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**Description:** The Confederate Memorial in Fairview Cemetery consists of three parts: the arch/base; statue and the ornamental entryways. The arch is constructed of rough cut limestone, approximately ten feet high. On the front of the arch approximately six feet up on either side of the opening the dates 1861 and 1865 are carved. On the keystone are the words: "Confederate Memorial." Within the arch, facing it on the left, approximately halfway up, is engraved: "Erected by UDC (United Daughters of the Confederacy) 1902 Col. Ed Crossland Chapter No. 347 -- Mrs. Virginia A. F. Lollius, President; Mrs. Sallie M. Cooke 1st Vice Pres.; Mrs. Anna M. Murphy 2nd Vice Pres.; Mrs. Fannie L. W. Shackler Cor. Sec.; Mrs. Maybell T. Ewen Rec'd Sec.; Mrs. Phila P. Browder Treasurer; Miss Genevieve Cooke Historian." On the opposite side of the arch is engraved: "Erected by UDC 1902." The statue is zinc of a Confederate soldier resting on his rifle. He is wearing a slouch hat, a bed roll and canteen. The statue is approximately six feet tall. On all four sides of the monument are the remains of a walkway. The front (north) and east and west side have and ornamental step. The northern one has the word "Confederate" inscribed upon it, the others are blank. In the rear (south) of the arch is a small polished granite stone with the initials UCV (United Confederate Veterans).

**Statement of Significance:** The Confederate Memorial in the Fairview Cemetery in Fulton, Kentucky meets National Register criterion A and is significant within the context of "Civil War Monuments in Kentucky, 1861-1935." This monument was erected in 1902 by the Col. Ed Crossfield Chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy (UDC). The UDC was by far the most prolific of the monument builders in Kentucky. This is an excellent example of the property type "statue." It is the only statue memorial in the state that has an arch for a base. This memorial was placed in a cemetery, but it exhibits none of the funeral aspects of monuments erected earlier and is a good example of later monuments that tend to celebrate the Confederacy rather than to mourn it.

**Verbal Boundary Description** - The Confederate memorial whose boundaries form a circle with a radius of 25 feet centered on the monument, but including the ornamental steps, located in Fairview Cemetery in Fulton, Kentucky.

**Verbal Boundary Justification** - The area associated with the monument is restricted to the ground on which the monument sits and a small buffer around it. The setting outside such a restricted area is not seen as critically important to maintaining an integrity of association. Because the focus of the multiple property submissions is the significance of the monuments, their proposed area of listing will reflect that they have been considered by-and-large, in isolation from their surrounds.
