Frog Hollow Road Bridge over a minor tributary of the South Branch of the Raritan River

Description

The Frog Hollow Road Bridge, identified by Hunterdon County as "T-9" (Photograph #1), is a single-arched, humpbacked, random rubble bridge approximately 12 feet long and 15 feet 6 inches wide. Most likely constructed between 1860 and 1873, the skew bridge carries a narrow rural, asphalt-paved road over a minor tributary of the South Branch of the Raritan River (Photograph #2). The crossing is located approximately 1,400 feet west of the intersection with Beavers Road in a steeply-sloped, wooded area. The bridge is in a rural setting with no nearby standing structures. The bridge, which is technically a culvert according to Federal Highway Administration definitions of spans less than 20 feet in length, continues to function in its original use as a vehicular bridge with only minor alterations to its original design. The bridge retains its integrity of location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling, and association. The stonework and pointing are intact and repointing is unobtrusive.

This segmental arch bridge is constructed of irregularly-sized rectangular stones joined by mortar. The uncoursed rubble granite and gneiss used to construct the bridge were likely quarried from the streambed or from the immediate surrounding area. The voussoirs and capstones were likely roughly dressed on site. The bridge span rises at its center and the approach roads maintain a low profile (Photographs #3 and #4), common features in stone arch bridges used to provide maximum stream clearance. The arch is approximately 14 feet long and 4 feet 6 inches high. The bridge's wingwalls extend laterally from the main body of the bridge. Flat capstones of random sizes top the parapet walls. The large voussoirs are not radially aligned and the resulting arch ring is indistinct, with intrados stones that randomly project either horizontally or vertically (Photographs #5 and #6).

The bridge crosses a stream that is nearly parallel to the road alignment, a situation that could require a large skew angle. The bridge's skew angle was kept to just twenty degrees through two construction methods. First, the roadway is slightly kinked to partially alleviate the skew angle. Second, the arch barrel was skewed during construction. The awkward angles that result from the skew are hidden in the rubble stone behind the flat plane of the face stones.

Statement of Significance

The Frog Hollow Road Bridge is significant under National Register Criterion C at the local and state levels because it embodies the distinctive characteristics of a type, period, and method of construction. Hunterdon County, New Jersey, with more than 100 surviving stone arch bridges, contains the largest concentration of stone bridges in North America (Boothby, et al.: ii). The Frog Hollow Road Bridge is also an excellent representative example of the local "Northern township style" of stone arch bridges as defined by Boothby, et al (Boothby, et al.: 22).

The modern network of smaller roads in Hunterdon County, including those in Tewksbury, was largely in place by the mid-nineteenth century. No documentary evidence has been located that can verify with certainty the bridge's date of construction or its builder, a situation that is common to bridges of this age and region. Freeholders' minutes of the period are inconclusive and no road returns exist for this route. However, it can be determined that Frog Hollow Road was laid out between 1860 and 1873, as is seen in county maps of the period. The community of Califon grew during the second half of the nineteenth century along the banks of the South Branch of the Raritan River and was the site of a bridge crossing by 1850. The High Bridge Branch of the Central Railroad of New Jersey linked the community to the main line of the Central Railroad at High Bridge to the south, and thus, became a destination for farmers sending their crops to market. The creation of a road through Tewksbury that linked Califon with Chester, an established community to the northeast, is indicative of Califon's growth during the nineteenth century. Califon became a separate municipality in 1918. Based on the appearance of the Frog Hollow Road Bridge and its method of construction, it appears likely that the extant bridge was the first bridge constructed on this route at this crossing.

In addition to its role in the regional transportation system, the Frog Hollow Road Bridge is a good representative example of a local bridge type. As one of approximately 100 stone arch bridges in the county, the Frog Hollow Road Bridge contains many of the features that are characteristic of stone arch bridge construction in Hunterdon County.

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The bridge typifies the "Northern township style" of stone arch bridges identified as common to Tewksbury, Lebanon, Alexandria, Holland and parts of Union, Readington, and Clinton Townships. The largest number of this type in the county is clustered in Tewksbury Township (Boothby, et al.: 22). This type has been described as being,

characterized by extraordinarily rough construction, being usually built of granite fieldstone, very roughly dressed. Voussoirs are seldom radially aligned and never cut on the intrados or extrados. The arch ring is indistinct, and the barrel is built of very rough, sharp pieces of stone laid on the centering and slushed with mortar backing. Bridges are built as close to the ground as the waterway permits, and approach roads are also kept on a low level, resulting in a characteristic humpback. This bridge style is exemplified by the pair of bridges T-8 and T-9 near the intersection of Frog Hollow Road and Beavers Road, and individually by the Bridge T-89, located on Guinea Hollow Road. Most of these bridges, and all three of the examples cited above, are slightly skewed with respect to the road alignment (Boothby, et al.: 22).

These Hunterdon County bridges "universally have cut stones on the arch faces only, and the barrels are filled with elongated random rubble stones, roughly parallel to the abutments, and filled with loose mortar apparently placed after all the stones are in place on the centering [arch]. [sic] (Boothby, et al.: 33)." The structures' exterior walls were laid first. In Tewksbury these walls were typically constructed of uncut stone except for the voussoirs, which were roughly dressed. In order to form the arch, a wood plank framework in a cylinder shape was constructed. Stone was laid on top of the framework to form the arch and mortar was laid between the stones. Rubble stone slushed with mortar was used to fill in the remainder of the bridge structure. The framework was removed once the mortar was set (Boothby, et al.: 33-34). In both design and method of construction, the Frog Hollow Road Bridge is representative of stone arch bridge construction in northern Hunterdon County and specifically Tewksbury Township during the second half of the nineteenth century and the first decade of the twentieth century.


