

## 7. Description

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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The South Solon Meeting House is an excellent example of a Gothic Revival church in a rural context. Built in 1842, the one-story church is of frame construction with gabled roof, central facade tower, and clapboard siding.

The symmetrical facade, which faces east, is three bays wide and contains twin entrances. These doorways each contain a slightly recessed single panelled door below a blind Gothic arch, seen above all bays throughout the building. The central facade bay is a 20/20/20 window. The small tower is square in plan with a shuttered aperture of Gothic form on each side. Above the tower is a pinnacled railing.

The sides of the church are three bays long, each bay consisting of a 20/20 window.

The interior of the church is well-preserved, its box-pews being wholly intact. In the 1950's students and faculty of the Skowhegan School of Painting and Sculpture executed a remarkable series of frescoes depicting Biblical themes.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The South Solon Meeting House of 1842 is significant as a remarkably well preserved example of a very early church building, taking its extremely remote location into consideration. Although simple in design, the architectural execution is remarkably detailed.

The interior of the building is completely intact from the high, stair approached pulpit to the box pews with their brass numbered doors. A particularly fascinating and unique feature is the fresco work which decorates all the wall and ceiling surfaces. These remarkable pieces of religious art were executed between 1952 and 1957 by artists from the prestigious Skowhegan School of Painting and Sculpture located nearby. Only the most talented artists across the country are admitted to this advanced academy where they receive instruction from the top rank of contemporary painters and sculptors. The Skowhegan School is one of very few in the country where fresco painting is taught. Chosen by jury, many of those who worked on the meeting house project are nationally known artists, including William King, Philip Bornath, Henry Varnum Poor, Alfred Blaustein and Edwin Brooks.

The meeting house is now a cultural and educational center administered by a state wide board of trustees and houses workshops, lecture series, tutoring groups and occasional non-sectarian religious services.
