Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance


The Luft House typifies pattern book architectural design in the Queen Anne style which is distinguished by multigables, corner cutaways giving semi-octagonal ended rooms, and Colonial detailing. The house was moved on rollers from its original location in the 300 block of Poplar Street, directly west of the Post Office, to its present location of 1429 Highway 14, in 1925. The distance of 1½ miles between the two sites took ten days. All of the original materials, such as chimney bricks, foundation blocks, and the wood floor of the porch, were replaced at the new site. The front porch suggests a rebuilding but reflects the then current interest in neo-Colonial Revival complimenting the original detailing.

The house, measuring 47" by 25', is vertical in proportion incorporating the modified L-plan. The 2½ story residence has a steeply pitched roof with three main gables containing Palladian windows and one secondary gable above the north entrance with a lunette having fanned muntins. The exaggerated keystones of each semicircular arch form extends well into the apex of each fish-scale shingled gable tympanum of the equilateral pediments, enclosed with an imitation of late 17th century-early 18th century Colonial style. The wood shingled roof, painted dark green, is complete with crenulated ridge cresting and is carried on a fully molded entablature which is interrupted by the one-story rear wing's one-half hipped roof that extends to the main ridge. At the cutaway corners of the north facade projection and at the east elevation projection the square eaves are carried on diagonal brackets, with quatrefoil motifs, which meet at drop pendants. Narrow clapboarding, within corner boards, sheathes the frame structure on a stone foundation. trim the door and window openings. The latter are hung with one over one sash and with cottage type sash which lights the main rooms. Diamond and elongated hexagonal muntined sash decoratively fill various openings including the triple opening at the second floor level below lunette gable and above the entranceway and its adjacent single sash hall light.

Recessed back, the entrance wall is deeply sheltered by the one-story porch which extends across the facade, diagonally across the northeast cutaway, and terminates at the east projection. The porch, supported on tripled and single Tuscan columns infilled with plain balustrading, is characterized by a classically proportional pediment above the entrance steps and a shallower pediment in front of the facade projection. Tympanums are set with roundels.

Overall, the Luft House displays an architectural assuredness and retains much of that character through its irregular shaped plan; vertically, animated roofline; and revival detailing. The 1930 front porch respects the original design and detail as does a one-story shed back porch built onto the roofed rear wing, which was built in 1925. The interiors have no significant alteration and retain their original millwork, flooring and fireplace tiling. The staircase, lit with a stair landing window which is double hung below a diamond panel transom, has hardwood newels and turned balasters. The original light fixtures have been removed but are stored in the basement. There remains the original fireplace with a mottled pink and green tile and a decorative metal door. All bathroom fixtures are the originals also and the kitchen retains its 1925 placement of cupboards. The floors throughout the entire house are of a softwood while all the decorative wood is a hardwood and neither is readily identifiable as to wood type because of its heavy varnishing.

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The rarity of finding a complete house with its original interior and exterior still repeating the original colors used on the home make this an exceptional home in the Sterling community and is most worthy of designation in the National Register.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Luft House, located in the Plains community of Sterling in northeast Colorado, is one of the town's most significant historic residential buildings and the best example of Queen Anne in the area. The house has retained its original detailing and, regardless of its change in location, remains an important resource for the town.

The Luft House was constructed in 1902 in the 300 block of Poplar Street by the Hoffman brothers, local carpenters, for their own residence. The Hoffmans also built other large houses in Sterling, notably the Sherwin House, originally located at the corner of Second and Ash. (It was later moved to Eighth and Park streets.) In 1925, the Luft House was moved from Poplar Street to its present location at 1429 Highway 14. The association with the Luft family began after the house was moved.

Conrad Luft, Sr., of German heritage, was born in 1879 in Gnadenflor, Russia, located on the Volga River. In 1892, Conrad and his family moved to Konstantonowka. At the age of twenty, Conrad joined a large group headed for Flandero, Mexico to work clearing trees and brush. In the spring of 1900, he left Mexico for Lehigh, Kansas where he worked on a farm, returning to Russia in the fall of the same year.

In Russia, Luft married Barbara Schadt in 1902 and in 1907 made the decision to emigrate to America with his family. After a long and arduous journey, Luft, his wife and two children finally arrived in Sterling, Colorado in 1909.

The Lufts were among many German Russian immigrants who settled in the Sterling area in the early twentieth century. It was only after the construction of sugar beet refineries after the turn-of-the-century in Logan County that attracted large numbers of German Russians to Colorado. They established their communities wherever the sugar refineries were located. By 1910, the German Russians composed the largest labor force in the Colorado beet fields. Today, a large number of the descendants of these immigrants still live in the Sterling area. I

Between 1909 and 1914, Conrad Luft worked at a variety of jobs: manual labor in the beet fields and as flumer for the Great Western Sugar Company. In the off season, he also found employment with the city of Sterling, Chapman's feed store and Watt's Lumber Company. By 1914, the family was prosperous enough to buy machinery and livestock — which permitted Luft to fulfill his life-long dream of becoming a cattle producer and feeder.

With the support of his family and the use of unorthodox methods of feeding, Luft became a successful cattleman. By buying mixed breeds of cattle instead of purebreds and using all possible feed combinations, Luft was able to expand his cattle operations. In 1925




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Luft bought the W. E. Damm farm on Highway 14. The concrete block farmhouse was replaced by the residence moved from Poplar Street that same year. The family, which consisted of twelve children, moved into the house the fall of 1925. Conrad Luft lived in the house until his death in 1971. It is still under family ownership.

The Luft House is uncommon among Sterling's residential buildings, which are modest in detail and lack the architectural distinction of this house. There is a great deal of individuality in the irregular plan, the Palladian gable windows and the bracketed cutaway corner windows which lend architectural interest to the building.
