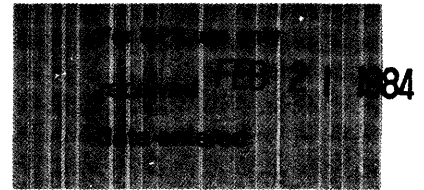

Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

This two story double house has clapboard siding and a hipped roof.

The two sections are symmetrically arranged with paired entrances in the center of the principal (northwest) facade, which is six bays wide. The sides of the house have four bays and there is a small one-story addition on the southeast corner.

The front entrances have the only distinguishing exterior ornamentation. Designed in a vernacular interpretation of the Federal style, these doorways are surmounted by a lunette with lead curvilinear configurations in each light. Enframing both entries is a full entablature with triglyphs, mutule and guttae supported by three pilasters.

Exterior alterations include a small one-story ell added in the mid-nineteenth century. The two-over-one double-hung sash, the panel doors and the corbelled chimneys are replacements which date from around 1900.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Built in 1822 for Lubec merchant, Daniel Young, who occupied the right-hand side, this structure is the only example in eastern Maine of a double Federal house with twin doorways, two stories, and a hip roof. It is also, as far as can be determined the only example of this form in the state executed in wood. There are several houses of this kind in Portland, for example, but all are brick. The building was used as a two family house until 1974 when it was converted into a four family apartment house. In 1982 it was purchased by the present owner who is engaged in a correct restoration that will return the building to a two family residence.
