1. Present physical appearance of the log house is still a sound structure of logs produced from a sawmill here at Lake Tahoe. Orval B. Johnson who worked for 20 years for the Department of Parks & Recreation Restoration Programs examined the house and stated that it is a very worthwhile structure to preserve as an example of turn-of-thecentury log-type built houses.

The house has had two porches built on to it plus bathroom facilities which could be renovated or removed as
decided upon. Many coats of paint have been added to
rooms throughout the building; however, they can easily
be removed by sandblasting the logs. The wood flooring
is in good shape and could be restored with paint remover
and sanding.

- 2. The original use of the house was for the gatekeeper to keep records on the height of the lake and to control the amount of water that was discharged downstream to Nevada. The gatekeeper had his office in the house and it has an ideal location at the only outlet to Lake Tahoe. The original appearance was very much the same as it is now with the exception that composition shingles have been added on and paint has covered many areas which should be restored to the natural wood state.
- 3. The site is a natural pine and fir tree covered two plus acres which would make an excellent OPEN SPACE for use by the public. It is on the mouth of the Truckee River and Lake Tahoe.

The site is presently in its natural wooded condition but plans to construct condominiums on the grounds are underway and it is our desire to stop further desecration of the beautiful natural area.

The fact that the log house is one of the oldest at North Lake Tahoe and it is preserved in fine condition will make it an appropriate museum of artifacts of early Lake Tahoe history. Presently there is not a museum in the immediate area. (The state of California Parks and Recreation maintains an interpretative center in the Ehrman House, Sugar Pine Point State Park.) There are many documents on the history of the outlet dam to Lake Tahoe (the only outlet for this entire lake). This particular area is extremely scenic and appropriately would make a beautiful public park if left in the open space classification. This spot is the start of the Truckee River which flows 100 miles to Pyramid Lake in Nevada.

The famous Dat-So-La-Lee basket weaver wove her masterpieces (her ceremonial masterpieces are valued at over \$10,000 each and are in museums throughout the country) at the site in front of the present location of the gatekeeper's log house. It is planned to erect a monument in her memory, along with displaying a large stone which was used by the Indians for grinding corn on the site.

Adjacent to the gatekeepers log cabin are the Lake Tahoe outlet gates first built in 1870. Control of these gates resulted in the "Tahoe Water War" between lakeshore owners and downstream Truckee River water users, which lasted two decades. The dispute was settled in 1910-11 when techniques for determining water content in snow were developed by Dr. James E. Church, Jr., and made possible accounts prediction and control of the seasonal rise in lake and river levels. (State Historical Landmark #797.)

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
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Map Reference - PHYSICAL APPRARANCE

A portion of the North Half of Section 7, Township 15 North, Range 17 East, M.D.M., Placer County, California.

Beginning at the point of intersection of the Easterly right of way line of State Highway 89 with the property line common to Sierra Pacific Power Company and the U.S. Government, and from said point the Quarter Section corner on the North line of Section 7, Township 15 North, Range 17 East, M.D.M. bears the following two (2) consecutive courses: (1) North 08°35' East 135.35 feet to a point 40.00 feet right of Engineer's Station 454+46.40 B.C. III Pla 38 A, and (2) North 05°44'39" West 1334.84 feet; thence from the point of beginning South 40°04' East along the aforementioned common property line for a distance of 123.00 feet; thence South 01°00' East 115.48 feet; thence North 88°00' West 112.29 feet to a point on said Easterly right of way line of State Highway 89; thence North 08°35' East along said Easterly right of way line for a distance of 208.00 feet to the point of beginning.
