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The Kitchi Gammi Club at 831 East Superior Street in Duluth is an imposing three and one-half storey brick and stone structure which is set upon a well landscaped lot. The front (or south facade) is afforded an unobstructed view of Lake Superior. Stylistically, the design embodies features of both the Medieval "Gothic" of Elizabethan England and the Georgian. Both styles are skillfully combined to form a cohesive and complementary appearance.

The front of the building is basically symmetrical in massing. The central or entry bay is gabled and boasts a Jacobean type oriel window at second storey level. This bay is balanced by two wide bays which terminate in projecting wings. (The seven-part composition is a Georgian feature.) The entire building is roofed with thick green slate. On either side of the main entry are carved figures of Indians which serve as holders for lanterns. All gutters, downspouts, valleys, exterior lighting fixtures and windows are either copper or lead. All trim around windows and doors is of cut stone. Windows are of the casement type and imported from England.

The interior is finished in chestnut and oak which has been varnished in all major rooms. Minor rooms have been painted. The ground floor consists of a long hall with meeting rooms and lounges at either end. Directly opposite the entry is a massive fireplace set within a recessed inglenook. No major changes have been made in the appearance of the building interior or exterior since construction and much of the furnishings still in use were chosen for the building by the architect.

The most impressive room in the club is the ballroom (also used as the main dining room) on the second floor in the east wing. Paneled in chestnut, this room is thirty feet wide, fifty-four feet long and almost three storeys in height. Large ornately fashioned wooden trusses with carved pendents appear to support the steeply-pitched roof, however they are reported to be non-structural and function primarily as ornamentation. A magnificent fireplace is located on the north wall below a projecting balcony or music loft. On the south wall are expansive two-storey metal casement windows which afford a view of Lake Superior.

The remaining portions of the building are devoted to small private dining and meeting rooms, kitchen and service facilities, and guest rooms, several of which are provided with fireplaces. These rooms occupy one-half of the second storey and the entire third storey. The heating plant, card room, storage, and gymnasium are located on the basement level.

The building continues to serve its original function as a social club and is maintained in an excellent state of preservation. No plans for future alteration or change in usage have been expressed by the club. Excellent maintenance of the grounds enhance the architectural character although increased vehicular traffic on adjacent Superior Street does present problems of noise and air pollution. Future plans to divert much of this traffic from Superior Street will be advantageous to the future preservation of this site. EE INSTRUCTION

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Kitchi Gammi Club was organized on 1 October 1883 and was the first social club of its kind to be incorporated in Minnesota. Originally it occupied quarters on the fourth floor of the old Grand Opera House located on the northeast corner of Fourth Avenue West and Superior Street. When this building was destroyed by fire the club moved two subsequent times until it finally moved into the present club house completed in 1913.

For the design of the new Kitchi Gammi Club, the members commissioned the eastcoast architectural firm of Crami Goodhue, and Ferguson, Architects. This firm is also credited with the design of three other Duluth Buildings among them Saint Paul's Episcopal Church at 1710 East Superior Street. While drawings for all four bear the name of the firm, the designs are credited to Bertram Grosvenor Goodhue.

Goodhue was, in addition to being an accomplished architect, an accomplished musician, lecturer, author, and designer of type, bookplates, and ink, watercolor and crayon renderings. He was not college trained but began his career at the age of fifteen as an apprentice in the New York office of Gothicist-architect James Renwick. Almost from the beginning of his career, Goodhue was respected for his remarkable skill in draftsmanship.

Between 1891 and 1914, Goodhue worked with Ralph Adams Cram, the leading ecclesiastical architect of the period. Cram firmly believed that the English Gothic Style was the proper church style and many of his works at such institutions as West Point and Princeton University attest to this fact.

Goodhue's design for the Kitchi Gammi Club called for a variant on the Gothic style which resulted in the image of an Elizabethan manor house with both Gothic and Georgian detailing. Construction began in 1912 and upon completion the total cost of construction, furnishing, and landscaping was recorded at over \$225,000.

The Kitchi Gammi Club is regarded today as one of the finest examples of its style in Duluth. The <u>Duluth News Tribune</u> of 25 April 1954 described the building as "one of the last buildings built which embodies so many ancient handicrafts and as much detailed handiwork in wood, metal, and stone". The building not only attests to skill in craftsmanship in materials for the most unreproducable by modern standards, but to the accomplished architectural design of Bertram G. Goodhue. In addition the club remains active to carry on the tradition of "the oldest social club in Minnesota".
