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**Description** The Battle of Dutton's Hill Monument is a simple marble obelisk approximately six feet tall and two feet wide at the base. The monument has a slender obelisk supported on a three tier base. The first portion of the base is a cubic structure that has an inscription carved on one face. The remaining two tiers are basically flat marble pieces each slightly bigger that the other. The small simple monument was placed over the graves of several Confederate soldiers that were killed in the battle.

**Statement of Significance** The Battle of Dutton's Hill Monument is eligible under Criterion A under the context of "Civil War Monuments in Kentucky, 1861-1935." This monument was erected with funds raised in Somerset and Pulaski County to honor the Confederate soldiers who were killed in the battle. No one is sure who is responsible for the creation of the monument, nor the exact date of its erection. However, local lore has it that sometime after the war an elderly man came looking for his son who he thought was killed in the Battle of Dutton's Hill. He began a collection to erect a monument, but died before raising the needed funds. The monument fund raising was completed by local women. This is a good example of the proerty type "obelisk."

**Verbal Boundary Description** - The monument whose boundaries form a circle with a radius of ten feet centered on the monument. It is located on a knoll known as Dutton's Hill, approximately one mile north of the intersection of KY 39 and US 80.

**Verbal Boundary Justification** - The area associated with the monument is restricted to the ground on which the monument sits and a small buffer around it. The setting outside such a restricted area is not seen as critically important to maintaining an integrity of association. Because the focus of the multiple property submissions is the significance of the monuments, their proposed area of listing will reflect that they have been considered by-and-large, in isolation from their surrounds.
