The Henkel-Duke Building is a four-story brick warehouse of 1895 vintage located in the downtown area of Pueblo. The warehouse is characterized by a three-story, three-bay arcade supporting three bays, with four window openings in each bay at the fourth floor. At the roofline is a simple cornice below a parapet with a pier extension defining each bay separation.

Ornamentation of the structure is minimal and reflects its designed use as a ware-house. There is some highlighting of the brick by the use of stone drips around the radiating voussoirs at the tops of the arches and above the double hung windows at the fourth story. The third-story windows are lunettes within the arch and contain multipane glass. On the first floor in each of the arches there are three bays with six-pane transoms over single pane windows. The entrance is centrally located. Red sandstone has been used to face the foundation. The frame streetfront does not appear to have undergone any major alteration since construction.

In the 1930s, the Neo-Colonial Revival Montgomery Ward Building was erected directly east of the Henkel-Duke property, and the Henkel-Duke Building was used as warehouse space for Montgomery Ward. The only alterations made during construction were the cutting of an access door between the two structures and the finishing of the second floor of the warehouse to match the interior of the new Montgomery Ward building.

The west wall has only a few bays at the first floor level. An enclosed early loading dock of wood frame with metal siding is attached to the southwest side and rear (south).

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Constructed c. 1895, the Henkel-Duke Building is a distinctive example of 19th century warehouse design. It was built as the office and warehouse for the Henkel-Duke Mercantile Company, one of the leading wholesale grocery warehouses in southern Colorado. At one time, there were a number of warehouses in Pueblo which reflected this style of architecture; the Henkel Duke building is the sole remaining example.

Charles Henkel and Nathaniel Duke, who founded the business, were members of prominent Pueblo pioneer families. Charles Henkel was born in Hesse-Cassel, Germany in 1845. At the age of four, Henkel, with his parents and relatives, emigrated to America. It is thought that Henkel first arrived in Pueblo in 1862 (according to the records of the Southern Colorado Pioneers Association). In his obituary(1926), reference is made to the fact that one of the freight wagon trains on which Henkel worked camped at old Fort Pueblo site prior to the establishment of the town in 1870.

When the Civil War broke out, Henkel joined the ranks of Company E of the First Colorado Cavalry and served during the massacre of Sand Creek. In 1865, the Colorado Cavalry was disbanded and Henkel was discharged in Denver. In the early spring of 1869, Henkel was again in Pueblo. He, in partnership with a man named Ross, founded the well-known City Bakery on Santa Fe Avenue, between Fifth and Sixth streets.

Following a series of partnerships at varous business locations, Henkel emerges in the grocery business under the name of Charles Henkel & Company. The firm, located at the corner of Santa Fe and Sixth Street, was reported to have on hand the largest and most complete stock of staple and fancy groceries in southern Colorado. In 1876, Nathaniel Duke joined Henkel in the grocery business. The company later evolved into the wholesale grocery business.

Nathaniel W. Duke (1846-1893) was born in Kentucky. He came to Pueblo in 1868 and worked for the Thatcher brothers in their general merchandise store. Together, Henkel and Duke built one of the most successful wholesale grocery businesses in southern Colorado.

Following Duke's death in 1893, his family continued in partnership with Henkel. (The 1899-1900 City Directory lists the company as the Henkel-Duke Mercantile Company, with Ella Ayers, Duke's widow, and his son Thomas as officers.)

Both Duke and Henkel played an active role in the development of the Pueblo community. Duke served a term as county treasurer in the early 1870s. Henkel served as both a county commissioner and mayor of Pueblo.

The Henkel-Duke Building is an excellent example of warehouse design in Pueblo of the late 19th century. The arched bays, decorative brick and stonework, and intact storefront add to the architectural interest.
