Section 7 Narrative Description

This two-story, Craftsman style single-family residence is located on the southwest side of Elliot Drive, one lot north of its Y-shaped intersection with South Oak Knoll within the subdivision identified as Tract No. 360 in the Oak Knoll area of Pasadena. The dwelling faces northeast, and is moderately set back on a flat 101'x130' lot that is landscaped with turf, flowerbeds, and mature shrubs and trees. A low stuccoed wall with two sets of short, stuccoed pillars (circa 1995) and lamps line the front of the property and border a public, concrete walkway that separates a wide parkway planted with turf, ivy, and mature street trees. The pillars support a pair of meet l gates that allows pedestrian and vehicular access to the property. A modern, linear concrete walk with brick accents was added at the concrete driveway north of the residence. This driveway, as it did originally, intersects with the public walkway usear the northeast corner of the lot and leads west to a rear, detached non-contributing 2-car garage (1911), which underwent a small, 48-square-foot addition in 1946 and has been stuccoed (date unknown). The residence has undergone few exterior alterations since its construction. In 1938, a rear, sleeping porch was glassed in and is now walled, and in the 1990s, a rear kitchen window box was added, the southwest patio entry doors were replaced, and the composition shingle roof was reclad. In addition, the square fixed center window on the from the original design of the bay. The residence is painted black and trimmed in brown and tan. It is in excellent condition and retains a high degree of architectural integrity.

This irregular-shaped, wood-framed dwelling is supported by a poured-in-place concrete wall foundation that encloses a partial basement. The complex roof form has multiple, low-pitched intersecting gables that are now topped with light brown composition shingles; the original roofing material was wood shingle. A side-facing gable shelters most of the first story and a prominent front gable covers the raised entry porch. Another large, front gable rises from the main mass to cap most of the second floor. A second story, side gable is found on the northwest elevation, and a separately gabled mass extends from the rear, southwest corner of the dwelling, atop a projecting first floor rear gable. A stuccoed chimney rises near the juncture of these gables. A dropped, secondary gable pierced by a matching chimney emerges from the southeast elevation and is balanced by an extension of the main side gable on the opposite (northwest) elevation, which serves as a porte cochere; behind this, a flat-roofed mass contains an interior stairway anding. Wide gable ends are supported by rounded, hand-shaped extended roof beams that are doubled in most locations; vergeboards are similarly extended and curved. Wide, open eaves have exposed rafter tails with rounded, hand-shaped ends over walls sheathed in coursed cedar shingles. Fenestration consists mainly of wood-framed casement with a large, lower pane and two horizontal, parallel mullions near the top of the sash. Matching casement windows flank the main, fixed window, and large, single-paned, fixed windows are found on the primary facade. A three-sided bay at obtuse angles topped by a separate, projecting gable is found beneath the prominent second story front gable; the center window on the bay is a large fixed pane and is flanked by pairs of double-hung windows. The center pane was originally square, but has been lengthened slightly, approximately 12 inches (date unknown). Wood strapwork in a contrasting color frames the windows and articulates the façade. Awnings of tan fabric have been added above windows on the rear and side (northwest) elevations.

The off-centered entrance porch is raised by three low steps at the front and side (northwest) elevations and floored in scored concrete. The massive front gable that shelters the porch extends further than most and is supported by a heavy, patterned rafter trussing system whose hand-shaped stickwork appears Japanese-influenced. The gable is supported on each end by three original, stuccoed Tuscan columns, which were originally sheathed in a smoother finish. The entry's original wood door has a vertical pattern light. Side patios are found on the northwest and southeast elevations. The small, northwest concrete patio is recessed with wood-and-glass entry doors and large, double, fixed sidelights. Both doors and sidelights have the two horizontal, parallel

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mullions near the top of the sash. A portion of the second story mass overhangs the patio and is supported by heavy, hand-shaped brackets.

The opposite patio is larger and floored with fieldstone, and steps down to a side yard path covered by a wood pergola that is supported by stuccoed columns and draped with bougainvillea. This patio has a garden entry of curved wood-and-glass doors (added in the 1990s) flanked by screened casement windows. A modest fourth entry allows access to a rear laundry room. Originally, the rear second floor of the residence also had a sleeping porch, which, according to building permits, was enclosed with glass in 1938. Sometime afterward (date unknown), it was walled in and is now clad in shingles.

On the interior, the first floor offers a living room, dining room, kitchen, laundry, and office; the second floor serves as a sleeping area with five bedrooms and two baths. The interior retains many impressive original features, including a tile fireplace by Ernest Batchelder with Inglenook benches and an unsigned plein air mural; no information that would conclusively identify the artist has been uncovered. Heavy beams segment the ceiling of the living room. Hardwood floors are found throughout, and trim pieces are of mahogany. In 1960, the kitchen underwent a substantial remodel when an interior door was plastered in and another created. At that time, cabinets were replaced, and a new sink, stove, and dishwasher were installed.

An original, detached 2-car garage rests on a concrete foundation on the northeast corner of the property. The non-contributor has a flat roof topped with composition shingles and has been sheathed in stucco (date unknown). The wood vehicle door on the northeast elevation is decorated with patterned boards painted tan. A small, 6x8 foot addition was added to the garage in 1946, and the primary elevation was reshingled in 2001 and painted black to match the residence.

This Craftsman style residence makes use of natural materials, such as heavy timber and wood shingles, which help articulate the style, and boasts many character defining features, including low-pitched gables with exposed rafters, extended roof beams that support each gable end, and the prominent front façade porch gable. In addition, Japanese influence is apparent in this very large front porch gable, whose functional trusing system also provides ornamentation in its hand-shaped wood members.

Section 8 Statement of Significance

Built in 1911, the house at 674 Elliot Drive was designed by Arthur S. Heineman and constructed by John H. Simpson for Winslow B. Ross, a rancher, who lived there with his wife Mary. The dwelling represents the property type "Arts and Crafts Single-Family Residences in Pasadena" and is an excellent example of the Craftsman style within the subtype "two-story Arts and Crafts period house." It meets the registration requirements under Criterion C, as it exemplifies the values of design, craftsmanship and materials, which embody the philosophy and practice of Arts and Crafts period residential architecture in Pasadena, and the property retains integrity. As seen in some Craftsman style residences in Pasadena, Oriental influence is evident, particularly in the hand-shaped, patterned wood members that make up the trussing system of the dominant front porch gable. Distinguishing features associated with the style include use of heavy timber, wide eaves with exposed rafters, and a natural palette of materials, such as the wood shingle exterior cladding.

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
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Sketch Map

 Contributing Garage

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
