



Description

The Torre Water Catchment is octagonal in shape. It is a partially subterranean concrete pit or tank, with an octagonally shaped exterior and a cylindrical interior. The walls of the catchment are constructed of concrete packed around limestone gravel and cobbles. The interior surface is plastered. The structure extends .60 meters above and 2.10 meters below the present ground surface. The exterior diameter of the structure is 5.19 meters with walls ranging between .27 meters and .46 meters in thickness.

The Torre water catchment is located in Dededo in an area more commonly known as "Machanao". This is area is one of the most northern areas of Guam. This area is far from water.

This catchment was built by a farmer named Mr. Juan Dela Torre in approximately 1916, for whom the catchment was named after. The land where the catchment sits was once a farm. Dispute over eligibility of historic significance was brought by Hatsuho International, present owner and golf course developer on July 6, 1990. During the construction of the Hatsuho Country Club. The Torre Water Catchment was overlooked by Paul H. Rosendahl, Ph.D., Inc., Hatsuho's contract Archaeologist, who was hired to provide a survey of the property prior to its construction.

In a letter dated May 7, 1990, during dispute of eligibility, Paul H. Rosendahl, Ph.D., Inc. recommended that the water catchment not be preserved. The Historic Preservation Review Board determined that the structure was historically significant and urged Hatsuho International to keep it intact.

Today, it is included in the Guam Register of Historic Sites. The golf course has been completed and the water catchment is on the perimeter of the putting green on "hole North 6".

The interior of the catchment has been lined with plastic and filled in with gravel. There is also a plaque explaining its significance to visitors who come to golf there.

Significance

The Torre water catchment meet two criteria of significance for nomination, these

are: 1) structures that are associated with events that have made a significant contribution to the broad patterns of our history, 2) structures that embody a distinctive characteristic of a type, period or method of construction or that possess high artistic value.

The water catchment provided water to those who chose to live in the area. They were able to consider long term occupancy with the structure. For many years up to the early 1900's, family owned property far from water was not often utilized because of the difficulty in accessing water.

This water catchment was hand built during a time when building materials were scarce and high in cost. It was designed and built by people who intended it to become a permanent structure for holding water. The labor used was provided by family members. The materials used were collected from around the vicinity of the property and the cement had to be purchased. This structure has survived many typhoons and World War II and has faired exceptionally well compared to the family homes that were once erected on the property and now no longer exist.
