The Mt. Zion Church typified the rural meetinghouse used by congregations in the middle and late 1800's. Organized by 1845, the Mt. Zion congregation was one of the oldest in the county. Today the church remains virtually unaltered when compared to other country churches that have adopted brick veneers and unsympathetic additions. The Mt. Zion Church is one of the last examples of this type of church architecture left in Meigs County and its surrounding region. Ordinarily religious buildings are not considered eligible for the National Register, but the Mt. Zion Church qualifies through its primary significance from architecture.
