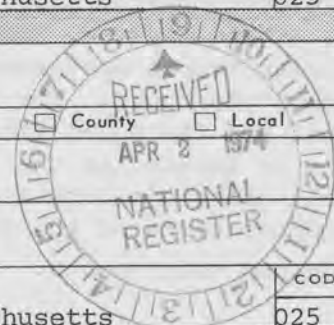

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The historic Ames Hill/Crescent Hill District is situated on two adjacent hills which form a ridge to the southwest of the Central Business District. Situated in a predominantly residential area, the homes are large mansions built by the 19th and early 20th c. elite of Springfield. The entire area is extensively landscaped and many of the houses are screened by dense foliage.

#1 Goodhue House (1891) 216 Central Street - An orange brick mansion adorned with four hollow brick columns at the front.

#2 Tiffany-Bowles House (1853) 182 Central Street- Italianate, faced with white clapboard and white painted stone, and quoined. A side bay contains five arched windows with recessed panelling under them. A rectangular entrance portico is flat roofed and has one keystone arch opening on each side. The columns are square with recessed vertical panels. All roof, porch and bay cornices have typical heavy Italianate brackets.

#3 Foot-Wallace House (1844) 201 Maple Street- English Cottage Style with Gothic influences, originally built with wooden exterior walls and slate roof. In 1898 the exterior walls were stuccoed and an orange tile roof added. A large stable of the same materials was built to the rear. Bargeboards are jigsawed and some of the fenestration is Gothic.

#4 Clifford Castle House (1930) 3 Ames Hill Drive- Symmetrical stuccoed house with slate roof.

#5 Tifft House (1927) 225 Maple Street-Brick and half timbered Tudor style.

#6 David Ames House (1826) 141 Maple Street-An elaboration on the Alexander House, 1811, designed by Asher Benjamin and built by Simon Sanborn. A transitional Federal- Greek Revival, it is faced with white painted brick, and has a two story entrance portico of Ionic columns topped by a pediment. The pediment contains an oculus flanked on either side by a triangular window. The entrance door itself is topped by a fan and flanked by side lights. The gable ends of the ridge roof are pedimented and contain two chimneys set in on each side. Two more chimneys are on either side of the rear extension. The roof cornice is dentiled with a balustrade above. The structure is five bays wide and ten bays deep. Windows are two over two, have exterior shutters, and slightly arched stone lintels.

#7 George Kyberg House (1927) 6 Ames Hill Drive- Brick half timbered Tudor house.

#8 Baker House (1925) 263 Maple Street - Hip roofed brick Georgian Revival. On the facade, a shallow one-bay projection contains a semi-circular front porch topped by a Palladian window and pediment.

#9 Julius Appleton House (1886) 313 Maple Street- Basically a three story Stick Style mansion. However, it shows a multitude of influences with its circular French chateausque turret, Japanese sloped porch roofs, and square Stick Style tower. The first and second floor walls are Longmeadow brown-stone, and the upper stories of the square tower are shingled. The third floor is located in the large roof and in the turret and tower. The roofs of all these elements are slate. The first and second floor verandas which encompass parts of the facade and east side, have typical Stick Style balustrade and porch posts. Fenestration varies in size, shape and grouping.

#10 Jones-Neff House (1914) 321 Maple Street - Brick Tudor with bay projecting over the entrance porch. The front central gable and the dormers that flank it have plain bargeboards and a finial and pendant.

#11 Reynolds House (1860) 355 Maple Street- Two story frame house with ridge roof and a veranda to the south and west.

#12 Reynolds House (1893) 357 Maple Street- Two story frame house with low pitched ridge roof and a veranda to the west.

#13 Clarence Schoo House (1930) 400 Maple Street- A limestone faced two story French Provincial with seven bays fronting on a raised piazza. The hip roof is slate with a small arched dormer in the center, above the facade. An iron balcony is located outside each second floor window. The entrance door has a flat pediment and Ionic pilasters.

#14 Arthur Murray House (1921) 184 Mill Street- Brick Georgian Revival with slate roof and gable dormers with returns. There is a granite keystone above each shuttered window.

#15 Griffith House (1904) 185 Mill Street- A two and one half story Tudor. The first floor is brick and the second floor shingle, with a half timbered gable above the entranceway.

#16 Samuel Buckingham House (1875) 141 Mill Street- A two story Stick Style gambrel cottage arranged so that the gable end faces the street, and an ell with porch runs parallel to the street. The entrance porch roof slopes down from the gambrel and is supported by consoles and four Doric columns. Of note are the chimneys which extend the Stick Style motif in brick.

#17 Birnie House (1899) 127 Mill Street- An asymmetrical clapboard Colonial Revival. The large entrance porch extends along the right side of the facade and is supported by nine slender Doric columns. The doorway itself is arched with a fanlight, and there is an oval window with radiating voussoirs above the porch. Above this window is a triangular pedimented dormer, and the roof cornice is dentiled.

#18 Merriam House (1897) 5 Crescent Hill - Wood frame house.

#19 and #20 Southworth Houses (1890) 7 and 8 Crescent Hill- Two and a half story Shingle Style houses with irregular fenestration, dormers, turrets, and some undulating shingle work.

#21 Mills-Stebbins Villa (1849) 3 Crescent Hill- A fine Italianate villa already listed on the National Register.

#22 Isaac Mills House (1859) 2 Crescent Hill- A simple two story white clapboard house with a mixture of Gothic Revival (porch posts and balustrade), Italianate (arched windows) and Federal (porch pediment) influences. A veranda encircles it on three sides.

#23 Samuel Bowles House (1884) 1 Crescent Hill- An asymmetrical Stick Style-Colonial Revival clapboard house with front and side porches. The roof is bellcast hip with gable dormers. Fishscale shingling is present on the entrance porch pediment and the side porch exterior slope.

#24 Appleton House (1927) 334 Maple Street- Another Tudor, of brick with half timbering in the gable ends.

#25 Walter Wesson House (1882) 302 Maple Street- One of the most elaborate houses in the district. It has all the variety of an eccentric Queen Anne with a brownstone and brick first floor, shingled and half timbered upper floors, a steeply sloping slate roof, and two round turrets with finials. The five vertically grooved chimneys compete with the height of the central pitched roof. Fenestration is varied in size, shape and grouping.

#26 Harris House (1879) 270 Maple Street- Originally small but was doubled in size in 1886 when the house acquired a Shingle Style-Colonial Revival look. It presents a brownstone first floor, shingled upper floor, gables with Palladian windows, and a column supported front porch. A rear addition was made in 1900.

#27 Gardner House (1927) 250 Maple Street- Brick and half timbered Tudor.

#28 Carter House (1914) 238 Maple Street- Brick and half timbered Tudor.

#29 Loomis-Wesson House (1873) 220 Maple Street- Black and red variegated brick house. Cornice brackets and dormer surrounds are Stick Style but the steeply sloping red slate roofs of the main building and the tower-are Chateausque.

#30 Hatch House (1874) 210 Maple Street- A two story red brick house with a Gothic slate roof and brownstone trimmings.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Ames Hill/Crescent Hill District was developed by prominent and wealthy Springfield citizens in the mid to late 19th and early 20th c. Among those who built homes here were industrialists, bankers, lawyers and merchants. Typical of the ostentatious architecture of this period, the District has one of the finest groupings of domestic architecture in Springfield.

The land which this area encompasses was at one time owned by David Ames, Sr., a paper manufacturer who opened this section of Maple Street in 1812 to provide improved access to his factory on the Mill River to the south. He soon realized the value of the land and commissioned Chauncey Shepard to build a wedding house for his son, David, Jr. The Ames family and paper factory were very significant to the history of Springfield. The factory was known nationwide for the quality of its paper products and prospered until 1853, when it was forced to close, as Springfield's early industrial era came to an end. Builder Chauncey Shepard was one of Springfield's most important early builders. During his long and productive life, he was responsible for a variety of structures in Springfield. In the Ames Hill/Crescent Hill district, he built the Ames House (#6), the Hatch House (#30), and the Wesson House (#29). #30 was commissioned by James B. Hatch, a clipper ship captain, and #29 by Walter Wesson, industrialist and head of the Smith and Wesson gunworks. The plans for the Wesson House were supplied by Ware and Van Brunt of Boston.

The Tiffany-Bowles House (#2) was built by Henry Sykes for Reverend Francis Tiffany. It was later bought by Samuel Bowles, a well known news correspondent and founder of the Springfield Daily Republican, then a nationally known newspaper. Architect Henry Sykes apprenticed under Chauncey Shepard and Ithiel Town and practiced throughout the Connecticut Valley. He is known to have designed buildings in Amherst as well as in Springfield, and according to Hitchcock, may have become one of America's great architects, had he not died at an early age. Sykes also designed the Mills-Stebbins Villa (#21). John Mills was a nationally known statesman and a one time vice presidential candidate. Stebbins was a state representative.

The Foot-Wallace House (#3) was originally built in 1844 by Simon Sanborn for Homer Frost, a hardware merchant. The "English Cottage" style house was later bought by Andrew Wallace, a dry goods merchant, and remodeled by E.C. Gardner. Simon Sanborn, builder of the original Foot House, is considered Springfield's most important early builder. He had apprenticed to

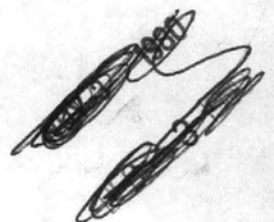
George Perkins in Hartford and Asher Benjamin in Boston before coming to Springfield in 1811. He remained in Springfield after the completion of James Byer's Linden Hall, and built many more important homes. Eugene Gardner was perhaps Springfield's most important 19th c. architect, and according to Vincent Scully, was "the last of the great pattern book authors". His firm designed every conceivable type of building. In this district he remodeled the Foot-Wallace House (#3) and designed the magnificent Appleton House (#9).

#7, 8 and 24 were designed by Max Westhoff, a 20th c. architect who worked in Springfield for many years, and was responsible for the designs of innumerable Tudor and Georgian Revival buildings.

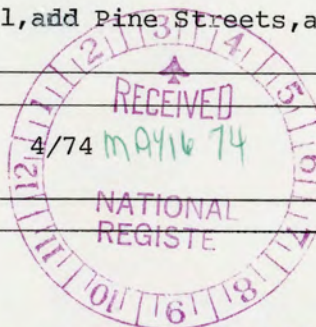

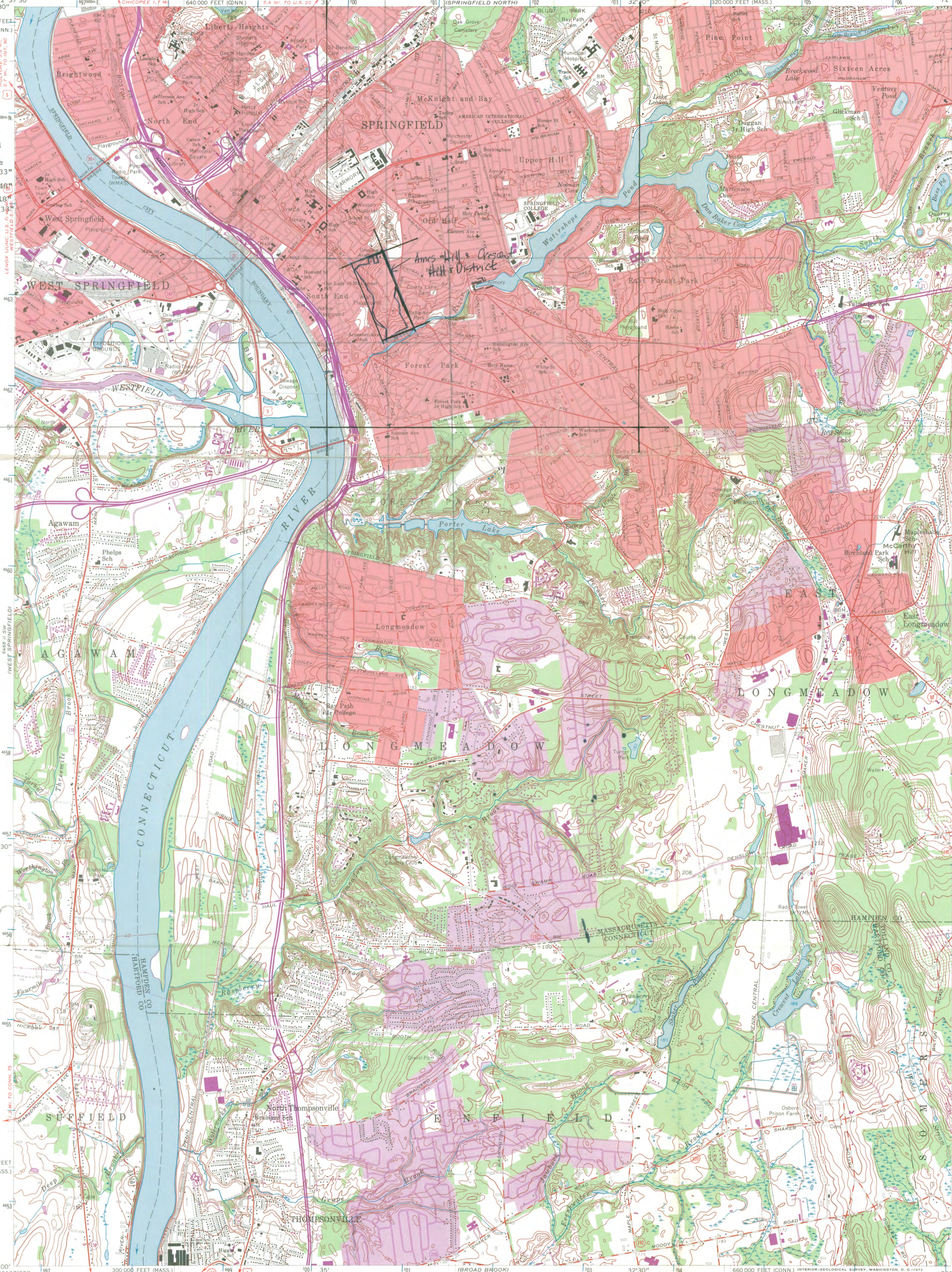

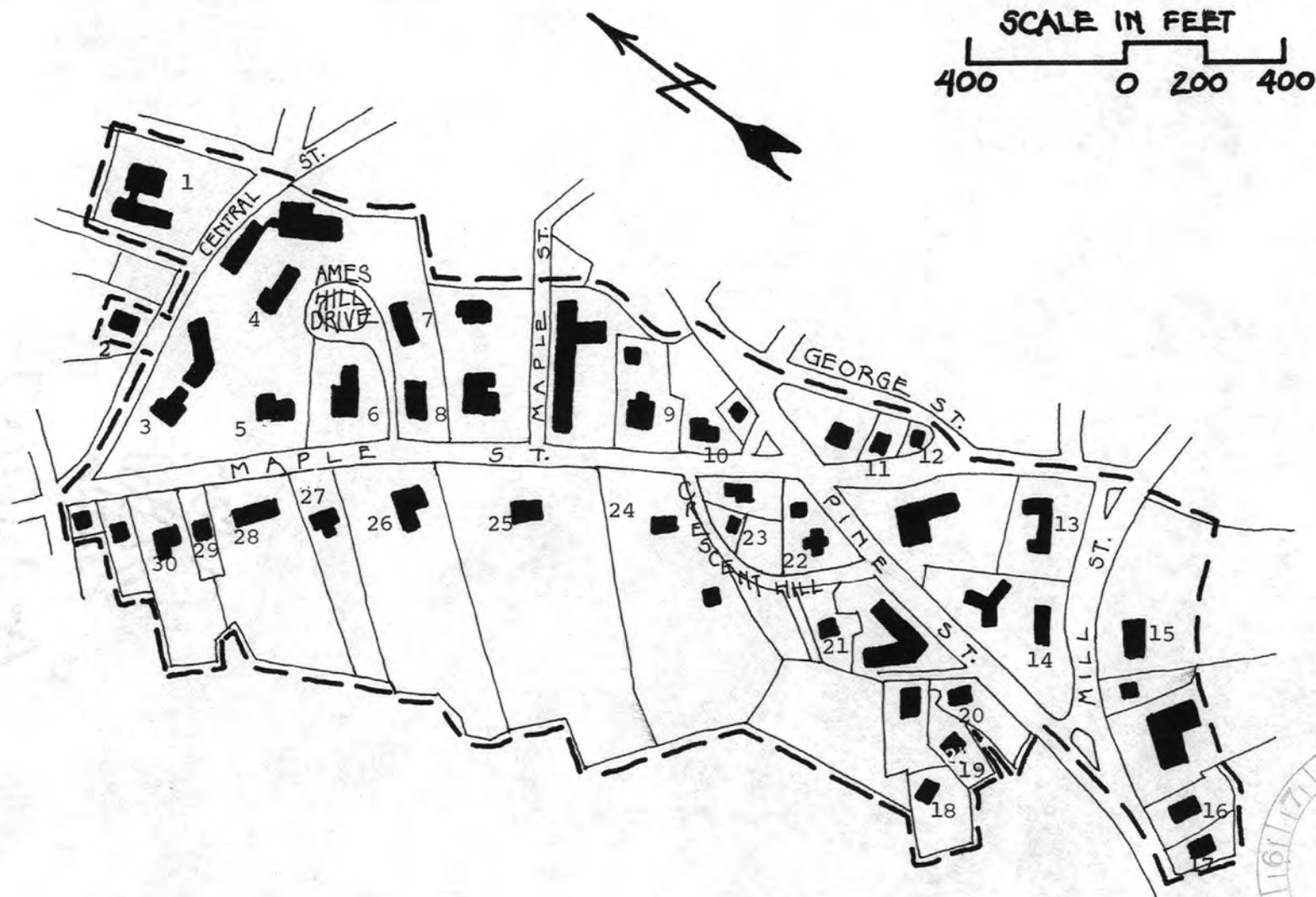
