Holly Hill house is located on the south side of Maryland Route 261 approximately one and a half miles east of the intersection of Maryland Route 261 and Solomon's Island Road at Friendship, Maryland. The entire property lays on both sides of the road.

Holly Hill is significant in that it is one of the extant examples of the Medieval Transitional style of architecture used in Maryland during the mid-seventeenth century. Its development from a primitive frame dwelling to a comfortable, handsome, brick house reflects a pattern repeated in early Tidewater houses. Other examples in Anne Arundel County are Cedar Park and Sudley, although Sudley remained frame.

As originally built in 1667, this red brick, "T" shaped house was a two-room, story-and-a-half, frame structure. Several years later two more rooms were added, and in 1704 the whole was brick veneered. In 1730, another brick wing was added, giving the house its present "T".

The inventory of Samuel Harrison's estate (1733) lists thirteen rooms, including a kitchen as well as a library of 195 books. Harrison's "store," meaning storeroom, contained abundant supplies of everything from cooper's tools to tobacco boxes to India silk.

Interesting features of the house include original brick vaulting in the cellar, fine panelling and moldings, ancient glass panes, batten doors with original hardware, a wall of rare marbleized panelling; and three eighteenth-century paintings on wood, one on canvas. Among the four paintings, two are of particular relevance:

A plat entitled "Samuel Harrison's Land Near Herring Bay," which includes an inset view of the house and garden as it looked in the early eighteenth century.

The other is a view of a landlocked harbor with two vessels (one flying the British flag), a two-story house, and a man and boy standing near the water's edge. The theory is that the scene represents Herring Bay and vessels of the planters.

The original eighteenth-century garden plan with pebbled walkways has been restored, and is enclosed by a hedge of English
boxwood. The present owners (1971) are in the process of extending the grounds and gardens.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The architecture of Holly Hill is significant in the heritage of Maryland as one of the few examples of Medieval Transitional architecture (17th century) in the state; and Holly Hill is significant for its role in the tobacco-growing culture of early southern Maryland.

The history of Holly Hill's successful production of quality tobacco, and its association with the Harrison family for over 200 years, is documented. It shows a way of life dependent upon the cultivation, and marketing methods of an export crop, stable in Maryland as early as 1698. As a Quaker businessman with political acumen, Harrison was prominent in the county and the state.

Richard Harrison ( -1716), as did the majority of planters on the Chesapeake Bay, raised tobacco for export sale in England to barter an exchange for necessities and luxuries tying them economically, culturally and intellectually to the mother country.

Holly Hill is situated on part of the Holland's Hills tract originally patented in 1664 to Francis Holland, a Justice of Anne Arundel County and a Quaker member of Herring Creek Meeting. If the original frame dwelling can be proven to be c.1667 the builder of that portion of the house would have been a Holland.

In 1685 Richard Harrison, a Quaker member of Herring Creek Meeting, acquired a portion of Holland's Hills. Before his death in 1716, Richard Harrison enclosed in brick the 1667 frame structure. While living at Holly Hill in 1688 Richard Harrison joined other Quakers in thanking Charles Calvert, Third Lord Baltimore, for allowing Friends to affirm, rather than swear allegiance to, the proprietor. Eleven years later, with his son, Samuel Harrison, he was one of eight trustees for the Herring Creek meeting house located near Holly Hill. Quaker meetings were often held in Holly Hill before 1700 and the Quaker records indicate that a meeting was held there at least once in 1710.

#### #10. GEOGRAPHICAL DATA continued

I have reviewed the matter of the amount of land proposed to protect Holly Hill, and have considered how the acreage may be reduced. The omission of small, irregular portions of some acreage would be awkward to spell out, and would hardly accomplish a worthwhile purpose.

I have examined the house and its setting in an irregular topography with visible highlands in two directions.

It is my firm conviction that the designated 585.6 acres be accepted as proposed. After viewing the vicinity and lay of the land, and having extensive knowledge of the exceeding importance of this remarkable and worthwhile historic house, this protective acreage is fully justified.

Structures of this unusual architectural quality and cultural impact are rare indeed; the building was erected in three stages in the late seventeenth and early eighteenth centuries. The architectural details are extremely valuable, and four murals c. 1720 contemporary to the early house remain intact, as well as extensive, intact wood paneling, trim and construction details. The protective setting for so important a structure should be most carefully and fully considered. As State Liaison Officer, I firmly recommend that 585.6 acres be designated to protect Holly Hill.

#### #8. SIGNIFICANCE continued

Esther Palmer, a Quaker, recorded in her diary a visit to Holly Hill in 1705.

Samuel Harrison (1679-1733), who inherited Holly Hill from his father, Richard, added a brick wing creating a "T". His brother, Richard Harrison, sold (c.1725) his inherited land portion before moving to Philadelphia.

Holly Hill remained in the Harrison family until 1850 when the widow of Joseph Harrison, a direct descendent of Richard Harrison, through his son Samuel Harrison, sold it to John H. Somerville. In 1855 William B. Scrivener purchased the house, later leaving it to his son, Frederick W. Scrivener. The mid-twentieth-century owners included Captain Hugh P. Le Claire, USN Retired, who restored Holly Hill, and the present (1971) owner, Brice McAdoo Clagett, who is a descendent of the Harrisons.


