Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Little Falls Carnegie Library is a two story brick and stone structure executed in a restrained Craftsman style. The high basement level is constructed of a local field stone laid in random pattern. The main level is of a pressed buff-colored brick; this level is separated from the basement by a water table of rock-faced gray granite blocks. The whole is covered by a dormered, intersecting gable roof. The design relies primarily upon the simplicity of its materials as is evidenced by the relative lack of exterior ornamentation. A hint of ornamental expression is noted in the large barges on the gables and dormers and in the granite quoining which enframes the front entrance.

The building is erected on the cruciform plan. This plan is especially evident in the interior arrangment of spaces and functions. Upon entering the main floor, one is confronted by a centrally located circulation area with reading rooms to right and left and stacks to the rear. The lower level served originally as an auditorium and club room; it is currently used as the children's room. The attic space is a large, finished area and is used primarily for storage.

The building continues to serve its original function as a community library. It retains near-total design integrity, including interior woodwork, mantels, and a large number of furnishings. The building is well maintained and in an excellent state of preservation.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Carnegie Public Library is significant as one of the best-preserved and most architecturally distinctive of the 65 libraries in Minnesota endowed by Andrew Carnegie. Constructed in 1905 according to the plans of Minneapolis architect, Fremont Orff, the building's Craftsman style distinguishes it from the characteristic Neo-Classic style of most other Carnegie libraries. Its present use as a library, virtually without physical alteration, testifies to the continuing and important role which it has played in the community. Interestingly, the contributors who matched the original Carnegie grant included Charles A. Lindbergh, Sr., and members of the Weyerhaeuser and Musser families, all of whom played important roles in the history of the community.
