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Narrative Description

A beautiful old structure is located in the center of a residential district between Fourth and Fifth Streets in Sumner, Iowa. It was built in 1901—a new school to educate the growing population in and around Sumner. The architect combined Romanesque and classical revival elements to produce a building of architectural significance.

In 1915, an addition was added on the north. No changes were made to the original building and the addition blended perfectly with it. The architect was commended for his work in the the <u>Sumner Gazette</u>.

A gymnasium was built on the west side of the school in 1924. A passageway connected the two buildings. The buildings were later disconnected. Sumner schools continue to use the old gymnasium for junior high sports practices and events, whereas the old school building was sold to private individuals when it ceased to be used as a school.

The town of Sumner, located in northeast Iowa, was growing rapidly in the late 1800's. An old school built in 1876 was cramped and crowded. The school board recognized this and brought it to the attention of the people. In an article in the Sumner Gazette, A. D. Allen, president of the school board, was quoted: "There is considerable talk in favor of a good, up-to-date school building, substantially built, thoroughly modern, good for fifty years, and to cost upwards of \$15,000. Such a building would be a matter of lasting pride to the town and the payments of its cost over a period of fifteen to twenty years would do no injustice to anyone."

<u>Sumner Gazette</u> editor Linn noted in several editorials the need for more school room. The population in 1890 was 861 and in 1900, it was 1,437.

As summarized in Dr. Dennis Schuldt's *Echoes from the Past*, A. D. Allen proposed a special election and in March, 1901, voters approved \$15,000 to build a new school by a vote of 110 - 96. The decision was made to build on the same site as the old school after that structure was sold and moved. Construction bids were received in June and the contract was awarded to P. M. Tritch of Waterloo. The architectural firm selected was Murphy and Ralston, also of Waterloo.

The architect's plan called for Farley stone in the basement and foundation, with Mason City brick faced with Twin City brick above.

A beautiful three-story structure was built. Diagonal sidewalks from the south corners of the block lead to the building's arched entrance. The entrance opens into a large hall on the first floor. Windows on the south above the entrance and on the second and third floors repeat the entrance arch. The rest of the windows are rectangular.

The foundation and basement walls are in the ground five feet and above the present

surface eight feet. The exterior walls of the basement are stone. The rest of the building is brick and concrete. There are dormers protruding from the tile and shingled roof. A belfry holds the original school bell on the front of the structure. A long, hemp rope hangs from the bell to the main floor to be pulled to welcome the start of a school day. The original fire escapes are on the sides of the building. Large chimneys arise on both sides of a large skylight.

A large, central stairway with maple tread and pine risers rose to the upper floors, with pine handrails that are still stained and varnished as they were originally.

Each floor has a center hall and classrooms on both sides with twelve foot ceilings

covered with tin tiles decorated with an acanthus leaf design. There are eight classrooms for grades one through eight plus an assembly room, library, and six high school classrooms.

In 1915, a new law required the teaching of domestic science and physical training. The classrooms were all becoming overcrowded. The school board responded to the needs for more room.

An addition to the north of the building was added. The architect was J. F. Leithan of Waverly, and the builder was F. W. Chapman of Waterloo, Iowa. The addition was built on the north wall, adding four rooms and a basement underneath. The addition was constructed to carefully mimic the original architecture. A central staircase was built opposite the main entrance staircase as a mirror image to the main one and connected to it. A new door was added opening to the east. The addition was beautifully constructed, completed in

September of 1915, and the builder was complimented on his work.

None of the original structure was changed with the addition of new space. Many people were not even aware of the addition because of the skillful repetition of the original architectural elements of the building. The new classrooms had the same twelve foot decorated tin ceilings, blackboards, cupboards, and cloak rooms. They still do.

To meet the new state requirement for physical education, Sumner built a gymnasium in 1924 west of the school building, with a passageway to connect it to the school. The contract for the building went to Laurifzen Construction Co., Waterloo, Iowa, and the architect was Mortimer B. Cleveland. The total cost of the gymnasium was \$57,425.36.

The gymnasium facility was a brick building, 62 feet by 144 feet, two bays wide and three bays long. It consisted of a basement with classrooms and showers and a first floor gymnasium. The foundation is concrete. The walls are common brick with face brick and hollow tile. The trim is cut stone. The roof is flat. The building was dedicated on April 25, 1925.

School board records state a desire to have the finest gymnasium facility in the area, where community activities and drama activities could take place as well as athletic events. It was planned to have an indoor swimming pool in the basement, but it was given up because it was thought some quicksand and springs underground might cause complications.

The gymnasium is still in use today. Junior High volleyball, basketball and wrestling events

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take place there. The passageway from the school, however, was sealed off in 1988 when the school building ceased to be used as such.

The beautiful old school building served as Sumner's sole educational institution until 1953 when a new grade school was built. Then, a new high school building was constructed in 1961, which meant the days for the 1901 building (by then really a grand old lady filled with thousands of memories and well-worn hallways) were numbered. Nevertheless, the school district still used and occupied portions of the edifice until 1988. Sale was subsequently made to individuals interested in preserving it, Peter Wilharm and Forrest Cannell.

The school stands today with the original 12 foot metal ceilings and maple stairways with the worn treads. The original cloak closets and sinks remain as they were in the hallways to each room. Nothing has been changed.

An organization called *Memories are Forever* has been formed and is active here in trying to preserve the building as a museum with materials documenting the early history in and around Sumner. They want the structure to remain an active, useable resource in the town of Sumner and have generated a good deal of interest as well as donations in the community toward that end.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Sumner High School building is locally significant under criteria A and C. From 1901 to 1953 it served as this north central Iowa town's only public school building. This building is the best surviving example of Romanesque and Classical revival architecture in Sumner. The additions added in 1915 and 1924 are compatible and were designed to accommodate Sumner's growing school population as well as curriculum changes required by the Iowa legislature.

The architects were significant in their fields. John Ralston was called "the dean of architecture" in northeast Iowa. He built many fine buildings in Waterloo and northeast Iowa. He designed houses, churches, libraries, and courthouses, including the Fayette County Courthouse in West Union, Iowa.

In 1915, school enrollment was increasing and a new state law required courses in domestic science and manual training. School space was too limited for this. Superintendent Durant and his board of education proposed a four room, ten thousand dollar addition. The voters approved this in March of 1915.

Work on the new addition did not begin until July of 1915 due to rainy weather. Nevertheless, the job was completed shortly after school began in September. The architect, J.F. Leitha and contractor, F.W. Chapman of Waterloo, successfully tied the old and the new buildings together by matching the style and masonry. The new building extended to the north and consisted of four classrooms, halls, stairways, basement, and east entrance. It was beautifully done. The architect worked out a plan, which would connect the new part to the old in such a manner as to appear to be part of the original structure. Not much has been written about this architect, but his talent shows in this addition which doesn't look like an addition. One would never know anything was added on.


Mortimer B. Cleveland, architect of our gym, designed many of Waterloo's buildings, including East High School, the YMCA building, River Plaza, and many homes in northeast Iowa. The most famous examples of Cleveland's architecture are the 24 elegant homes in the Highland Park area in Waterloo. These are on the National Register of Historic Places.

Mr. Cleveland was the leading architect in this part of the state throughout the mid-1900's. He designed in a day when people intended to drop roots for fifty years or more. They wanted buildings created to last, something not seen in many developer-driven homes in the present day. People who have modified Cleveland's buildings have realized his very substantial design talents and have respected his designs. Our 1924 gym, still in use for junior high sports events, is an example of his talents.


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PLAT PLAN



Summer High School and Gymnasium First Floor

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

Second Floor


