Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Located on an urban lot in the center of Auburn, the A. A. Garcelon House occupies a commanding site on terrain which rises well above the central business district and the Androscoggin River. The neighborhood is predominantly residential and consists of both single and multi-family homes dating from the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. Although there is no potential for an historic district, the area does contain a number of properties individually listed in the National Register.

The A. A. Garcelon House is a large Queen Anne style building constructed of wood and two-and-one-half stories high. Although predominently sheathed with clapboards, the house also features novelty siding in the form of panelling, shingles, and sun-burst patterns. The windows are one-over-one double-hung sash.

The asymmetrical design of the Garcelon House includes an extremely complex combination of roofs. Several gable roofs project at different angles from a large central hipped roof. There is also a three story round tower with an onion dome roof at the sortheast corner. On the principal '(east) elevation, the central gable end is rounded in reflection of the bowed porch, which extends from the corner tower to the pedimented entry on the opposite side. Directly above is a second story porch engaged to the gable roof which provides a balance to the vertical thrust of the tower.

The interior of the house has not been significantly altered and contains much of the original woodwork. This includes decorative mantels, baseboards and trim around the doors and windows.

The only major alteration to the building is the destruction of the attached carriage house in 1985. A two story sleeping porch in the east side was enlarged in the early twentieth century, and remodelled in 1985.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The A. A. Garcelon House is architecturally significant as one of the most outstanding examples of Queen Anne design in Maine. Located on a prominent site above Auburn's commercial district, the house is an important local landmark. Jefferson L. Coburn, who designed the Garcelon residence, was a leading architect in western Maine.

Arthur A. Garcelon, who belonged to a prominent local Franco-American family, constructed this house in 1890. Garcelon was a partner in the grocery and provisions firm of Peables and Garcelon. He hired the local firm of Jefferson L. Coburn to design what was probably the most distinctive example of Queen Anne style architecture ever to be constructed in the Auburn-Lewiston area,

Jefferson L. Coburn (1835-1917), had a thriving practice during the last two decades of the nineteenth century. The firm, which later became Jefferson L. Coburn & Sons, was responsible for the James C. Lord House of 1885, the Healy Asylum of 1893, the Osgood Building of 1893, and the McGillicuddy Block of 1895, all in Lewiston and nominated to or listed in the National Register.
