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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The four-row carousel by the William F. Mangels Company Carousel Works, manufactured about 1914, has 16 lighted sweeps which can hold 42 horses mounted on brass poles. The wooden platform has a diameter of 45 feet, and the center pole reaches a height of 18 feet. The wooden horses on the carousel were created by the company's leading carvers, Marcus Charles Illions and Charles Carmel. They are embellished with glass eyes and jeweled trappings. The array combines standers and jumpers. Also on the platform are two single-seat chariots, the sides of which are superbly modeled as mythical gryphons.

The machine is crested with 16 wooden rounding boards, some of which have painted scenes, and 16 mirrored shields. Beveled mirrors and lights also decorate the panels which are hung around the hub of the machine.

The carousel is powered by an electric motor that converts power via V-belts to a large flywheel. The manual friction clutch transfers the power to a bevel and pinion gear that turns a shaft which in turn moves a sprocket to rotate the machine. All gears and mechanical parts are original to the carousel. The engine generates a rotation speed of approximately 6mph. 1

Because it is operated as an outdoor machine, the mechanism is covered with a canvas canopy. The original finish of the rounding boards was badly worn. Present treatment, including Oregon landscape scenes, is a result of Perrons' restoration in 1978.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Oregon Historic Wooden Carousels Theme Resource nomination is comprised of five hand-crafted carousels of American manufacture presently operating in the state of Oregon. The nominated carousels range in date from 1904 to 1926, a period which spans much of the last half of the golden age of carousels (1875-1935) and the heyday of amusement parks. The common characteristics of carousels in the group are wooden platforms, wooden rounding boards, hand-carved animals, and a counter clockwise rotation pattern. Each is now electrically powered, using friction clutch or hydraulic clutch mechanical systems. Collectively and individually, the machines meet National Register Criterion C as well-preserved examples of a recreational genre illustrative of the development of animal carving as a "functional" art form wherein the carvers competed to create the most novel and colorful attractions.

A mid-sized machine measuring 45 feet in diameter, the William F. Mangels four-row carousel is a rare example of its class. Mangels' carousel works produced a large number of the 24 lavishly decorated carousels operating at New York's popular Coney Island Amusement Park during the park's heyday. A leading entrepreneur of the outdoor amusement industry, Mangels was the inventor of thrill rides, such as the Whip and the Tickler. From the turn-of-the-century onward, his master carver was Russian-born Marcus Charles Illions, whose work, outstanding for its design and execution, may be seen in the carousel's array of horses in dramatic poses, feathery, wind-swept manes and elaborate trappings. It is believed the hand of carver Charles Carmel may be distinguished in the work also.

The mechanism of Mangels'16-sweep machine is noteworthy. Mangels was an accomplished inventor and mechanic. In 1907, he patented an improved galloping-horse action machine of which this carousel is an example. Mangels produced a strongly built mechanism, and earned himself an excellent reputation as a carousel maker. Another reason for Mangels' success was that he used the carving services of two of the best known and admired carvers; Charles Carmel and Marcus Illions.

Marcus Charles Illions had been apprenticed to Charles I. D. Looff. In 1902, Illions became involved with supplying carousel horses for William F. Mangels, and continued to do so even after starting his own carousel company. Illions is considered to be one of the most flamboyant and talented of the carousel carvers. He is noted for exquisitely carved manes, and for the wildness in the expression of his horses' faces. It is said that his horses "not only embody the sensitivity that was a permanent characteristic of his work, but display fantasies of frozen movement that transcend craftsmanship to create original works of art." (Weedon and Ward, Fairgound Art.)

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Charles Carmel spent most of his working career associated with the William F. Mangels Company. The quality of his work was considered to be consistently high. Carmel horses were well-proportioned, their manes carved in a windswept style, and they followed accepted poses of the day. An extensive use of glass jewels also became a distinctive feature of Carmel's work. It is knownthat Carmel and Illions worked in association on several of Mangels carousels, and their work was coordinated through standardization of such accessories as feathers, jewels, and a checker-board design on the saddle blankets.

The carousel originally was installed at Emerson Park in Auburn, New York during 1914. After years of storage, Harry and Carol Koch purchased the machine and placed it in service. In 1978, the carousel was purchased again and brought to Portland, Oregon. The carousel has been operating at the World Forestry Center in Washington Park for the past eight years.

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The nominated property is approximately 4,534 square feet, to include the carousel and the circular concrete pad on which it is mounted and the grassy area surrounding it which is enclosed by a six-foot high cyclone fence.

The area may be located as follows:

Commencing at the center of Section 5, Township 1S, Range 1E, Willamette Meridian, in Portland, Multnomah County, Oregon, thence North 89° 53' 25" West along the East-West half section line of said Section 5, 1698.21' to a point on the City of Portland, Oregon's westerly boundary; thence South 0° 03' 15" along said westerly boundary, 878.00 feet to a point; thence North 81° 43' 45" East, 518.00 feet to a point very near the center of the carousel.
