Describe present and historic physical appearance.

Pine Island is a seventy-seven acre island, roughly triangular in shape, located in the northeast quadrant of the St. Helena Island Complex. The Pine Island Plantation Complex is located at the southern end of the island. The complex includes a main house (c. 1904), cottage (c. 1915), toolshed/doghouse (c. 1904), barn (c. 1936), and pumphouse (c. 1928). An automobile garage (c. 1928) is located at the southwest end of the causeway (c. 1904) leading to the Pine Island Plantation Complex and both are contributing properties. Included on the plantation grounds are hedges planted as borders for what appears to be planned riding paths. The kitchen was originally twenty feet from the main house and burned in 1925 causing some damage to a corner of the main house.

The main house is stylistically similar to the American Foursquare vernacular form. The two-story frame structure was built on an existing tabby foundation. The exterior walls are covered with wood shingles. A two-story porch extends across the main (east) facade. One end bay of the second level of the porch has been enclosed. A one-story polygonal bay extends from the south facade.

The cottage and the toolshed/doghouse also are frame structures with exterior wood shingle walls. The cottage is raised on a brick pier foundation. Both have pyramidal, standing seam metal roofs.

The pump house is rectangular in shape, of frame construction, with a metal gable roof. The exterior walls are of vertical wood siding. The structure rests on a concrete foundation.

The barn is of frame construction with weatherboard exterior walls. It has a standing seam metal roof. The barn is rectangular in shape with a shed roof extension located at the rear.

The automobile garage is rectangular in shape, of frame construction, with a metal gable roof. The exterior walls are shiplap.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Pine Island Plantation Historic Complex is significant as a collection of historic properties which is an excellent intact example of an early twentieth century hunting plantation. The concept of hunting plantations first developed in the late nineteenth century and increased in popularity in the early twentieth century. They were generally owned by wealthy businessmen and professionals and were basically used as a retreat for a few weeks or perhaps longer. They were used for quail hunting from November to April and for entertaining business associates at other times. In some instances only the land was leased, "to hunt and shoot forever."

The main house at Pine Island Plantation was built c. 1904 by Thomas Lee of Westport, N. Y., who did much of the finishing work himself. For a time, he shared the ownership of Pine Island with Dr. Arthur W. Elting of Albany, N. Y. Dr. Elting, once president of the American Medical Association, bought Lee out in 1926 and continued using the complex as a hunting plantation.(1)

Although no archaeological survey has been conducted at the Pine Island Plantation complex, the early and extensive occupation, limited amount of landscape disturbing activities, and historically and architecturally significant activities in the area suggest that the site has the potential to yield valuable archaeological data.
