#### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Stone School is a rectangular structure approximately 35' x 70' built into the side of Zion's Hill, so that the rear of the building is essentially three stories, and the sides and front, two stories. The walls are random rubble (some granite, and some shale) with granite quoins. A continuous granite belt course at ground level forms the lintels for the opening on the basement level at the rear of the building. Windows on the other floors have granite lintels, except in the case of a double window in the (front) gable end over the entrance where there is a semi-circular stone relieving arch. The windows are six panes over six, with some of the original glass remaining. There is a two-stage corbelled cornice with corner returns; the gable ends of the roof are defined by a simple rake extension. There are two chimneys.

The two interior floors are of wood construction. The walls are plastered, and there are metal sidings and ceilings. Iron beam ties have been used.

The great granite steps have been worn by generations of school children. Other changes which have taken place are the addition of a small wooden vestibule at the front, a side door on the south side, a fire escape on the north side, and the asphalt roof.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Construction of the Stone School began in 1841 and was completed in time for its opening on May 1, 1842. Probably most of the exterior work was done in 1841. When it was turned over to the New Market Historical Society in 1966, it was quite possibly the oldest school in New Hampshire used continuously since its construction.

The stone work, which is unusual, was done by William and Robert Channel of Newmarket. Their farm was on what is now called Bay Road, formerly known as Lubberland Road, in the section of Newmarket near the head of Newmarket Neck. The Channels quarried the stone on Durham Point, or perhaps in that part of Durham Point which became, in 1870, a part of Newmarket. The brick work and plastering were done by Augustus Bradford.

The contract for the seats, desks and blackboards was given to Jewett Tasker of Newmarket. It specified that the furniture was to be made of the same wood and of "like workmanship as the pews in the Methodist meeting house." Some of the old black-boards which remain may be original ones.

Newmarket has other fine examples of stone architecture--the Universalist Meeting House (Stone Church), also on Zion's Hill; and of course, the unexcelled old granite mills by the falls of the Lamprey River. The Stone School is an important part of this architectural heritage in our little mill town.
