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Condition: Excellent
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Description: Foster Hall is a two and one-half story, Spanish Colonial Baroque Style building built of masonry and stucco. It has a hip, mission tile roof with overhang and rafter extensions. Windows are 2/2 double hung metal. There is relief decoration over the north (main) first floor fenestration. The arched entry is very ornate with glazed polychrome relief tile. There are murals inside the front entry. The cornice above the entry has urns placed at each end. There is a large addition on the south side of this building that does not affect major facades of the original building. Foster Hall was designed by Braunton and McGhee and built in 1930. Its historical and current use is as classrooms. The original building is rectangular in shape. **United States Department of the interior** National Park Service

Significance Areas of Significance: Architecture Dates: 1930 Builder/Architect: Braunton & McGhee Statement of Significance, Criterion C: Foster Hall is one of four buildings on the NMSU campus to be included in this nomination and of these the only building constructed in the Spanish Colonial Baroque Style. Other NMSU buildings in this style were not eligible for nomination either by virtue of alteration or lack of sufficient age. Foster Hall is significant as a representative of the continuing influence of the Trost plan into the 1930's, which is reflected in the use of the California Mission Revival and Spanish Colonial Baroque styles. 9.
