DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Thomas J. Majors house, located in the Missouri River town of Peru, is a large two-story brick structure nestled into the bank of a gradually sloping hill. The house, which faces east, has a full frontal porch surrounded by a spindlework rail. A small second story walkout sets atop the first floor porch roof. This walkout features a gable roof and spindlework rail. The house has over 35 window openings which break up the otherwise unadorned facades. All door and window openings excluding those of the walkout basement are topped with jack arches. The basement lintels are segmentally arched. A three-quarter length closed-in porch skirts the west or rear facade of the house and overlooks the farmyard area. A kitchen wing projecting from the north facade provides the only irregularity in the otherwise rectangular building. Five chimneys and two dormer windows penetrate the truncated hip roof, which is covered with pressed metal shingles. A corbeled brick cornice provides simple relief under the eaves.

The interior plan of the house is six over six rooms. A wide central stairhall runs from the front of the house to the rear (east to west) dividing the house in half with three rooms per side on each floor. An open stairway rises along the north wall of this hallway. The interior of the house retains much of its historical character.

The grounds around the house are nicely landscaped with mature trees and shrubs. The entire house-yard is surrounded by a white three-board fence.

Also on the Majors property is a gable-roofed barn of timber construction, sheathed with board and batten. Banked into the side of a hill, the barn rests on a limestone foundation. Doors in both gable ends provide access to the first floor central aisle which allows passage through the barn. This ground level floor was designed to house grain and tack along with implement storage. A small loft provides hay storage above this ground level floor. Entry to the basement level is on the south side only. This level is divided into stalls for cattle and horses. A chutefrom a first floor grain bin carries feed down to the lower level.

Three other frame buildings occupy the area near the house and barn: these are a small corn crib, a shed and a garage. The barnyard area is enclosed with a board fence.

The present owners operate a cattle raising business on the property.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Thomas Jefferson Majors was born June 25, 1841 in Jefferson County, Iowa. His parents, Sterling P. and Ann Majors were Kentucky natives who in 1837 migrated to Iowa and established a general store. Thomas was educated in public schools in Iowa and apprenticed in his father's store. In 1859, he packed a supply of goods and set out for Nebraska Territory, where he founded a general merchandise business in Peru, a tiny Missouri River settlement known only for its trading post. Majors operated his store until 1861 when he enlisted in the First Nebraska Infantry. He served until the end of the war and was mustered out in 1866 in Omaha afterwhich he returned to Peru.

In the fall of 1866, Majors' political career began to develop with his election to the Nebraska Territorial Council. While holding this office, Majors was very active in promoting the idea of using Old Mount Vernon College (1863) in Peru as a State Normal School. His endeavors were successful in 1867 when the property was given to the State and subsequently became what is now known as Peru State Teachers College. One of the recently constructed buildings on campus bears his name.

During his lengthy political career he served several terms as a State senator, two terms as lieutenant governor (1891-1895), was an unsuccessful Republican candidate for governor and served as U.S. Congressman from 1878-79. Other positions held by Majors throughout his life were: assessor for the Internal Revenue Service for the Nebraska District, a director of the Citizen's State Bank of Peru and president of the State Normal Board.

Besides his political and commercial interests, T.J. Majors had a very successful farming and stock raising operation on his vast estate adjoining the town of Peru. He was also active in the Grand Army of the Republic and built his home large enough to accommodate meetings of the organization.

In 1870, Majors married Isabelle Bushong and raised a family of five children. He purchased the portion of land on which this house and barn stand in 1872, and probably built a house and this barn on the property soon after. The present brick house was built in the 1890's.




