Paul was born January 20, 1863. His father, James Paul, was a master woodmaker and his mother, Elizabeth Evans Paul, was a social worker. Paul graduated from the University of Utah with a bachelor's degree in 1880 and a masters in 1898. He graduated from Wesleyan College of Illinois with a Ph. D. in 1905.

Paul taught at the University of Utah from 1880-1889. He moved to Logan and was president of Brigham Young College from 1891-1894 and president of the Utah State Agricultural College from 1895-1897. In 1897, he was called on a mission to England. When he returned in 1899, he became president of the Latter-Day Saint College and the LDS Business College. He was president from 1899-1906. In 1900, he was also an assistant editor for the Deseret News. In 1906, he became a professor of natural science at the University of Utah and he taught there from 1909-1929.

Paul lived in this home from 1905-1909 when he was president of the LDS College.

The two-story Victorian building is very picturesque with a stepped false facade with louvered belfry. There is a Roman arched entry with a fanlight transom. The other bays are segmented with rust brick voussoirs. The brick is hand painted. gabled with a Dutch hip or Jerkin head type.

Ottinger Hall, a two-story brick structure, with a wood shingle roof, was dedicated February 22, 1900. It is rectangular in shape, originally about 24 ft. by 39 ft., but with a leanto kitchen added later to the north side. A bell tower centered on the roof houses the original bell reputed to be Utah's oldest. The architect for the building is unknown, but very probably it was designed by members of the Veterans Volunteer firemen's Association, who constructed it. Funds were raised through donation, labor, concerts, and rumage sales by the members of the Association.

At present the structure is in fair condition only. The original construction was mediocre; however, there is no question about the stability and salvage potential. It houses many pioneer fire fighting relics of importance, including the first fire engine built in Utah, designed and constructed in 1853 under the direction of Jesse C. Little, the colonies first "official" fire chief. Also, the building houses one of the "hose carts" brought west by Johnston's Army in 1858.

The building was constructed originally as a social hall for members of the Association and their families. It has been used for that purpose continually. As a unit, the hall and its relics represent and present the story of the development of a fire fighting department in Salt Lake City. Its preservation is important to retaining and telling that story.

McAllister, Charles M. Donaldson, and George M. Ottinger in 1876. In 1860 a new organization establiehd Deseret Engine company, number one (later changed

to Eagle No. 1) and Deseret Hook and Ladder Company number one. Other volunteer companies were also added. The horsedrawn engines and volunteers were unable to "handle a major in June 1883. Apparently as a result of this, Salt Lake City elected to establish a paid fire department, beginning October 1, 1883. Its first Chief was George M. Ottinger.

Under the leadership of Ottinger, the Veterans Volunteer Fireman's Assocation was organized in 1890. Ten years later they had their meeting and social hall. Ottinger remained president until his death in 1917. In 1912 the Ladies Auxillary was organized.

Ottinger was not only a firefighter, but an artist of note, and especially appreciated by local people--his self portrait and other paintings hang in the hall today. He painted a sign displaying the volunteers slogan: "We aim to aid and work to save." now at the hall.

Since Ottinger Hall contains both the traditions and paraphernalia of the Volunteer firemen of early Salt Lake City, its preservation provides an important link between the past, for this extremely important development, and today's urban society.

Erastus Snow, an early Utah pioneer and LDS Church apostle, built this home for his second wife, Minerva White. She was a close friend of his first wife, Artimesia Beman. The house, which was built in 1888, is a good example of pre-Victorian high styled pioneer architecture.

Minerva Snow was born in Massachusetts in 1822. She and her mother joined the Mormon Church when Minerva was eighteen years old. She married Erastus Snow on April 2, 1844. She came to Salt Lake Valley in 1848. In 1861, she went to Southern Utah with her husband and families. She served in the Relief Society in St. George.

\$he moved to Salt Lake and Snow built this house for her. She was a counselor in the Relief Society in the Eighteenth ward while she lived here.

Erastus Snow came to Salt Lake in 1888 and stayed in this house. He was living here when he died May 27, 1888. Shortly after her husband's death, Snow was called to go to Manti to work in the temple.

Franklin Richards Snow, son of Erastus and Artimesia Beman, lived in this home for a number of years until his home on the other side of Canyon Road was finished.

This home is on the Utah State Register.

The Herman Holstain Anderson house is one of the best examples of Eastlake detailings in the State of Utah. Anderson was an architect in Salt Lake City.

Anderson was born May 17, 1862, in Denmark. He and his mother joined the Mormon Church and came to Utah in 1881. Anderson worked as a laborer and carpenter in Salt Lake. He was a self-styled builden-architect and designed at least fiftynine homes and buildings between 1891-1893. He designed the Sears and Irving Building, the Equil Coop Building, and the David Lennox Murdock home at 73 G Street (National Register site).







After he returned home from an LDS mission to Holland, he worked for Utah-Idaho Sugar. In 1913 he formed a brokerage firm with Don & Ray. Whitney was secretarytresurer for the firm. He was also secretary of the Utah State Broker Association and nationally-known food manufacturing broker.

Whitney was first counselor to Thomas A. Clawson, the bishop of the Eighteenth ward, for thirty-two years.

This 1887 Victorian house is typical of the pattern book designs used during this period of time in Salt Lake. It is significant because Orson F. Whitney, Mormon apostle and Utah historian, lived here from 1905 to 1923. Whitney is best known for his three volume history of Utah.

Mathoni W. Pratt, the original owner, was the youngest son of Parley P. Pratt. He was the bishop of the Pratt Ward in Idaho. He lived in Salt Lake for forty years and worked as a salesman. During his later life, he moved to Los Angeles. In 1903-1904 Orson F. Whitney bought this house from Pratt. Whitney was a member of the Quorum of the Twelve Apostles. obituary called him a "poet, philosopher, historian, orator, defender and protagonist of religion."

Whitney was born in Salt Lake in 1855. He was the son of Horace K. Whitney. Orson F. Whitney served three missions for the LDS Church. He served a mission to the Eastern States from 1876-1878, a mission to Great Britain from 1881-1883, and a mission to Europe from 1921-1922 as mission president.

Whitney worked as city editor of the <u>Deseret News</u>. He also was an assistant Church historian He was involved in city government serving as city treasurer and on the city council. He was the author of several biographies and histories including a three volume <u>History of Utah</u>. Whitney was the bishop of the Eighteenth Ward for twenty-eight years. In 1906, he was called to be an apostle, and he served in that capacity until his death in 1931. Whitney lived in this home until 1923.

Paul taught at the University of Utah from 1880-1889. He moved to Logan and was president of Brigham Young College from 1891-1894 and president of the Utah State Agricultural College from 1895-1897. In 1897, he was called on a mission to England. When he returned in 1899, he became president of the Latter-Day Saint College and the LDS Business College. He was president from 1899-1906. In 1900, he was also an assistant editor for the Deseret News. In 1906, he became a professor of natural science at the University of Utah and he taught there from 1909-1929.





This 1880 house is one of the best examples of French Second Empire architecture in Salt Lake. Helaman Pratt, the original owner, was a colonizer in several areas in the West. Later the house belonged to Franklin Richard Snow, a leading Salt Lake businessman.

This was one of the first homes in the City Creek area. It was built before Canyon Road came through so it faced downtown rather than on to a road like the rest of the houses.

Helaman Pratt, the original owner of this house, was born in Mt. Pisgah in 1847 as the Mormons were crossing the plains. He helped settle the Muddy River mission in Arizona and the Sevier area. He served two missions to Mexico, one in 1875 and one in 1883. He was made president of the mission in 1884. Pratt spent the rest of his life after there as a leader of the LDS Church in the Mormon colonies in Mexico.


Pratt acquired the property in City Creek in 1880 from Joseph L. Kinsburg wbo ran a mill in the area. Pratt lived in the house from 1880 until he went on his mission in 1883.

In the early 1890's Pratt agreed to sell the house to Franklin Richard Snow, a son of Erastus and Artimesia Beman Snow. Snow had also served a mission to Mexico in 1883 and he might have met Pratt there.

Snow was a member of the Salt Lake Stock Exchange for twenty-five years and for a few years was a member of the board of directors. He also helped develop mines in the Alta area. He was Secretary and Treasurer of Kimball Sign Company and a member of Snow and Cromar Stock Brokers.

Albert White had his own contracting firm and built or remodeled many homes and churches in Salt Lake.

WAR MEMORIAL

The circular classic styled memorial is composed of eight peripteral doric columns rendered in granite. The colonade supports a circular entablature composed of an architrave, wide frieze and cornice, above which is found a carved crown molding rendered in a floral motif. The entablature supports no dome allowing light to penetrate to the central interior of the monument via the round opening which the entablature forms. The colonade rests on a round three-stepped base of granite.

The central focal point of the monument is a centrally located octagonal shaft which supports an urn. Around the flat sides of the shaft are bronze plaques bearing the names of war dead. Radiating out from the base of the shaft is a star form composed of random shapes of marble set into the floor.

MEMORIAL HOUSE

The former stable building, currently remodeled into a meeting reception hall has a floor plan composed of two bays intersecting at right angles. A one-story gable-roofed bay runs roughly north to south, intersecting a two-story gable roofed house running east and west On the west or rear of these structures is attached a lean-to shed roofed structure which runs the full length of the building. Entry to the structure is gained via a centrally located doorway placed in a three bay gable end facade of the two-story structure. The double door entry has classic decoration, rendered in wood. Having a broken scroll pediment which culminates with sweeping scrolls. Within the gap formed by the broken pediment is placed a hanging light fixture. The pediment is supported on either side of the recessed paneled doors by double engaged pilasters. Paneling runs from the pediment up to the base of the

Memory Grove is significant as an example of memorial parks built in the United States following World War I. It is a sacred memorial spot of the people of Salt Lake City.

HISTORY: When the Mormon pioneers came to Utah, one of the first organized settlements was at the mouth of City Creek Canyon because there was a good water supply there. Later on one of the first grist mills built by Brigham Young, the Sudbury Flour Mill, was constructed there. The P.J. Morgan Construction Company and the city waterworks department also operatec from this area. The first plans for a park were made in 1902 and in 1914 monies were allotted for the City Creek Canyon Park.

The Service Star Legion was organized after World War I as a patriotic organization for women who had blood relatives who served in the war. The first chapter was incorporated in 1920 in Maryland.⁵ At a convention in Baltimore in 1919, the first memory trees in honor of those who died during the war were planted in Draid Park. Following these events, chapters of Service Star Legion spread throughout the nation and similar "living memorial" groves became a national project of the organization.6

The Salt Lake Chapter was organized January 2, 1920, and at an April meeting, the Legion voted to ask the City Commission of th mouth of City Creek Canyon could be set apart for a memorial park. Mrs. Clesson S. Kinney, who had made the motion, was aksed to be the chairman for the project. Mrs. E.O. Howard was also on the committee and played an important role in the development of the park. Her son, Captain James B. Austin, had died in World War I.8 City agreed to set aside twenty acres

second story window sill. Windows in this bay are side hinged on the right and left each vertical sash eight lites, two lites wide. The central second level sash contains 12 lites and is hinged on the left. Above this window is a brick arch with keystone. All windows have wood shutters having a scroll saw cut vertical floral design cut into their upper panels with protruding diagonal cross bracing in the lower portions.

Above the arched central window in the upper portion of the gable end is a small bulls eye window. The gable end of the roof has a decorative cornice with return. A dentil course forms part of the moulding.

The north to south one-story bay has gently sloping gable roof with round topped dormers having six over six sashes. Seven dormers are set in alignment above seven double door openings with flat classic pediments. The south gable end of this bay has a central chimney. The rear lean-to structure currently houses a solarium-type meeting area. The building is constructed of load bearing brick walls stuccoed.

MEDITATION CHAPEL

The Meditation Chapel somewhat resembles a Greek temple such as the temple of Nike Apteros in Athens. Having a tetraprostyle front with an inner portico or pronaos, from which entry is gained into the Chapel or Naos via a set of bronze rectangular sculptural doors.

The structure is rectangular measuring 16 feet by 28 feet. The construction medium is reinforced concrete covered with striated Georgian Marble ranging in color from pink to orange. The fluted ionic columns are monolithic marble having exceptional color and graining. The columns support an architrave frieze and cornice having no pediment but supporting a standing seam hipped copper roof.

The interior of the monument is surfaced in marble, the walls are finished in Italian Botticino and the floor is laid in mosaic form composed of French and Italian marbles. The view into the interior is blocked by a delicately carved and inscribed marble bench seat having a tall straight back. The bench faces to the back or east end of the chapel where a marble chancel rail extends across the front of a white marble wall on which the poem "Immortality" is inscribed in gold lettering.

On either side of the chapel are two stained glass windows set side by side divided by a flat column. These windows being of exceptional quality and design depict a soldier, sailor, marine and army soldier.



from the entrance to the canyon to the brick tank. The park was named City Creek and plans were made to plant trees on Arbor Day 1920.9

In 1924 the Gold Star Legion asked that the park be dedicated to the dead soldiers of World War I. It was dedicated as a memorial on June 27, 1924 at a national convention of the Service Star Legion. Mrs. E. O. Howard, chairman of the committee in charge of the park, unveiled a tablet engraved with the names of those approximately 700 men who died in the war. This monument set behind where the pagoda now stands. It was designed by Walter I. Cooper and constructed by H. W. Baum.10

Utah played an important role in the service of the United States during World War I. The 21,000 men and 100 women served in the army, navy, marine corps and Red Cross. Utahns served in the 91st Division of the Wild West Division. The 362nd infantry in that division was called the Utah regiment. The 145 artillery was made up of men from the Utah National Guard or veterans of the Spanish American War. Memory Grove was dedicated to the 665 men who died during the war. 11

MEMORIALS - PAGODA:

The first structure built on the park was the marble pagoda near the entrance gate to the park. The marble came from a Vermont quarry that also furnished the marble for the Lincoln Memorial. The bronze urn inside was added in 1932.

SHAFT:

The second monument added was a tall gray granite shaft surrounded by a circular bench and a sun dial. It was erected by the 145 field artillery and dedicated in 1927.

GERMAN CANNON:

Between these two monuments the Argone Chapter Number Two, of the Disabled Veterans of the World War, placed a 177 millimeter German field gun. It was dedicated in 1926.12

MEMORIAL HOUSE.

In 1926 the city waterworks turned an old barn that had been used as a stable and tool shed to the Service Star Legion to be used as a home for the organization. Hyrum D. Pope and Harold W. Burton, architects for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, and Howard J. McKean, a Salt Lake contractor, donated their services to work on the home. In addition some of the lumber was given to the project. The house cost approximately \$12,000; and of that, \$10,000 was appropriated by the state. The Service Star Legion could use the building for their meetings and for other purposes approved by the House Committee. 13

There has been some remodeling on the house. In 1953 it was painted and a new heating plant and stairway added to the interior. An enclosed patio was added onto the rear of the building. The building was painted in 1976 as part of the Bicentennial program.

GOLD STAR HILL:

The Gold Star Hill was dedicated in 1934. Members of the Gold Star Mothers, women who lost sons during World War I, donated trees and small plaques for the hill and Mrs. E. O. Howard gave the shrubs and a large plaque. 15

MEDITATION CHAPEL:

Following World War II, Mr. and Mrs. Ross Beason offered to build a memorial to their son and other Utah sons who died in the war. Their son, Ross Beason, Jr.'s plane had been shot down off the coast of Italy. Mr. Beason had owned a financial house in Salt Lake from 1922-1932. Although he no longer lived in the state, he felt Utah was the appropriate place for the memorial.

The Meditation Chapel was designed by Paul Owan Davis, a Los Angeles architect. Taylor Wooley of Salt Lake City was the resident architect. The building was constructed of concrete and Italian marble. Mark B. Garff and Company contracted to do the labor and E. W. Hardy installed the marble. J. W. Askee was the superintendent of construction. Markers were placed aroung the memorial in honor of those Utah born citizens who died during World War II and when bodies were not recovered. The chapel was dedicated on July 24, 1948.16

PUBLIC FACILITIES:

The final structure added to the park was built in 1962. It is a cement and brick structure that houses the restroom and an office for the caretaker. 17

Since the park was dedicated, various organizations have donated structures and trees to the grove. Some of the Rotary Club furnished steps from the park to the Capitol and the County Commission provided funds to terrace the Capitol and hill. The Kawanis Club erected a granite bridge to the granite shaft. The war mothers donated marble benches that were placed throughout the park. The course of the stream was backed up. The stream flows over five water falls and under three-foot bridges and then forms a lake, the Harbor of Beauty. The plaque and marble bench on the lake were donated by the Mother Harbor Club in memory of the sailors who died in service of their country. 18

Since the park is a memorial to all who died in the war in service of their country, a tank from the Vietnam era has been placed in the park. In addition, in the last few years, the United Veterans Council has donated a railroad box car and a flag pole to the park. 19

The Horizon Committee selected the Memory Grove as a special bicentennial project. They have repainted memorial house and cleaned up the walks. They also plan to build a Perception Garden in the Grove which will have special effects to help the blind appreciate the garden. The Committee also plans to improve the steps to the Capitol and a path to the Avenues.

The Service Star Legion has used the Memory Grove for Memorial Day services. They also sponsored Sunset Concerts there for the families of those who died in the war. At one of the services in 1950 a plaque was placed in front of the Memorial House and several portraits were hung in the hall. House is now run by the Service Star Legion and is used for receptions, weddings, and club meetings. The park belongs to the city and is maintained by the Park Department and Service Star Legion.
