Jackson Hall is a two-story brick building of the German Castle style erected in 1887. It is located on an original ten-acre site, which came to be known as Normal Hill, donated by the City Council of Frankfort. The same Council contributed \$1,500 toward the cost of construction. The architect and the builder are unknown, but among the laborers were young men who became students.

The building is on a bluff above Holmes Street and overlooks Kentucky's Old State House, and the business section of Frankfort.

The exterior today is substantially what it was at the time it was erected. The interior has experienced some alterations to accommodate the academic needs at various times. When the edifice was opened it contained the chapel, classrooms, and the Dean's office. The chapel in the early days, was a very significant area. There, all the faculty and students assembled for morning devotions and talks by the President and other members of the faculty.

In the years since its construction and early use, the space for the chapel has been used as a basketball court for women and as an accommodation for large classes. Several years ago partitions between some classrooms were removed to provide adequate space for a language laboratory; laboratories for biology and chemistry were also installed in the building. For a number of years it housed the Registrar's office and all the records of the academic program. Presently, it serves as a relief storage area for the University's maintenance department.

The foundation is sound and the walls are sturdy; however, the interior has deteriorated. Usage of Jackson Hall as a classroom building within the last decade indicates, in some degree, the physical quality of the facility.



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\Iackson Hall, formerly known as Recitation Hall, was built in 1887. It was the first permanent building erected on the campus of Kentucky State University. It was named for John H. Jackson, who is thought to be Kentucky's first black college graduate. Jackson, who graduated from Berea College in 1874 was the first President of Kentucky State.

This building is a symbol of Negro education in the State. Most of Kentucky's black youth who entered teacher training or other higher education from 1887 until 1967 were familiar with this building. Many, who became prominent citizens, including the late Whitney M. Young, Jr., graduated from this institution. Jackson Hall represents the historic past of Kentucky State better than any other building on the campus. There are two proposed roles for Jackson Hall in the future: (1) as a museum of Kentucky Negro History, and for (2) as housing for the Department of Nursing Education. It is a remembrance of the doctrine of racially separated education that existed prior to integration.

whints. Jackson Hall stands as a monument to the foresight and concern of Kentucky citizens, black and white, who in the post-Civil War and pretwentieth century development of the Commonwealth noted the necessity for the training of teachers for the black people of Kentucky.
