DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Wasilla elementary school is a one-room rectangular, wood-framed gable-roofed building with exterior dimensions of approximately 22 ft. x 36 ft. The whitepainted horizontal siding, trim and gable-end brackets are quite typical of the 1917 era. The wood windows are a horizontal sliding sash. The roof, now covered on the east half with corrugated steel, is believed to have originally been entirely asphalt roll roofing, as currently remains on the west half. The roofing is badly deteriorated, showing some bare sheathing boards. The siding is covered with roofing felts at some locations, and several windows are boarded over. The floor is wide wood planking and, like the wooden substructure, appears sound. The chimney and stove at the rear (north end) are missing. The original Gloria Gas Lamps have been replaced with fluorescent fixtures, which should be removed.

The building, as originally constructed was on a site about three blocks from the present location; placed on a wooden foundation. Approximately fifteen years later a concrete basement was installed beneath it. It was further remodeled and slightly altered in later years when used for church services. The school has most recently been relocated (in order to save it) to the Wasilla Historical Park. Here it now rests on a new wood post foundation, in proximity to other older buildings of similar relatively small scale, most appropriate to the feeling of early-day Wasilla.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

As the first school, and then church, in the founding of the town of Wasilla, this structure represents the oldest extant fabric of the community's social, political and educational life. In addition to the many future citizens educated here, it epitomizes, in a significant way, the lifestyles of the generations after 1917—through weddings, funerals, political and public meetings touching the lives of a large percentage of the people who lived in Wasilla and vicinity during the town's formative first half century.

As Wasilla's first school, built in 1917, this was one of the earliest permanent buildings in the new town. It served the community well for about half a century, and as such is a landmark in symbol as well as fact.

The first public sale of lots for the townsite of Wasilla did not occur until June 20, 1917. Then, the action of the people in promptly organizing a school district was highly commendable.

Local citizens petitioned officials in the Clerk of the Court office, at Valdez, to establish the initial school district, having an area of 36 square miles, within which the town of Wasilla was embraced. An election of a School Board of three members, consisting of a clerk, treasurer and director was held on August 2, 1917. The order creating the School District named Frank B. Cannon, Orville G. Herning and Howard Wilmoth as supervisors of the election.

Specifications for the bids for the new school were prepared by October 24. Bids were opened on October 29, and a pioneer builder named Meehan was awarded the contract. On October 30, Mr. Meehan went to Anchorage to get materials for the school. The lumber arrived on November 2. By November 7, O.G. Herning recorded in his diary that "school house is under cover." Miss Ora D. Clark, the first teacher and a pioneer Alaska educator of great stature, arrived on November 24. School opened on November 26. (A big dance, with 40 in attendance, had been held in the pioneer school house on November 16, to celebrate its near completion.)

The school remained the focal point of community events until a larger new school was built in 1934, a year before the 1935 Matanuska Valley Colonists arrived in Palmer. Some of the colonist children then enrolled in Wasilla schools, and the new school was soon overflowing. The first school building was put into use again with the overflow of students attending school there. The first public library was established here. It consisted of a single locked book case.



The first organized Wasilla church was also established in this original school building. School classes were held during the week, while the church conducted services on Sundays. In later years, after the newer elementary school was enlarged, and plans for a high school were underway; this first school became a full-time church with the Rev. Wentner Harvey and his wife, Mary, taking it over as the Church of Christ.

Prior to being moved to the established Historic Park, the school building had been in use (only for storage) for many later years. Almost from the beginning it served as a community hall for public and political meetings and rallys, weddings, funerals and the focal point for the social life of an emerging community, second only to earlier Knik, which is on the National Register of Historic Places.
