A 1914 description of the new City Hall in the <u>Tampa</u> <u>Tribune</u> stated, "The building is to be of classic design. On a framework of reinforced concrete, its exterior walls will be constructed of granite, brick and terra cotta. The building will cost the city approximately \$235,000."

The Tampa City Hall is truly eclectic in the sense that it borrows its components from several of the popular styles The building has a rusticated ground floor, of the period. a massive cornice as the crowning feature of the building, a low, invisible roof and a symmetrical elevation with a straight front on the upper portion, all of which are associated with the Renaissance Revival. In keeping with Beaux-Arts Classicism, the openings are set between columns and pilasters, there is figure sculpture in the round and in relief, a stone balustrade is located at the roofline and the podium is a series of advancing and receding planes. Characteristics of the Commercial Style are demonstrated in the fact that the character of the facade is derived from its fenestration, windows are regular in size and pattern, being grouped in three's throughout, piers and spandrels are flush and windows slightly recessed and there is an even balance between horizontal and vertical lines.

The building consists of a five-story tower resting on a three-story podium. The top of the tower is heavily corniced and bracketed and the vertical piers terminate in classical heads in low relief. The base of the tower has three round arched windows grouped on each of the four sides. is topped with a heavily bracketed Mansardic clock tower which has large urns at each corner of the base. The rusticated ground floor of the podium contains the main entrance to the building which is heavily ornamented and flanked by paired Doric columns. Above the door is a heraldic device of terra cotta bearing the seal of the City of Tampa. The Doric columns on the podium span two stories and are located between window groupings. They terminate in a bold architrave bearing the inscription CITY HALL. Above the architrave is a bracketed cornice and a stone balustrade between piers at the roofline. Bahama shades cover the ground floor windows.

The building has been in constant use as the Tampa City Hall since its construction in 1915. Through constant use and maintenance, the building is in excellent condition today. It occupies a corner lot at a busy intersection in downtown Tampa. In an effort to beautify the site, there are various native flora in box planters along the sidewalk and at the edge of the building. The structure with its plantings creates an almost oasis-like contrast to the modern steel and glass structures which surround it.

Completed in 1914 at a cost in excess of \$200,000, the Tampa City Hall was designed by the architectural firm of Bonfoey and Elliott. The architects were selected as the result of a competition and the contractors, McGueken and Hyer were selected to do the construction.

F. Leo-Elliott was one of Tampa's foremost architects in the early part of this century. He designed many of Tampa's most important downtown buildings, the YMCA, Centro Asturiano and the Masonic Temple, to name a few. He went into partnership with Bonfoey in 1908, but the partnership was dissolved at the outbreak of World War I.

The Tampa City Hall is the finest of Elliott's commercial-municipal structures. It is a tribute to his genius in that it successfully integrates characteristics of a number of styles which were popular into a cohesive, aesthetically pleasing and very functional whole. As previously stated, the structure with its landscaped sidewalks creates an almost oasis-like contrast to the modern concrete, steel and glass buildings which surround it.
