Describe present and historic physical appearance.

Located 20 miles south of Olympia in southeastern Thurston County, the Gate School is a well preserved frame structure sited on the original schoolyard adjacent to a main road. The one story, one-room school retains its original form, fenestration, and cladding, and is simply ornamented with bracketed eaves, exposed rafters, and the original belfry.

The frame building is rectangular in form, has a gable roof, and rests on a poured concrete foundation. The gable roof is covered with corrugated metal roofing, the eaves have exposed rafter tails, and gable-end fascia boards are supported by ornamental brackets. The roofline is broken by a simple brick chimney at the rear and a square, louvered belfry with a pyramidal roof which is flush with the front (east) facade.

Walls are clad with drop siding and cornerboards, and vertical boards skirt the foundation. The roof extends down at the southeast corner to cover the projecting entry vestibule. The vestibule is entered through a panelled door and is approached by a recent handicapped-access ramp with wooden railings. A small shed-roofed porch on the west facade shelters a rear entry door.

Fenestration consists of groups of tall, narrow, double-hung sash with six-over-six lights on the north facade and four-over-four lights on the east facade. The windows have plain surrounds. They are all intact but boarded over (except for one on the north side) to prevent vandalism.

The interior retains its historic appearance including a drinking fountain in the foyer, the original blackboards, room arrangement, flooring and beaded wainscoting. The only interior alteration is the installation of toilet rooms in the former cloakroom space.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Gate School is historically significant for its association with rural public education in Thurston County and the development of the community of Gate. The simple frame school, with decorative brackets, large windows and belfry, is characteristic of early 20th century school buildings in Thurston County. Sited on the original grounds, the school is one of the few remaining structures from the once thriving town of Gate, and the only public building from the town's significant period of growth. The schoolhouse is exceptionally well preserved and continues in use as a community center. It meets the registration requirements established for the property type in the Rural Public Schools multiple property documentation form.

<u>Historical Background</u>: The town of Gate was founded in 1881 but came to life during the later part of the 19th century with the extension of the railroad through the area. The townsite was platted in 1890 by Sam Woodruff of Olympia. When the Northern Pacific extended its line to Grays Harbor in 1890 and 1891, a junction was made here to build to Centralia and connect with the Portland line. This junction was called at first "Gate City" and later "Gate" because it was considered the "Gateway to the Coast."

The Northern Pacific secured the gravel for its ballast near Gate on the Mima Prairie and operated its own quarry and sawmill just west of Gate. North of Gate in the Black Hills were numerous logging camps both before and after the turn of the century. Gate was also a chief trading station for the Chehalis Indian Reservation which adjoined the town two miles to the southeast. Gate City Lumber Co. had a sawmill, planing and shingle mill at Gate and Ferndale Lumber shipped from Gate. Several businesses which welcomed Black Hills loggers and a railroad station lined the tracks. But fires in 1902 and 1918 destroyed much of the town which suffered further decline with the depletion of timber and closure of mills.

The schoolhouse was built in 1910 on land donated by Ty Mounts as a one-room school, replacing an earlier structure at another location. The school housed grades one through four in District 9. The building was also used as a meeting place for community events and for the Gate Homemakers Club. Consolidation with the Rochester School District in 1941 led to the closure of the school, after which the building was used as a community center.
