


Roof/Chimneys:

Gable w/parapet; shingle finish; exterior end chimneys north & south.

Additional Architectural Description:

Molded label lintels above all major 1st & 2nd floor windows; stone finials top corners & apex of gable parapets; basement wall forms high chamfered plinth below 1st floor windows. Parapet gable extends forward in the 3rd bay, w/ elaborate oriel window at center, 2nd floor; panelled entrance door below Tudor arch, cartouche above on the first floor. Entrance flanked by wrought iron lanterns opens to terrace w/ stone balustrade w/ shallow risers from the north. Double door from driveway in terrace wall below main entrance. Broad bay window 4th bay, 1st floor, shows heraldic emblems at center diamond light casements; Tudor emblems on all rainwater leaders. Carved stone eagles surmount tall piers w/ wrought iron lantern at center on either side of entrance driveway on north-east corner of property.

SITING, BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION, AND RELATED STRUCTURES:

The home lies at the center of a large 248° x 476° lot. Well set back from the street on a steep sloping site, the residence is approached by a long driveway which circles the property from the north-east corner.

SIGNIFICANCE:	
This distinguished manor home was built for the Eshbaugh family. Reputed to h cost \$1,000,000, it was considered one of the most extravagant homes of the ti in the metropolitan era. A family of stone masons was brought from Italy for one year to cut & set the stone.	ave me
Inside, the house is treated with equal splendor. The first floor with its library in the style of Christopher Wren and imported fifteenth century panelling presents an English character. There are tapestries in many of the rooms. The second floor shows a lighter touch & is distinctly French with 2 Louis XVI bedrooms, Aubusson carpets, & more delicate furniture & fittings. The colored marble bathrooms have gold fixtures.	
The house is included in the 1971 survey by the Montclair Historical Society. Mr. William H. Eshbaugh, a stock broker, was in the lumber business in Canada. He was prominent in opening the Gulf of St. Lawrence for the lumber industry. (Continued under "Comments")
