DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (II known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Christopher Garlington constructed this Greek revival mansion in 1839 on what was then the Greenville Road.

Exterior: The white clapboard structure has three stories with a total of twelve rooms. The brick steps and base support two pairs of fluted Doric columns with pediment. There are fluted corner pilasters with square capitals just under the rather severe entablature. The gable roof is pierced by four end chimneys contained within the structure. A fifth chimney is in the rear projection.

The front facade is three-bayed with Palladian-derived 6/6 windows having sidelights. The double door is panelled and has sidelights surmounted by a triple flush transom. The door and windows have carved decorative surrounds with upper corner medallion blocks.

A long porch is located to the rear of the dwelling that opens into the former dining room. The now destroyed brick kitchen was detached and had a well between it and the dining room porch.

<u>Interior</u>: A wide hall traverses both floors with a large front stairway of wide pine steps of a six inch rise instead of the usual seven. The handrail is of solid mahogany and runs from the first floor to the third. There are five rooms on the first and second floors and a large single room on the third that was used for parties, gatherings, and balls. The rooms are 15 x 15 feet with doors that are specially hinged to rise when opened over the rugs. The left front room was constructed as a library and is horizontally panelled in cherry. The rest of the rooms are plastered. The coal fireplaces have Greek revival mantels and were formerly log burning. The floors throughout the house are pine.

Some changes have been made since 1940 and include the remodeling of the former dining room into a den with old, wide pine boards replacing deteriorated plaster. A former bedroom has been converted into a kitchen with the fireplace opened to its former log burning size. A pantry and upstairs storage room have been remodeled into bathrooms.

The once elaborate gardens, orchard, and vineyard have disappeared and the town of Laurens has since grown and surrounded the structure, which stands on one of the main residential streets. The Motes family purchased it from Simpson heirs in 1939.
