#### NARRATIVE DESCRIPTION

The Henry and Anna Kochsmeier House is located in the heart of the residential district that is the E.P. Drew Addition platted in 1924. This domestic single dwelling is Spanish Colonial Revival style and is of wood frame and stucco. Of modest size, the residence is probably less than 2000 square feet in size. Its significant features are white stucco, red clay tile, parapets, attic vents referential of canales, and corbelled brackets. The building and grounds appear immaculately maintained so that the current condition of the property is very good. The building has good integrity in terms of its location, design, and materials as, under original ownership into the 1980's, the owner executed alterations to the house with the same design intent as when the house was first built. The few alterations are sympathetic to the character of the building. The property itself conveys integrity with regard to association and feeling; however, it is rather isolated individually as much of the surrounding historic fabric of the neighborhood does not survive. However, what still remains, however in the larger context is the orientation of the neighborhood to the railroad lines rather than to the north/south orientation of later development.

This residence is located on a large corner lot in a residential area, but it also stands directly across from across from a light industrial property. The overall shape of the plan is I-shaped, with a projecting wing and an entry porch at the junction of the two wings and an entry porch at the junction of the two wings. The building is one story, with two bays formed by the division in the façade that is created by the wing. The house is constructed of wood, stucco, and red clay tile, and has a flat roof with parapet walls typical of its style. There is a front entry porch with a red tile shed roof; the porch is partially enclosed on the front façade with 3' high wall that provides support to wood posts. The wood posts support corbelled brackets above. There is also a rear porch with the red tile shed roof, wood posts and corbelled brackets. The windows are 4/4 single hung aluminum windows with real divided lights onto which metal security bars have been added.

The entry doors are double wood doors located on the right side of the front wing and facing directly onto the covered porch. The chimney is visible on the side façade and is very simple in it's massing. It tapers at an angle at a point above the chimney box. It, like the rest of the house, is covered in white stucco. Important decorative elements consist of the red clay tile on the porch covers, the stepped parapet with a molded coping treatment, canales on two side facades, and corbelled porch column brackets. Hardwood floors, built-in storage, a fireplace, and plastered coved ceilings are some of the house's significant interior features. A basement with an outside entrance only was added sometime after the house was built.

There are three outbuildings: a garage, a shed, and another house. The garage is stucco with a flat roof and the frame and stucco house is two stories. The garage and shed are both located to the rear, while the house faces onto a side street. No dates are available for the construction of any of these outbuildings, but the garage is executed in a similar manner and probably is contemporary to the house. Adjacent to the side of the house is the driveway, which is probably original, as well; it is constructed, as driveways were earlier in the century, with two long strips of concrete just slightly wider than the wheel treads of a car. The rear porch and the front porch cover are additions, and a rear sleeping porch has been enclosed. All of these additions were done after 1980. The front room may have been a porch at one time; if so, it was enclosed at a date sometime before 1980. The house and the garage are both contributing elements to the property; the two-story house located toward the rear of the property and the shed are both non-contributing.

#### NARRATIVE STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

#### SUMMARY

The Henry and Anna Kochsmeier House is significant under Criterion C as an excellent example of the Spanish Colonial Revival style under the context of Architecture in Casa Grande, 1900-1950. The period of significance is the 1929 date of initial construction. The building is an excellent example of a style popular at the time of its construction. There are ten buildings executed in the Spanish Colonial Revival style of the Single-Family Neighborhood Dwelling Property type in the area considered by the Historic Resource Survey- Casa Grande, Arizona (Pry 1998); this is one of them. There are eight additional buildings of this property type included in the survey that have Spanish Colonial Revival detailing only, making a total of eighteen buildings of this property type that employ this style within the Casa Grande survey area. This group of eighteen comprises the largest group of buildings employing a particular style of the two hundred-and-twenty buildings of this property type within the survey area, representative of the prevalence of Spanish-style buildings in Casa Grande. The style of the building is strongly conveyed in the stuccoed walls, corbelled porch posts, tall windows, and double wood door. It also has the massing and roof profile of a Pueblo Revival house, but it lacks vigas and has an ornamental coping at the top of its walls. The property also has good integrity, with the design and materials intact and unaltered except for the alteration of some windows and enclosure of a rear porch. As a member of the Single Family Neighborhood Dwelling property type, the building is in its original location within a residential neighborhood. As a member of the Primary Structure subtype, this building possesses the characteristics of its type as it sits within a neighborhood of dwelling buildings of the same property subtype, and shares the same setbacks and orientation as those adjacent buildings. The building is set on the front of the site with a front yard serving as a transition between the building and the street. The property has a high degree of stylistic detail in proportion to scale that is commonly found on buildings of this type. The architectural style retains adequate integrity for listing as a member of its property type. A matching detached garage and a guesthouse are members of the Secondary Structures subtype of the Single Family Neighborhood Dwelling property type. The garage outbuilding conveys an aesthetic and a time period similar to the primary residence, while the questhouse was built at a later date.

#### HISTORY OF PROPERTY

In 1929, local farmer Henry and Anna Kochsmeier had this house built for them by C.F. Williams, a local contractor. The current owners bought the house in 1980 from Kochsmeier's son, the house having stayed under family ownership since its construction. It appears in the county assessment rolls but not on the Sanborn maps, which did not cover this area. At the time of her death in 1983- her husband was already deceased- Anna was still living in the house, which subsequently was occupied for a time by her son, Henry.
