DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Located in the heart of Manitou Springs at 819 Manitou Avenue, the Barker House is a single detached structure built in the shape of a "U". The structure has three and one-half stories along its main or north facade, and is built primarily of wood set over a stone foundation. The main facade along Manitou Avenue is accentuated by three features: a central projection with clustered windows that rises to a peak and two turrets located at either end. The east side of the structure has seven bays, the west side nine bays, and the main facade seven bays in addition to the openings on the main projection and turrets. A covered veranda extends along the first floor of the main facade. The roof is gabled and displays four dormers on the north side, three on the east, and four on the west. There are several small chimneys placed here and there.

The secondary features give the structure its distinctive period feeling. The most notable are the four story turrets, a characteristic element of Victorian architecture. Those on the Barker House are polygonal. The one on the east side is open at the fourth story, but covered by a dome; the one on the west side is narrower than its counterpart, but is also covered by a dome. With the exception of a few fixed windows on the first floor, all the windows are two-sashed and double-hung. The main entry is located in the center of the main facade; secondary entryways occur on both the east and west sides and also on the south at the two ends of the "U". The structure is sheathed in clapboard and shingles.

The interior retains many of its original features. The first floor has three fireplaces; notable is the lobby fireplace with the original, intricate oak carving. From here a continuous staircase with oak bannister winds up to the fourth floor, but there is also an elevator as the Barker House was the first hotel in Manitou Springs to offer such service. Individual rooms on the second floor all have two fireplaces. Each floor of the structure has about 7,000 square feet of space. Overall, there are 110 guest units, many of which have lost their original elegance in the passage of time, but which will be rehabilitated through the major restoration now in progress.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

1870s to present

The Barker House, or Navajo Hotel as it is sometimes called, is significant for its association with Charles W. Barker, an important politician in Manitou Springs, and for its architectural features which reflect the characteristic elements of resort hotels built in the Rocky Mountains during the late Victorian era.

It was during the early 1870s that the town of Manitou Springs, located in the foothills of the Rockies west of Colorado Springs, began to develop into a resort area as opposed to the elite community envisioned by its principal planners, William A. Bell and William Jackson Palmer, the founders of both Colorado Springs and the Denver & Rio Grande Railway. A number of hotels emerged at this time including one built by a Theodore Pine, a local artist. In the early 1880s Pine's structure passed into the hands of Charles W. Barker, a well-known local personage whose public career included service as mayor and town trustee, seventeen years on the school board, and eight years in the Colorado General Assembly. Barker made additions to the property and converted it into a fashionable resort whose elegance, concerts, and other entertainment attracted a clientele of the rich and influential. After Barker's death in 1905 the hotel remained popular but eventually fell into decline as public tastes changed over the years.

From an architectural perspective the Barker House reflects the characteristic features of early resort hotels built in the Rocky Mountains. It is not a pretentious building, but rather more "rustic" in keeping with the mountain setting. Yet the turrets on the main facade betray the Victorian influence. All this was typical of the large, frame hotels built in the mountains during this era.
