DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Pawhuska's Immaculate Conception Church is a traditional cruciform structure of red brick, rising three stories above a foundation of four rows of large sandstone blocks. The tower above the central entryway is square, relatively plain, and spire-less.

Inside, the ceiling is a series of crossing ribbed arches, creating a lofty dome high above the nave and sanctuary. The nave measures approximately 90 x 45 feet. The transept extends the nave 15 feet on either side. The sanctuary measures 36 feet in length, 30 feet in width. There are six windows (3 x 8 feet) on either side of the nave, two on the front (flanking the entryway). Nine smaller windows are at the top of the five-sided sanctuary and single large window (5 x 7 feet) centers each transept. The south transept window depicts Columbus, the north window Columbus, both in the lower half of the window.

The windows are kept in good repair by an artist who worked with the company that installed them. He performs needed repair work with lead and glass, replacing broken panels. In the 1960s the windows were gone over piece by piece at a cost of several thousand dollars, reinforcing the lead dividers and repairing damaged glass. All but the two large transept windows depict typical Biblical scenes in brilliant colors.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Significance of Pawhuska's Immaculate Conception Church lies largely in the concept of its stained glass windows, considered to be among the most unusual of any church in the United States. Designed by the Bavarian Art Glass Company of Munich (Germany), they are conservatively valued today at \$100,000. However, it is their artistic, rather than monetary, worth that prompts this nomination.

Traditional Catholic (and Protestant) church windows depict only Biblical scenes. Yet two Immaculate Conception windows are non-Biblical in nature and one includes figures of persons alive at the time the church was erected. To set them in the church special dispensation from the Pope was required. One large window shows Columbus arriving in the New World and being met by ... Indians. It was donated by the William S. Mathews family.

The other, opposite it, depicts the arrival of Father Shoemaker, S. J. - known as "Black Robe" to the Osages - whose work with the tribe began in 1886 at the old St. Paul Mission in Kansas, before the Osages were moved to Indian Territory. Father Shoemaker, surrounded by Osages, is shown holding a cross. Photographs of tribal members were used by the artist to create his Osage figures. This window was donated by Rose Hill, Angie Bonniecastle, and T. J. Leahy.

Father Edward Van Waesberghe laid out the plans and designs for the church - as well as for its stained glass windows - about 1910. He oversaw building of the church, doing much of the brickwork himself, although he was aided in both design and construction by Osage members themselves. The windows were shipped in sections to Pawhuska, placed in the church between 1910 and 1916. The building was completed in 1916, dedicated May 13, 1925, by Cardinal Hayes of St. Louis.
